

The growth and development of a nation, institution and community depends on the manner of serving others, the manner of building up goodwill and the manner of reaching to others.


In serving others, the academe has to work and produce to bring about respective results through instruction, research, extension and production.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

This Annual Report 2009 reflects the achievements of the University in relation to its Vision, Mission, Goals, Instruction, Research, Extension, Production, Governance and Administration.

Three campuses of the University submitted several academic programs to AACCUP Accreditation and passed the Preliminary visit, Level I, Level II and Level III. These were the Burias Campus- Bachelor of Science in Commerce (Preliminary Visit); Teacher Education Programs for the Secondary and Elementary (Level II); and the Bachelor of Science in Agriculture (Level III). Dumarao Campus had the Bachelor of Science in Criminology and the Veterinary Medicine (Preliminary Visit) and the Bachelor of Elementary Education (Level I). While Pontevedra Campus had re-submitted for Level III Accreditation, the Secondary and Elementary Teacher-Education Programs.

As to the passing rate performance in the Licensure Examination (PRC) of the Bachelor of Science in Nursing, Bachelor of Science in Criminology, Bachelor of Science in Mechanical Engineering, Bachelor of Electrical Engineering, Bachelor of Science in Architecture and Teacher Education can be adjudged Very Satisfactory. Specifically, CapSU had produced a 5th placer in the PRC Exam for Architecture. These achievements were attained due to the commitment and support of the administration to the faculty, staff and students in terms of seminars, trainings and workshops. More faculty members applied for scholarship programs while others personally pursued on their own in their fields of study.

The putting-up of a printing press amounting to Php 2,612,000.00 assured everyone of more instructional material production in various disciplines.


CapSU Burias Campus and Dayao Campus were recipients of the Php 1,000,000.00 National Agriculture and Fisheries Education System (NAFES) for Agriculture and Fisheries.

SAFE Scholars for the less fortunate, but deserving students were already awarded through CHED. CIBAC scholars enjoyed their scholarships, too.

RESEARCH

The area for research also showed remarkable achievements for 2009. Some of these were:

- 5.) Best Paper in Natural and Biological Research category on farming Methods, Varieties and Seasons on Soil Nutrients and Agroeconomic Performance Direct Seeded Rice in Rainfed Lowland;
- 6.) First Runner-up in Natural Biological Category;
- 7.) Best Paper in Development Research Category as to Design and Development of Jatropha Seed Stove;
- 8.) First Runner-up in Development Research Category and Third Runner-up in Poster Category in the Development

of Smallholder Mechanical Pineapple Fiber Extract.


Extension services of the 10 campuses of the University made use of the Mobile Technology transfer/learning skills and strengthened linkages with other municipalities in the City of Roxas and the Province of Capiz.

Other extended technologies were on fish deboning, meat processing, commercial cooking, electricity holding, zero waste management, clean and green, vegetable gardening, livelihood training, literacy classes on Basic Education and Nutrition.

CapSU assisted the identified DEpEd Schools in the acquisition of computers for their faculty and students particularly the iSchool projects in Cooperation with CICT. Recipients were the six (6) schools of the Department of Education in the first and second districts of Capiz. This project improved easy access to internet and update information the soonest.

Linkages with agencies like TESDA, DOST, PA, NEDA, DTI, Capiz Province and Roxas City Local Government units and other industries strengthened the extension services of the University.





PRODUCTION

The University's Business Affairs Office (UBAO) also paved the way of the production area of the institution.

UBAO assisted and facilitated NEDA Central and Regional Office on Advocacy of the Regional Development Council, Region VI on coconut research center, coconut nursery, milk processing, dairy project, excel fabrication, furniture making and tilapia hatching.

HISTORY OF THE UNIVERSITY

The Panay State Polytechnic College has come into existence by virtue of Batas Pambansa 91 signed on December 24, 1980. The law provides the merging of the former Mambusao Agricultural and Technical College in Mambusao, Capiz, which has two existing campuses in Tapaz and Sapian and the Capiz Agricultural and Fishery School in Pontevedra, Capiz.

On August 29, 1981, Dr. Ernesto V. Botin took his oath of office as the first PSPC president and was reappointed as president in 1986 by then President Corazon Aquino until his term ended on July 24, 1993.

Dr. Anthony H. Navarrosa, the Executive Vice-President, served as OIC until the appointment of the second President, Dr. Rochellir D. Dadivas took effect on October 12, 1994.

In 1982, the Board of Trustees, with the approval from the Office of the President approved the addition of two satellite campuses in the municipalities of Dumarao and Pilar in the province of Capiz. Still the President was Dr. Ernesto V. Botin.

On October 25, 1999, the Capiz Institute of Technology in Roxas City including the Department of Fisheries at Dayao was integrated thus becoming the Roxas City Unit. On December 19, 2000, Sigma College of Science and Technology in Sigma, Capiz followed and became a part of the Mambusao Unit.

On September 15, 2000, the Board of Trustees approved the New Organizational Structure of the College with three (3) existing units, namely: the Roxas City Unit, the Mambusao Unit and the Pontevedra Unit. Each unit was headed by a chancellor.

The Mambusao Unit has six (6) satellite campuses- the Burias Campus in Mambusao, Sapian Campus in Sapian, Tapaz Campus in Tapaz, Sigma Campus in Sigma, Dumarao Campus in Dumarao and Mambusao Poblacion Campus in Mambusao.

Pontevedra has only 1 satellite campus, the CapSU Pilar Campus.


In 2000, a move to convert PSPC into a university was conceived and it was approved in the Lower House in March 2002 and in the Upper House on February 6, 2004. R.A. 9273, an Act converting PSPC into Capiz State University was finally approved by Her Excellency President Gloria Macapagal-Arroyo on March 21, 2004 at the Capiz Provincial Capitol, Roxas City, Capiz, Philippines.


Presently, Capiz State University has a total of ten sites strategically located in the different parts of the province. There are ten campuses offering degree courses and the other two are laboratory sites for the farming system and fishery research activities.

On July 7, 2008, Dr. Editha L. Magallanes became the third president of the University and also the first lady president of CapSU.

The chancellor positions of the 3 units were abolished and each campus was headed by a campus administrator.

ROXAS CITY MAIN CAMPUS

Capiz State University Main Campus, is situated at the heart of Roxas City. In 1917, Capiz Trade School (CTS) was established in the Municipality of Capiz (now Roxas City). Its main focus, back then, was rearing intermediate pupils – mainly boys, and offering vocational courses with woodworking as the only specialization.

Back through those years, Capiz Trade School, under the American superintendent F. E. Hemingway, was the only public vocational school for the province of Capiz.

Unlucky for CTS, its early years were marred by tragedy when, in about 1919, it was razed by fire and reduced to cinders. By then, it was decided by the Division Schools Superintendent Robert Clauson, for it to be relocated to its present site, some meters away from the south bank of the Panay River.

By 1920, secondary classes were offered and its first batch of graduates was in 1924. Few years after, the intermediate classes were virtually phased out, and in 1929, the school was elevated into a complete secondary school, with Jose Roldan as the school principal and Arthur Wittman as the provincial school superintendent of the province.

For the next ten years, Capiz Trade School became an established educational institution in the province and its students continually grow in number, primarily due to its vocational offerings which attracted students. But when World War II erupted and the Philippines was occupied by the Japanese, Jose V. Aguilar, the division superintendent at that time, together with the school principal, Mr. Griño, decided to temporarily suspend the school's operation. It was in 1946, when the entire country was completely liberated, that the shattered Capiz Trade School was reopened. Aguilar was reinstated as the provincial superintendent and a new principal in the person of Alipio dela Cruz was installed to administer the rehabilitation of the trade school.

During dela Cruz's first years (between 1947 and 1950), he oversaw the massive reconstruction of the school. The project included the rehabilitation of several war-torn school buildings.

By that time, Glicerio Tayco was installed as the new division schools superintendent. The trade school faculty began to grow in number to correspond with the increasing number of students. Among those noted faculty members at that time were: Vicente Azarcon, Ezmeralda Caldeo, Jose Baltazar, Reynaldo Aguilar, Eduardo Acepcion, Miss D. Arches and Miss Navarra.

A Related Subjects Department was created to supervise the offered subjects other than those in the shop or major courses. Its first head was Feliza B. Ortiz.

In 1953, Capiz Trade School was converted from a provincial school into a national vocational school with Fructuoso Yanson as the provincial school superintendent and Alipio dela Cruz as the principal. Juan Ciudad was the head of the vocational department and Feliza B. Ortiz in the related subjects department.

In 1957, Capiz Trade School was converted into a national school for arts and trades, changing its name to Capiz School of Arts and Trades (CASAT). Fernando S. Fuentes was the provincial superintendent at that time. A two-year course was offered following the conversion, with technical education as the field of specialization.

That same year, CASAT was graced with its official separation from the provincial schools division and became an autonomous trade school with its own superintendent to oversee its operation. CASAT's first superintendent was Rogelio Cachuela.


In 1960, reshuffling officials took event. Cachuela remained as the school's superintendent, while Donato V. Opina was promoted principal. Opina was replaced by Delfin Acanto as head of the vocational department. The year was blessed by the setting up and opening of a museum and the construction of the science building.

In 1964, Alipio dela Cruz was promoted superintendent of CASAT and Capiz School of Fisheries another vocational school located at Dayao, Roxas City. In 1969, in accordance with the Republic Act 5711, Capiz School of Arts and Trades and Capiz School of Fisheries were merged and converted into what was popularly known for 30 years, as Capiz Institute of Technology (CIT).

The year 1971 opened the administration of Melquiades C. Pugne. He was the 3rd superintendent of CIT. The following year, the Bachelor of Science in Industrial Education course was offered with electricity, electronics, technical building construction, as well as, furniture and cabinet making as its specialization. In 1976, the course was further enhanced by introducing new major fields in industrial arts and girls' vocational courses like handicraft, food technology and dressmaking.

From 1976 to 1980, CIT was continually growing in line with its mission of producing quality graduates. In 1980, new courses in the engineering fields were offered – the Bachelor of Science in Mechanical Engineering and the Bachelor of Science in Electrical Engineering. At that time, only CIT in the entire Philippines was the vocational school offering the said courses, and this was made possible by virtue of the Republic ACT 5711. These courses were opened due to the initiative of Superintendent Donato V. Opina and with the assistance of Rep. Narciso Monfort of Iloilo.

That same year also marked the beginning of the construction of a new college building opposite the main campus, with an initial budget of Php 3 million. With this financial assistance coming from various outside sources, the building was completed in 1983.





In 1982, Celestino R. Abello was appointed the new vocational school superintendent. On November 5, 1984, typhoon Undang ravaged CIT and destroyed some of the old and wooden buildings which included the old science and woodworking buildings. It was not until the following year that the rehabilitation began when the budget for reconstruction, worth Php 1.7 million was appropriated in order to rebuild the destroyed infrastructures.

Looking through the brighter side, the first batch of the engineering students, 27 graduated. Five of the pioneer mechanical engineering graduates and one from the electrical engineering passed the licensure examinations. Aside from the rebuilding the old buildings destroyed by the recent typhoon, a building for the registrar and the student association was also built.

On July 15, 1986, Abello retired from service and was replaced by Wilfredo L. Lena as the new superintendent. During the early part of Lena's term, 19 new instructor positions were opened. Upgrading of teachers' and personnel's competencies also ushered in through seminars and acquisition of relevant equipment.

In 1987, CIT became a recipient of school and office equipment from the Japanese-sponsored YDF, the gift package amounting to Php 5 million. The donation bolstered the learning competency of the students for it greatly helped in addressing the students' needs for modern equipment necessary for instruction.

In 1989 Glenn C. Acaso, a mechanical engineering graduate of the school, placed fourth in the board examination for mechanical engineers.

Capiz Institute of Technology, for the next years continued to grow in its curricular offerings which were needed by modern day Filipino students in both the secondary and tertiary levels.

In 1998, Wilfredo L. Lena retired and was in turn replaced by Primitivo V. Bangcoyo. On October 25, 1999, in accordance with the pertinent provisions of the Republic Act 7722, otherwise known as the Higher Education Modernization Act of 1997, Capiz Institute of Technology was formally merged with Panay State Polytechnic College (PSPC). The turning over was done by Tomas P. Pareño, Commission on Higher Education Director for Western Visayas to PSPC President Rochellir D. Dadivas, Ph. D. The purpose of the said merging was to promote quality education, as well as, maximizing resources. CIT became known as PSPC Roxas while Dayao became PSPC Dayao, the satellite campus of PSPC Roxas City Unit.

The Panay State Polytechnic College system was a conglomerate of former trade school scattered among the different municipalities of Capiz. It was through the law signed by the late President Ferdinand E. Marcos that these trade schools were converted into a single state college, which has been known since 1980 as PSPC.

In 1999, Rep. Manuel "Mar" Roxas, representative of the first district of Capiz, filed a bill seeking for the conversion of PSPC into a state university. Both the City Council of Roxas City and the Provincial Board of Capiz passed the resolution supporting Roxas' bill.

With the merging of the two institutions, the Office of the Vocational School Superintendency for PSPC Roxas was scrapped and was changed to the Office of the Unit Chancellor, with Primitivo V. Bangcoyo as the first unit chancellor of the Roxas City Unit.

Becoming an autonomous external campus, PSPC Roxas began reducing the number of its secondary school students. The entire system was allowed to maintain a secondary school of 500 students only.

On February 29, 2003, Governor Vicente B. Bermejo, Governor of the province, donated Php 250, 000 for the reconstruction of the conference room of PSPC Roxas and another Php 50, 000 for the air-conditioning of the said room.

Finally on March 21, 2004, on her visit to Roxas City, President Gloria Macapagal-Arroyo signed Republic Act 9273, converting Panay State Polytechnic College into Capiz State University (CapSU), making it the first ever university in the province of Capiz.

With the conversion of PSPC into CapSU, Roxas City Campus became known as CapSU Main Campus. It also became the seat of administration for the entire CapSU system. Primitivo V. Bangcoyo became the first chancellor of the CapSU Roxas City Unit while Dr. Rochellir D. Dadivas became the first university president. In 2005, Chancellor Bangcoyo retired from the service with an impressive record. He was replaced by Dr. Evaristo M. Magoncia, the former campus administrator of CapSU Dayao Campus. Dr. Nieves V. Aguirre, was designated campus administrator of CapSU Main Campus.

At the very beginning of Dr. Magoncia's term, CapSU Main Campus underwent a series of accreditation of its course offerings. Among the courses which underwent the said accreditation were the Bachelor of Science in Industrial Education, Bachelor of Science in Industrial Technology, Bachelor of Science in Mechanical Engineering and Bachelor of Science in Electrical Engineering. All fared well in the said accreditation.

The school, also at Dr. Magoncia's administration, underwent a change in its physical appearance. This included the landscaping of the grounds and repainting of the buildings. CapSU Main Campus' appearance was enhanced and became more conducive for learning.

Jeffrey U. Buhat, a Bachelor of Science in Industrial Education graduate, carved himself a mark in the academic history of CapSU Main Campus, when he landed 8th place in the 2005 Licensure Examination for Teachers.

In 2006, new infrastructures were built and completed here at CapSU Main Campus. These included the state of the art auditorium and the completion of the covered gym which was originally funded by Sen. Loren Lagarda. These projects were sponsored by then Rep. Rodriguez D. Dadivas of the first district of the province.

Campus personalities who were big winners that year included: Mrs. Teresita P. Varon, school publication chairman, who was honored as one of Western Visayas' Best Performing Schoolpaper Advisers; Harry Jim Herrera, 2nd place at the PASUC National On-the-Spot Painting Contest; and Ralph Gerard Cadiz, silver medalist in Copyreading and Headline Writing during the College Press





Conference and Awards in Iloilo City.

There were a lot of firsts that happened in 2007. New projects and greater success, indeed, came in the campus' way that year.

Two new courses were offered that year: the Bachelor of Science in Commerce (BSC) and the Bachelor of Science in Business Administration (BSBA), which compose the College of Commerce and Business Administration.

Another year, new president. By July 2008, Dr. Rochellir Dadivas retired from service. The presidential candidates who vied for the position were: Dr. Aladino Leccio, Dr. Genoveva Labaniego and Dr. Editha Magallanes. The latter won and became the second and first female president of the university.

In November, BIT, BSME and BSEE courses underwent the first level of accreditation. AACCUP conducted the first survey visit for three days. The programs successfully passed and received the Level I accreditation status. Thanks to the combined efforts of the faculty and staff, students and the administration.

Two thousand and nine has just begun and there are still many things that will surely happen. However, the events (successes and achievements) that took place in the past will surely bear fruits.

Indeed, CapSU Main Campus has traveled a long, long way and in its journey SUCCESS has come forth not only on the institution herself but even on her children – the graduates she has molded and nurtured to become productive citizens of our country – the Philippines.

DAYAO CAMPUS

The Capiz School of Fisheries was established by virtue of Republic Act 685 in 1952 through a bill sponsored by Congressman Ramon Arnaldo of the first district of Capiz.

The Capiz School of Fisheries came into operation in its temporary site at Cadimahan, Roxas City with Rafael S. Taruc as principal in 1961.

In 1964, the Capiz School of Fisheries was transferred to its present site at Dayao, Roxas City on December 9, 1964. Mr. Rafael S. Taruc was the principal with Mrs. Violeta F. Arnaldo as head of the related subjects department. Mr. Alipio dela Cruz served as the Superintendent of the two vocational schools in Roxas City, the Capiz School of Fisheries (CASOF) and the Capiz School of Arts and Trades (CASAT).

The Capiz School of Arts and Trades and the Capiz School of Fisheries were fused and converted into Capiz Institute of Technology by virtue of Republic Act No. 5711 in 1969. The two departments were known as CIT-Department of Arts and Trades and CIT-Department of Fisheries, Superintendent Alipio dela Cruz managed the two departments. Rafael S. Taruc remained principal. The three-year Technical Education was then offered.

In 1971, Hilario S. Fernandez was appointed as principal vice Rafael S. Taruc, Mrs. Violeta F. Arnaldo remained as head of the related subjects. Mr. Melquiades F. Pugne was appointed as Superintendent.

In 1972, the BSFED Curriculum was offered with majors in Fish Culture and Fish Preservation/Fish Processing. A two-room technical building was constructed.

Donato V. Opina became the fourth superintendent of CIT in 1975. Amando M. Delfin took over the position of Hilario S. Fernandez as principal of CIT-DF. Mrs. Violeta F. Arnaldo was promoted to Vocational Instruction Supervisor (RSD). The following year, Mr. Antonio A. Buensalido was appointed secondary head teacher.

In 1977, CIT-Department of Fisheries has its first batch of graduates in the Bachelor of Science in Fishery Education. The following year, Mr. Antonio A. Buensalido was appointed as principal and Mr. Juanillo Paciente, secondary school head teacher. There were construction of buildings during this year, the most prominent was the Science Building and the first pump boat was acquired.

By year 1981, Mr. Ramon S. Simon was designated officer-in-charge upon the retirement of Mr. Opina and Mr. Evaristo M. Magoncia was appointed as secondary school head the following year.





In 1983, Mr. Celestino R. Abello was appointed Superintendent. CIT-DF was chosen one of the schools assisted by the Fund for Youth Development of the Philippines (FYDP) sponsored by Japan International Cooperative Agency (JICA).

Typhoon Undang destroyed several buildings of CIT-DF in 1984 but managed to recuperate and gradually rehabilitate most of its damaged facilities and other infrastructures.

Mr. Eduardo T. Acepcion was appointed OIC upon Mr. Abello's two-month vacation to the United States in 1986. Mr. Wilfredo L Lena was appointed Superintendent upon the retirement of Mr. Abello. The new administration building and CAT office was constructed. More equipment from FYDP was given to CIT-DF to improve outreach program facilities. Paddle wheel for prawn farming was acquired in 1989. Mr. Evaristo M. Magoncia was promoted as vocational instruction supervisor upon the retirement of Mrs. Violeta F. Arnaldo. CIT-DF was chosen national pilot school for short term courses. Mrs. Dolores L. Leonor was promoted head of the related subjects.

Graduates in Bachelor of Science in Fishery Education (BSFEd) of CIT-DF, Dayao, Roxas City hurdled the Professional Board for Teacher (PBET), administered on May 30, 1993. Batch '93 recorded 100% passing as nine graduates who took the board examination came out successful. Among them were Jenny Antojado, Myra Asiong, Donna Amarillo, Arlene Araza, Jocelyn Sitjar, Jonathan Pelayo, Marlon Escultero, Alfonso Doctora and Peter Alcantara. Mrs. Dolores L. Leonor was promoted to Vocational Instructor Supervisor while Miss Herminia B. Gomez was promoted to head teacher.

It was in 1997 when Mr. Evaristo M. Magoncia went to Japan for six months on JICA training program and Mrs. Dolores L. Leonor was designated as OIC.

On October 25, 1999, by virtue of RA 8760 the Capiz Institute of Technology which was divided into the Departments of Arts and Trades and the Department of Fisheries were integrated with Panay State Polytechnic College.

On September 15, 2000, the Board of Trustees approved the new Organizational Structure of the college with three existing units namely: Mambusao Unit, Pontevedra Unit and Roxas Unit. Three courses were offered, the Bachelor of Science in Criminology, a self-liquidating course, wherein Mr. Gregorio Mendoza, a Registered Criminologist was designated as department coordinator. The other courses were Bachelor in Elementary Education, majors in Home Economics and Livelihood Education and the Bachelor of Fisheries (BSF) and Computer Programming and Secretarial. PSPC Dayao Campus spearheaded the "Zero Waste Management," "Matahum ang Matinlo," "Clean and Green Program" of the City of Roxas as well as the Fish Conservation Program of the City. Dayao Campus was the show-case of the said programs.

In 2004, PSPC was converted to Capiz State University by virtue of RA No. 9273. President Gloria Macapagal-Arroyo signed the conversion of PSPC to CapSU on March 23, 2004 at the Capiz Provincial Capitol.

Mr. Primitivo V. Bangcoyo, retired as Superintendent in 2005 and Dr. Evaristo M. Magoncia was promoted chancellor of the CapSU Roxas City Unit. Lucy A. Beluso succeeded the stewardship of CapSU Dayao Campus. The college submitted the three programs: College of Criminology, College of Education and College of

Fisheries to Accreditation, Dr. Edna M. Nava, Dean of the Academic Programs was the Accreditation Tasks Force Chairman. The chairmen for different programs for accreditation, Mr. Sebastian C. Caduco Jr., for the Criminology department, Mrs. Carmela D. Fantinalgo, for the Education Department, and Mrs. Fatima P. Sustento for the Fishery Department who also spearheaded the preliminary visit of the courses.

The three programs have successfully passed the preliminary survey by AACCUP. Seminars and symposia were conducted to augment instruction, research, extension and production capabilities. Greater percentage of the faculty, staff and students have attended trainings and seminars in the national, regional and local level. School improvements were supported by a number of agencies, networks and linkages.

The school publication had published two issues of the school's "Capiz Shell," its official gazette. Other school organizations were active, some had garnered trophies and awards.

Infrastructures and facilities were 90% completed and procured. The library holdings of the school per program were also increased.

Performance in the board/licensure examinations of the Criminology and Education graduates had improved.

In 2007, the Roging Dadivas Drive and concrete footwalk with shed project of the Congressman of the first district of Capiz. Hon. Rodriguez D. Dadivas, from the gate to the library and to the Education Building was completed. The Bachelor in Elementary Education and Bachelor of Science in Criminology passes the first Survey Visit by AACCUP.

The Ladderized Education Program (LEP), Security Services for BS in Criminology and Aquaculture for the Bachelor of Science in Fisheries were offered. It had helped boost enrolment for the two Bachelor programs and had maximized the scholarship and skill training of the campus.


Faculty had continuously engaged in research, extension and production activities. Several research papers were presented in the R and D symposia and selected for funding. Budget allotment for research and extension were increased.

The graduates of the BS Criminology and Bachelor in Elementary Education garnered high percentage of passing in their respective Board/Licensure Examination.

CapSU Dayao Campus had its last batch of graduates in the secondary program before the offering of secondary program was totally phased out.

In 2008, a ladderized program of the Bachelor of Science in Criminology was offered. It was also this year when the Fishery program underwent the first Survey Visit. The Bachelor of Science in Computer Science was approved and was offered in that same year.

In 2009, Dayao Campus was adjudged as NAFES Provincial Level Awardee in Fisheries with Php 500, 000.00 aid.





PONTEVEDRA CAMPUS

The Capiz State University Pontevedra Campus has a humble beginning as the then Pontevedra High School in the Poblacion of Pontevedra.

This high school opened in 1948 with Miss Constancia D. Dagudag (now Mrs. Constancia D. Diapo) as the organizer and first principal. Two buildings were constructed at an eight hectares side (?) donated by Mr. Saturnino Regalado. The equipment and facilities were also donated by the civic-spirited citizens, thus the school started to provide quality secondary education to the youth of Pontevedra and nearby municipalities.

In 1956, Congresswoman Carmen D. Consing sponsored a Bill converting the Pontevedra High School into a national agricultural school. This was suggested by Principal Diapo and a vocational teacher, Mr. Dioscoro M. Diapo. At the same time, Congresswoman Consing presented another Bill for the establishment of a fishery school in the province of Capiz. As a result, on June 21, 1957, Republic Act Nos. 1785 and 1786 were passed. The former for the establishment of a fishery school and the latter for the conversion of the Pontevedra High School into a national agricultural school. Mr. and Mrs. Dioscoro N. Diapo negotiated for the site at Bailan, Pontevedra, Capiz which is three (3) kilometers from the poblacion of Pontevedra.

Pontevedra, being a fishery and agricultural town, became the site of the agricultural and the fishery school provided for by the two laws. The school was named Capiz Agricultural and Fishery School by Mr. Napoleon D. Dignadice who became also its first superintendent. The school was completely transferred to the site at Bailan on February 10, 1958 and the first year of the agriculture-fishery curriculum was opened.

With Mr. Dignadice's leadership, CAFS progressed rapidly and in 1963, it was cited as one of the three most outstanding agricultural schools under the Bureau of Vocational Education.

In response to the request of the students and parents, a two-year course leading to associate in Agriculture was opened in the school year 1963-1964. During this period, Mr. Napoleon Dignadice was promoted to Visayas Agricultural College (now VISCA) in Baybay, Leyte. Mr. Esperidion P. Agustin was assigned as superintendent and Mr. Teodoro L. Olmo as principal. These two individuals continued the work left by Mr. Dignadice.

In 1965, Mr. Agustin went on leave due to serious illness, thus, Mr. Olmo was appointed principal-in-charge. After Mr. Agustin's passing away, in November 1966, Superintendent Alipio dela Cruz of Capiz School of Arts and Trades (now

CapSU Main Campus) was designated as officer-in-charge of CAFS until the arrival of Superintendent Virginio C. Juan in March 1967.

During the administration of Mr. Juan, there were construction of more school buildings, dormitories, cottages and an underground water storage tank; the expansion of the fishpond and sugarcane projects; extension and improvement of the road to the fishpond and the organization of the CAFS Cooperative Store and Canteen.

In June 1971, Mr. Olmo transferred to Leon National Agricultural School (now INCA) in Leon, Iloilo. This paved the way for Mr. Dioscoro N. Diapo to rejoin CAFS which gave him a chance to administer the school upon the retirement of Mr. Juan in 1972. Mr. Diapo became the principal and acting head of the college department. He was able to get the approval for the offering of the third and fourth years of the course leading to the degree of Bachelor of Science in Agriculture effective school year 1971-1972. Mr. Diapo's term as CAFS principal-in-charge was terminated when the then MATEC superintendent, Mr. Ernesto V. Botin was designated to administer the school.

Supt. Botin implemented the necessary reforms in the educational programs and improved CAFS in all aspects. With the cooperation of the faculty and staff of CAFS, necessary improvements were realized and CAFS was chosen as one of the thirteen experimental agricultural high schools in the country to be funded by the World Bank. In 1973, CAFS turned out its first BSA graduates.

In June 1973, Dr. Rodolfo C. Nayga was designated as superintendent and Mr. Eliseo Ponce became the principal in September 1973. It was during their term where the first water system was installed, the library; property and administration building were renovated, and the technical building was constructed. There was also the launching of the UPLB-SEARCA-CAFS Social Laboratory and implementation of the programs and sponsorship of seminars for teachers of Green Revolution in the province. Likewise, the CAFS became the accrediting center for the crash programs of the Ministry of Education and Culture known as MATEA (Master of Arts in Teaching Elementary Agriculture). The implementation of CAFS as an experimental high school under the EDPITAF was started in November 1974, Dr. Nayga transferred to Cagayan Valley Institute of Technology to become its president and Mr. Ponce also transferred to VISCA in 1975. Replacing these two administrators were Mr. Rafael Macahilig as superintendent and Mr. Floricito C. Almeida as principal.

Mr. Macahilig and Mr. Almeida continued the programs and the projects started by the two administrators. In addition, they helped in organizing the Panay Island Consortium for Rural and Agricultural Development (PICRAD) of which CAFS became a member; established the Ford Foundation demonstration farms; renovated a number of cottages; and constructed the Vocational Agricultural Building. In 1976, four (4) additional degree programs were opened, namely: Bachelor of Science in Agricultural Education, Bachelor of Science in Agricultural Homemaking Education, Bachelor of Science in Fishery, Bachelor of Science in Fishery Education and a post secondary Fishery Technician Certificate. Non-formal education classes were also conducted and the faculty development program started.

On March 31, 1978, Mr. Macahilig retired and Mr. Almeida became the acting Officer-In-Charge until the appointment of Mr. Wenceslao O. Sison Jr. as





superintendent in April 1978. Mr. Sison sent more teachers to study under the faculty development programs, further developed the school fishpond and raised its income, built a staff house in San Pedro and carried on the MATEA and non-formal education programs. CAFS won first place on its Alat-Tanim projects in the national contests during the school year 1979-1980 and got a three-room building as a prize. At the end of the school year, three of CAFS personnel were awarded with trophies by the MEC Region VI. Mr. Florito C. Almeida, Mr. Mac Arthur D. Beldia and Mr. Eduardo V. Bermil as outstanding principal, farm manager and secondary school teacher, respectively.

The Capiz Agriculture and Fishery School (CAFS) was converted into a state college through a Bill presented in the Batasang Pambansa by Assemblymen Jaenito Q. Madamba, Pedro Exmundo and Rolando Bayot. Through these leaders plus the support of other assembly men especially those from the other provinces of Region VI, and the former Congresswoman Consing and former Speaker Villareal, the Bill eventually became a law on December 24, 1980. The Panay State Polytechnic College was born by the virtue of Batas Pambansa Bilang 91 which was signed by President Ferdinand E. Marcos. This was the start of the merging of the two institutions: CAFS and Mambusao Agricultural and Technical College (MATEC). At last, the long cherished dream of the personnel of the two institutions was realized.

The institution is mandated to provide vocational, professional and technical training in agriculture, fishery, forestry, industrial fields, medical technology and similar courses.

The governing body of the college is the Board of Trustees which is composed of the Secretary of DECS who acts as the Chairman, the President of the College as the Vice-Chairman, the President of the Alumni Association of the College; the Regional Director of NEDA for Region VI, the Regional Director of DECS Region VI, and the two prominent residents of the province of Capiz as members.

The first meeting of the PSPC Board of Trustees was held in the Ministry of Education and Culture (MEC) Conference Room on June 4, 1981. With MEC Minister Onofre D. Corpuz as chairman, NEDA Regional Director Alex Umadhay and MEC Regional Director Antonio V. Tanchuan, both of Region VI as members. President Marcos appointed former Speaker Cornelio T. Villareal, Sr. and former Congresswoman Carmen Dinglasan-Consing as members of the PSPC Board of Trustees; MATEC Alumni president, Atty. Josefino Leonor was named interim and the then incumbent superintendent of MATEC, Dr. Ernesto V. Botin as acting PSPC President. The Board also approved the seat of administration to be located at PSPC Mambusao.

During the second Board Meeting on August 12, 1981, the position of Vice-President was created to which Mr. Wenceslao O. Sison, Jr., the last superintendent of CAFS was appointed immediately. The Board authorized the acting president to appoint faculty members. The Acting President and Vice-President took their oath on August 29, 1981 and September 16, 1981, respectively. Appointed as the first Dean of PSPC Pontevedra was Mr. Florito C. Almeida with Mr. Mac Arthur Beldia as Associate Dean.

In summer 1982, the College started offering three Masteral courses: Master of Science, Master of Agriculture and Master of Arts in Teaching (English, Filipino,

Mathematics, Science and Home Economics) and three new undergraduate courses: BS Home Economics, BS Agricultural Engineering and BS Agricultural Economics. Likewise, the College continued the development of her human resources, thus, Mr. Florito Almeida left to pursue a postgraduate program. In his absence, Dr. Nicolas Braña was designated Dean with Dr. Warlito Baticados as Associate Dean.

In 1983, the College Research Institute and Extension Institute were established to handle the two other functions of the College. Their establishment enhanced the quality and quantity of research and extension activities of the College.

The human resource development program of the College started to have its output. Dr. Ramon A. Patricio returned to the College after finishing his studies in 1985 and was designated Dean in June of that year. Dr. Baticados remained Associate Dean. During this period, the faculty and staff development program was intensified as well as the physical development of the campus.

In 1986, massive construction of buildings and repair of existing ones were started. It was also in this year that the transfer of the Secondary Fishery department of the College was made and PSPC San Pedro became a separate campus. The designated principal assigned was Mrs. Agapita Patani.

The long cherished dreams of the College to put up a Graduate School was realized when the Board of Trustees approved its establishment in 1987 with Dr. Leopoldo Ramos and Dr. Lucita G. Suelo as the first Dean and Associate Dean, respectively. With its establishment, the role of PSPC as leader in education in this part of the region was strengthened.

In 1989, the College was selected as one of the thirteen Provincial Technical Institute of Agriculture (PTIA) in the country under the National Agricultural Education System (NAES). This was funded by the Asian Development Bank and its implementation was supervised by the ATEP-EDPITAF. The program was a ladderized curriculum (DAT-BAT) which aims to equip the students to become technicians and professionals with abilities needed to make practical applications of theoretical knowledge and develop entry-level occupational proficiency in clusters of jobs in agriculture. The program components are building, laboratory equipment, facilities, transport service, staff development and scholarship grants and many more which greatly contributed to the enhancement of the College capabilities in training the youth in entrepreneurial skills in the fields of crop and animal production, post harvest technology and farm machination.

In 1991, the College expanded its curricular offering in the Graduate Level with the opening of the courses leading to Master in Public Administration, Master in Management major in Educational Management, and Doctor of Education, major in Educational Management. With these new programs, the Graduate School enrolment tremendously increased.

The College has also maintained her lead role in extension and in agricultural and fishery research in the province and in Region VI. These became possible through the establishment of the extension and research institutes, more involvement of the staff in R and D, and establishment of linkages with other government and non-government agencies such as PCARRD, PCAMRD, WESVARDEC, PHILFIN, UP, CRDAFI, CRDDC, SEAFDEC, UPV, DTI, DOST, DA, DENR,





SCU's, ACA and PASUC throughout the country. The College accomplishments in extension and research were made possible through consultations, collaborations, resource sharing, tie-up projects and other similar activities.

In September 1994, Dr. Rochellir D. Dadivas who was a formerly a faculty member of CAFSwas appointed president. Under the new administration, the priority areas of concern were accreditation, human resource development, strengthening of linkages to government and non-government entities, and improvement of instruction, research, extension and production.

All these years, the College has become an implementing arm in improving the quality of life of the rural communities. On the holistic perspective, PSPC has geared her tertiary programs to be relevant, sensitive and responsive to the demand for manpower, education and training needs of her target clientele.

As an institution of higher learning and the only university in the province of Capiz, Capiz State University Pontevedra Campus is committed to the following goals:

To provide educational leadership in arts and sciences, the humanities, and in the professional and technological fields to enhance socio-economic development and improve the quality of life in the Visayas Region in particular and the country in general, and;

To enhance the search for new knowledge and facts through pure and applied research for the advancement of instruction, intellectual and professional growth of the faculty and staff, and for increased knowledge and understanding.

In attainment of the above-mentioned commitments, the College implements an interdisciplinary approach of instruction, research, extension and production.

This is the mother house of the incumbent President, Dr. Editha L. Magallanes.

PILAR CAMPUS

Panay State Polytechnic College Pilar came into being by virtue of Resolution No. VI of the PSPC Board of Trustees and through the support of the Municipal Government of Pilar headed by Hon. Porferio P. Perez.

Mrs. Presminda P. Benliro, then chairman of the Department of Educational Media was designated as first officer-in-charge of the school.

On May 24, 1982, the school through the assistance of Miss Fanny Dolor, Ms. Melba Borci, now Mrs. Balajadia and Mr. Renato Ollos began screening for the first and second year high school students. The first applicants of the school participated in the town's religious fiesta and the participation served as the school's introduction to the community.


On June 14, 1982, the first teachers of PSPC Pilar were appointed. They were Miss Reyma Pabelonia, Mr. Wilson Albaladejo and Mr. Zeldo Benliro.

Pilareños donated various musical instruments for the band. A former musician was hired part-time by the school to train band members how to play various musical instruments. The band did not only provide training for the students but also served in community activities. With the increasing number of students, PSPC Pilar began hiring additional teachers and employees. Upon school opening in 1983, three academic teachers were hired and sometime later, it hired a janitor and a security guard. By 1984, a US Peace Corps Volunteer, Greg Maloney, came to work in tie-up projects of PSPC Pilar and the Ministry of Agriculture. He introduced salt farm to Pilareños and assisted in the goat-raising project of the school. Mr. Maloney was also a key person in securing USAID counterpart fund used in the construction of the Student Center, which houses Day Care Center, the Clinic and Canteen. Now it offers RH Counseling facilities and a sanctuary for VAW Victims.

The school suffered maximum damage during the super typhoon UNDANG in the later part of 1984. For a time, it was impossible to hold classes because the buildings were all destroyed. Classes were held in the cockpit adjacent to the school. The situation proved that PSPC Pilar could thrive under any condition.

Though the school has had numerous problems typical for a developing institution, it continued to gain support from the people. In 1986, college instruction was opened. It started with two courses: Bachelor of Science in Agricultural Technology.

When Presminda P. Benliro was sent on a scholarship to pursue her doctorate at UP Diliman, a new school administrator, Mr. Avelino Valenzuela Jr., was assigned





to PSPC Pilar. The school continued to grow not only in terms of populace but also in physical facilities. Additional buildings were constructed. The school was able to avail additional equipment for use in the office and for construction. The school library was furnished with more books in Science. Homemaking classes were provided with laboratory equipments. The school continued to maintain its swine and poultry projects which were also utilized for laboratory instruction.

Dr. Avelino Valenzuela served as school administrator for seven (7) years. When Dr. Avelino Valenzuela retired from the service, Dr. Joaquin Francisco replaced him as school administrator. He had been in the position for almost three (3) years. Since Dr. Francisco left the position, Dr. Presminda Benliro was forced to go back as school administrator until her retirement. Dr. Renato Ollos took over position as school administrator, which was consequently relinquished to Dr. Nilda B. Contreras who took over as school administrator. Since Dr. Contreras is retiring very soon, CapSU Pilar is now administered by Prof. Wilson Albaladejo.

At present, CapSU Pilar offers Bachelor of Science in Hotel & Restaurant Managemetn and Bachelor of Elementary Education, Bachelor of Science in Management and Bachelor of Science in Social Work wherein its first batch of graduates had successfully produced seven (7) passers to the recent board examination given last June 2009.

BURIAS CAMPUS

CapSU Burias Campus started as a municipal high school established in the town of Mambusao in 1946. It started with the first two years of the general high school curriculum with 137 students under the principalship of Mr. Patrocino del Rosario and turned out its first batch of 33 graduates in 1948.

Through the sponsorship of the then Congressman Cornelio T. Villareal whose dream was to have an institution that can serve the needs of the people of Mambusao and the neighboring towns. Republic Act No. 2088 was passed by Congress on June 22, 1958 converting the Mambusao High School to Panay Agricultural College. The congressman also sponsored two other bills which were passed by Congress under Republic Act 2802 on May 1, 1960 changing the name Panay Agricultural School to Mambusao National Agricultural School, and then Republic Act No. 3763 passed on June 22, 1963 converting the school to Mambusao Agricultural and Technical College with a college curriculum designed for academic leadership and vocational excellence in agriculture. With the conversion, Mr. Napoleon Dignadice became the first superintendent and Mr. Dioscoro Diapo as principal. In July of 1963, the school transferred to Barangay Burias, its present site.

From 1963 to 1980, the school continued to grow. Several people came to lead the growing number of faculty and staff and students whose number also continued to increase due to the opening of the various courses. Among those who were appointed superintendents of the College were Mr. Espiridion Agustin (1963-1965), then Mr. Doroteo Asuncion (1965-1972), Dr. Ernesto V. Botin (1972-1975), Dr. Anthony N. Navarrosa (1975-1977), when at this time Dr. Ernesto V. Botin was pursuing a doctorate degree as a SEARCA scholar at UPLB and then again, Dr. Ernesto V. Botin (1977-1980) after completing his doctoral program.

On December 24, 1980, after seven years of lobbying for the conversion of the school into a state college, President Ferdinand E. Marcos signed into law Batas Pambansa Blg. 91, converting Mambusao Agricultural and Technical College along with the Capiz Agricultural and Fishery School, into the Panay State Polytechnic College. With these developments, Dr. Ernesto V. Botin became its first president. Upon his retirement in 1994, he was succeeded by Dr. Rochellir D. Dadivas who became the second president of the College.

On March 21, 2004, Her Excellency President Gloria Macapagal-Arroyo signed R.A. 9273 converting Panay State Polytechnic College into Capiz State University, and Dr. Rochellir D. Dadivas in hold over capacity became the first president until July 2008 and concurrently Dr. Editha Magallanes is the second President and the first lady President of the University.





CapSU Burias Campus is at present a satellite campus of the CapSU system and the seat of CapSU Mambusao Unit located in the second district of Capiz. This campus is manned by Dr. Mary Ann B. Martelino as Campus Administrator. Supportive of her leadership are two college deans, from the College of Agriculture and Forestry, and the College of Education, one OSA director, Chairmen of the different curricular programs, 59 faculty and 41 administrative personnel.

POBLACION MAMBUSAO CAMPUS

Capiz State University is the only state university in the province of Capiz. It has ten campuses located in the seven municipalities and city of Roxas. The university status was approved by the bicameral houses and was signed into law by Her Excellency, President of the Republic of the Philippines. Hon. Gloria Macapagal-Arroyo last March 21, 2004. The Campus serves as the center of academic affairs as embodied in the Bill.


One of the campuses – Poblacion Mambusao Campus – is the birthplace of the University, formerly known in its chronological name as the Mambusao Municipal High School. Mambusao High School, Mambusao National Agricultual School, Mambusao Agricultural and Technical College and Panay State Polytechnic College – the name it carried prior to its conversion into its present status – Capiz State University.

As a college- the former Mambusao Agricultural and Technical College – it transferred the seat of administration at Burias, Mambusao, Capiz. It remained as a college until its conversion into a state college known as Panay State Polytechnic College last December 24, 1980. As a state college, Dr. Ernesto V. Botin became its first President with Dr. Wenceslao O. Sison as the first Vice-President.

Although the Poblacion site was temporarily relinquished, it catered to the elementary pupils of the Poblacion. Visioning the need for a campus in the Poblacion, Dr. Ernesto V. Botin reclaimed the site in 1983. Eventually, the campus serves until now as the Extension Office where the Graduate School, the College Extension Institute and the Agri-Science curriculum (High School Department) are situated. Dr. Ernesto V. Botin dreamed of establishing these departments in order to reclaim the site in Poblacion. Through his negotiations with the former Municipal Mayor, the late Hon. Edgardo M. Andaya with the full support of the Sangguniang Bayan, the site was utilized for the said purposes.

Due to his retirement as the President of the State College, Dr. Rochellir D. Dadivas succeeded him. During the incumbency of the latter as President, he planned to offer baccalaureate courses – the Bachelor of Arts with Economics and English as major fields and the Bachelor of Science in Food Technology and Entrepreneurship – in the Poblacion site. Proposals were then presented to the Board of Trustees and were approved on March 4, 1999. By the opening of the school year in June 1999, the said courses marked its pioneering stage with a humble number of enrollees of 67 (AB English, 30; AB Economics, 13; and BSFTE, 24).

Dr. Merlita L. Navarra, the dean of the Graduate School, was appointed as





in-charge of the baccalaureate courses. On October 28, 1999, Dr. Navarra relinquished the position and Dr. Luis T. Pula was designated the chairman of the two courses.

The following school year 2000-2001, Political Science was offered as an additional major of the AB courses. Another course, the Bachelor of Science in Computer Science, was likewise offered. The three courses were still under the chairmanship of Prof. Luis T. Pula with Dr. Raul L. Ticar as the Campus Administrator.

During school year 2001-2002, due to the increase in enrollment, Dr. Raul L. Ticar was designated as the Campus Administrator. Prof. Luis T. Pula served as the Chairman of the AB courses and the Bachelor of Science in Food Technology and Entrepreneurship and was designated Campus Secretary while Dr. Roman V. Belleza served as Chairman of the Computer courses. Two-year courses, the Computer Programming and the Computer Secretarial, were added during the school year 2002-2003.

During the school year 2002-2003, the Bachelor of Science in Food Technology and Entrepreneurship had a new chairman, Dr. Ethelda L. Brana.

The Campus turned out its first batch of 30 graduates from the AB and BSFTE courses. The graduation was held at the Main Campus in Burias, Mambusao, Capiz since the number of graduates was too small to have its independent commencement exercises. The campus was then called College of Arts and Sciences, the nomenclature proposed to the College Board of Trustees for approval.

The second semester of the school year 2003-2004 heralded a revamp in PSPC Poblacion Mambusao Campus. On November 3, 2003, Dr. Aladino L. Leccio, the former director of the College Extension Institute, was designated Dean of the Graduate School and at the same time Campus Administrator. Dr. Roman V. Belleza was designated Assistant Campus Administrator and chairman of the Research Department. The different programs offered by the Campus had new chairmen: Dr. Arturo L. Lava, AB courses and Instruction; Prof. Nalyn L. Valzado, BSFTE; and Ms. Rosel L. Dionio, Computer courses. Prof. Luis T. Pula was designated Campus Secretary; Prof. Lucille L. Marquez, Chairman of the Office of Student Affairs; Dr. Nelson L. Berondo, Chairman of Extension; Prof Dominador L. Lastimoso, Jr., Planning and Development Officer; and Mr. Leo Anthony C. Navarrosa, Information Officer.

In 2004, the Campus turned out 97 graduates from the different courses: Doctoral and Master's Degrees; AB, majors in Economics, English and Political Science; Bachelor of Science in Food Technology & Entrepreneurship; Bachelor of Science in Computer Science; two-year Computer Programming and Computer Secretarial; and Secondary Agri-Science curriculum which is in its penultimate year. The Commencement Speaker was Dr. Eulogio "Amang" R. Magsaysay, National President of the Alliance of Volunteer Educators who became its Party List Representative in the House of Congress.

In this year also, the Central Administration transferred its office at the former Capiz Institute of Technology, now Capiz State University, Main Campus in Roxas City.

On February 4, 2005, Dr. Aladino L. Leccio was chosen chancellor of the Mambusao Unit because of his numerous accomplishments. He served at the same time as Campus Administrator.

In the year 2005, the campus turned out 146 graduates with Mrs. Jane Tan Castro, wife of Congressman Fredenil Castro, as the first Commencement Speaker.

On July 4, 2005, the campus had a new Campus Administrator, Dr. Arturo L. Lava who was the former chairman of the AB courses and Instruction. Because of his designation, changes in the chairmanship were made. Dr. Roman V. Belleza was chosen Dean of the Campus; Ms. Julie V. Dalida, chairman of the AB courses; and Mrs. Frocy M. Navarrosa, Chairman of the Computer Courses due to the study leave of Mrs. Rosel L. Dionio.

Other designated positions were: College Secretary, Prof. Luis T. Pula; Campus Registrar, Prof. Erna N. Ticar; Alumni Affairs, Ms. Rhodora L. Ticar; Cultural Affairs, Mrs. Lilibeth G. Leonor; and External Affairs, Mrs. Salvacion L. Diangson.

The Campus experienced an increase in enrollment during the school year 2007-2008. This was due to the offering of the Ladderized Programs of the Bachelor of Science in Computer Science and the Bachelor of Science in Food Technology and Entrepreneurship. The Technical Education and Skills Development Authority (TESDA) offered scholarship of Five Thousand Pesos (Php 5,000.00) to almost all the first year entrants.

The Campus subjected its three degree programs- the Bachelor of Arts, the Bachelor of Science in Food Technology and Entrepreneurship and the Bachelor of Science in Computer Science – Accreditation (Preliminary Visit) by the Accrediting Agency of Chartered Colleges and Universities last September 7-10, 2008. Luckily, the three degree programs passed the preliminary survey. With its passing grade, the Campus hopes to have more enrollees for year 2009-2010.

With its present status, the Campus and the whole university system hope to cope with the expectations of the populace and the neighboring provinces.





SAPIAN CAMPUS

In response to the government's policy which is to bring the school closer to the people, the administration of the Panay State Polytechnic College, now Capiz State University formerly the Mambusao Agricultural and Technical College under the able leadership of Dr. Ernesto V. Botin and with the full support of the former Mayor Ishmael B. Orillos of the Municipality of Sapian, the MATEC-Sapian Campus (Don Julio Orillos Memorial School of Agro-Fishery) was opened in June 1977 with Mr. Eulogio L. Pimentel as School Administrator. The campus served as a satellite school for the college which catered to the quadro-dimensional concerns, namely, instruction, research, production and extension. Research projects especially in fishery were conducted in this campus; likewise, different production projects like rice project, fishpond project, reforestation project, and others were operated and maintained.

The Sapian Campus is situated at Barangay Lonoy approximately 16 kilometers from the Poblacion. The campus started with a secondary education and it was in the year 1981 when it turned out the first batch of high school graduates with 19 boys and 24 girls under the advisory of Mr. Elmer O. Victoriano. The pioneer teachers upon the establishment of the college were Mr. Felinor Eleserio, Mrs. Elfa Alba and Miss Marina Bargo. Due to increasing enrollment, additional teachers were employed in 1979 which included Mr. Elmer Victoriano and Mrs. Rosela Olmo. They were later reinforced in 1980 by Mr. Ronilo Olano, Mr. Cyril Bulacan, Miss Maddy Remegio and Miss Lourdes Fabuna. Likewise, a US Peace Corps Volunteer joined the force in the person of Miss Catherine Thomas. In 1981, Mr. Edgardo Gallardo, MRs. Elnor Briones and Miss Judy Donado were employed in addition to the existing teaching faculty of the college.

It was in the year 1982 when the four-year technical course leading to the Degree Bachelor of Science in Fishery major in Fish Culture and Diploma in Fishery Technology were offered. Due to the need of more faculty to teach in these new programs, Miss Candelaria Olano, Miss Ella Dalida and Miss Luzviminda Oroceo were employed. Mr. William Lago was hired as security guard and Mr. Nestor Gamayao as utility worker.

It was also in the same year when Dr. Eulogio Pimentel was relieved by Prof. Arturo Luces as School Administrator. Prof.Luces served for two years and was then replaced by Dr. Leopoldo F. Ramos in 1984. Miss Norma J.Flores joined the teaching force of PSPC Sapian in the same year. In 1985, Miss Arlene Panado was employed as clerk and Mr. Diony Cahilig as additional faculty member. It was in April 1986 when the college turned-out the first batch of college graduates.

Under the faculty development program of the college some teachers were sent to pursue graduate studies. Miss Norma J. Flores was sent for a scholarship

grant in UP Diliman taking up Ph. D. in English in 1986; Mr. Diony Cahilig to UP Visayas to take up MS Aquaculture and graduated in 1995; Mr. Edgardo Gallardo, PSPC Mambusao to take up MS Agronomy and graduated in 1994. Other faculty members continued their Master's degree in their respective field of specialization: Mrs. Lourdes Victoriano, MAT Home Economics; Mrs. Maddy Gallardo, MAT General Science; Mrs. Candelaria Arro, MS Aquaculture; Mrs. Ella Onatis, MAT English; MRs. Luzviminda Isiderio, MAT Mathematics; Mrs. Rosela Olmo, MAT Administration and Supervision/Guidance and Counseling; and Mrs. Lecel Bobier, MAT General Science.

The campus organized various school organizations such as the Student Body Organization, Future Farmers of the Philippines, Future Agricultural Homemakers of the Philippines, Future Farmers of the Philippines College Chapter, Red Cross Youth Council, and Science Club. The college also delegates and joined the various local, provincial, regional and national conferences, seminars, and related activities.

The college suffered maximum damage caused by super typhoon "Undang" in the later part of 1984. The 7-room building and the Home Economics building were totally damaged. Despite of this, classes were held in improvised shelters and sometimes under the trees just so to provide the educational needs of the students.


In 1986, Prof. Calixto D. Bacanto relieved Dr. Ramos as School Administrator. Because of the increasing student population, Mr. Ben Hur B. Espino was employed as faculty member in 1987. Professor Calixto D. Bacanto was recalled to PSPC Pontevedra in 1989 and was replaced by Prof. Elmer O. Victoriano who served as school administrator for 9 years. In 1997, Prof. Elmer O. Victoriano was granted a scholarship grant in ISCOF, Barotac Nuevo, Iloilo to finish his Master's degree in Aquaculture. Because of this, Dr. Sykum L. Legarda, a faculty member from PSPC Main Campus and a graduate of Doctor of Philosophy in GAUF, Manila assumed the position as Campus Administrator up to the present.

More staff was hired to take care of the projects of the campus: Mr. Francisco Felizardo as fishpond caretaker in 1993; Mr. Wilgefortes Orillos as casual security guard on 1996; Mr. Cyrus O. Olete as school nurse in 1994; and Miss Lecel O. Olanga as biology teacher in 1996.

The campus all the while was experiencing a decrease in enrollment. This brought the Campus Administration as well as the Central Administration a big problem. There was already a decision to close it but because of the insistence of the former municipal mayor, Mrs. Remedios O. Onas, who promised to donate a lot and a school building, the campus was relocated at the Poblacion in 2001 although retaining some of its classes in Lonoy.

The campus regained its status and enrollment rose because of its new offerings. In 2001, Bachelor of Arts with major in English which later offered more major fields. The first two years in Education was also offered with the condition that the third and fourth years will be finished at Burias Campus. In 2005, it turned out its first 42 AB (English) graduates. Inspired of the increasing enrollment, the administration decided to offer Bachelor of Science in Management (BSM) in 2003-2004 and turned its first BSM graduates in 2008.

Due to the persistence of Mayor Oñas, to maintain the campus at the Poblacion





which was still shaky in 2006 because of low enrollment, the Bachelor of Science in Hotel and Restaurant Management (BSHRM) was offered. This program brought hope to the campus with its big enrolment. It will be turning out its first graduates in 2010.

Another milestone for Sapian Campus was the offering of the Bachelor of Elementary Education (BEED) which was reoffered in 2007 (this was offered in Lonoy in the early 90's but was dissolved). This was a controversial issue between Burias Campus and Sapian Campus but was finally resolved by Dr. Rochellir D. Dadivas that the program be reopened in Sapian.

TAPAZ CAMPUS

The Panay State Polytechnic College has come to existence by virtue of Batas Pambansa Blg. 91 signed by then President Ferdinand E. Marcos on December 24, 1980. The law merged two existing colleges in the province of Capiz: the Mambusao Agricultural and Technical College (MATEC) and the Capiz Agricultural and Fishery School (CAFS) located in the municipalities of Mambusao and Pontevedra, respectively. These schools started operation as municipal high schools as far back as 1946 and 1948, respectively, continuously growing into national agricultural schools and consequently into national agricultural colleges. Years of serious commitment to the cause of education as a key to rural development has earned for PSPC the status of a respectable institution of higher learning, serving the needs of the people in the province of Capiz and the whole Western Visayas region in particular, and the country in general.

The first PSPC president appointed during the first Board of Trustees meeting presided by MECS Minister Onofre D. Corpus on June 4, 1981 was Dr. Ernesto V. Botin who took his oath on August 29, 1981. In 1986, Dr. Botin was reappointed by then President Corazon C. Aquino and held the position until his term terminated on July 24, 1993. He then served in an OIC capacity until April 15, 1994, after which Dr Anthony N. Navarrosa, the Executive Vice-President, served as OIC until the appointment of the second President, Dr. Rochellir D. Dadivas took effect on October 12, 1994.

From 1980 henceforth, PSPC has unwaveringly served her mandate of providing educational leadership in the arts and sciences, the humanities, and in the professional and technological fields especially in agriculture, fishery, forestry, engineering, teacher education, and other allied fields. The college operates in a quadro-dimensional function in instruction, research, extension and production with all activities geared towards the improvement of quality of life of the people within the service area.

The merging of these two big agricultural colleges led to the conversion of MATEC and CAFS to PSPC which also led to the establishment of the first satellite campus in Tapaz through the initiative of the then Retired Supervisor Gregorio Palomar, supported by the local government unit under the administration of then Mayor Ramon Gloria. It started in 1977 with high school classes temporarily housed in the Central School of Tapaz West District. In 1981, it transferred to its present site at San Julian through the efforts of lot donors particularly ABC President Amado Gardose.

In the academic year 1982-83, Bachelor of Science in Agriculture (BSA) was offered, followed by the Teacher Education programs (BEED and BSEd) in 1987.





The curricular offerings were further expanded with the offering of Bachelor of Science in Forestry (BSF), Diploma in Agricultural Technology-Bachelor in Agricultural Technology (DAT-BAT) and most recently, the Bachelor of Arts to cater to the needs of Tapaznon.

The first designated Principal of MATEC Tapaz was Mr. Perfecto Lacorte (1977-1980), followed in succession by Mr. Leopoldo Ramos (1980-1982), Prof. Ramon Lachica (1982-1990), Prof. Winifredo Gardose (1990-1997), Dr. Pedro Gavino (1997-2001), Dr. Federito Launio (2001-2005) and Dr. Cora Navarra (2005-2007). Presently, the Campus Administrator is Dr. Ramona M. Launio.

SIGMA CAMPUS

Sigma Barrio High School organized as Barangay High School in 1967 has an initial student of 65 with two teachers.

Parliamentary Bill No. 1158 filed before Batasang Pambansa proposing the conversion of Sigma Barangay High School into Sigma National High School was officially operated pursuant to Batas Pambansa No. 247 and was approved on June 10, 1983.

Hon. Congressman Vicente Andaya Jr. after being elected to office prioritized this major projects with the aim to provide a college institution for the masses especially to his fellow Sigmahanon who were deprived of tertiary education because of financial reasons.


Republic Act No. 7973 was passed on April 2, 1995 converting Sigma National High School to Sigma College of Science and Technology and took effect on January 1, 1996.

December 19, 2000, Sigma College of Science and Technology was turned over to Panay State Polytechnic College as approved in the 54th Regular Board Meeting held at CHED Conference Room, San Miguel Avenue, Ortigas Center, Pasig City.

Her Excellency President Gloria Macapagal Arroyo approved and signed the conversion of PSPC into State University to be known as the Capiz State University Sigma Campus by virtue of R.A. No. 9273.

This campus offers Bachelor of Science in Hotel and Restaurant Management (Ladderized Education Program or LEP) with specialization in Food and Beverage Services NC II, Bartending NC II, Commercial Cooking NC II and Housekeeping Management NC II as core program. Other courses offered by the college are: Bachelor of Science in Hotel and Restaurant Management (BSHRM) major in Food and Beverage Management and Housekeeping Management, Bachelor of Science in Tourism, Bachelor of Science in Industrial Technology major in Electrical Technology, Electronics Technology, Automotive Technology, Food Technology, Garments Technology and Refrigeration and Air-Conditioning Technology and Bachelor of Science in Home Economics, Two-Year Hotel and Restaurant Management, Two-Year Computer Secretarial and Computer Programming, Two-Year Computer Programming NC IV and Two-Year Certificate of Technology – Automotive and Electrical and One-Year PC Computer Operations NC II.

The Bachelor of Science in Hotel and Restaurant Management was already accredited Level I by the Accrediting Agency of Chartered Universities and Colleges of the Philippines.



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DUMARAO CAMPUS

The establishment of the Capiz State University, formerly Panay State Polytechnic College in Dumarao is the realization of every Dumaraonon's dream of having an institution of higher learning that can serve the needs of not only the youth of the municipality, but the community as a whole, and the neighboring towns, as well. From an extension school initially conceived to be a feeder to the undergraduate programs of the main campus, CapSU Dumarao has grown to be one of the most stable branches of the whole CapSU system. Considering the continuous and vigilant development initiatives being undertaken by the administration, faculty and students, and the able support given by the Local Government Units and the parents, the dynamic growth of CapSU Dumarao is inevitable.

It was about the first week of August in 1981 when plans about the possibility of opening a branch in the municipality of Dumarao started. This was between and among the then mayor of Dumarao (now Governor of the Province of Capiz) the Honorable Victor A. Tanco, the late Honorable Josefino L. Leonor who was then mayor of the municipality of Mambusao where the main campus of the college is located, and then President of the College, Dr. Ernesto V. Botin. The issue being addressed then was bringing the College closer to the Dumaraonons.

It was the thought of serving the educational needs of his constituents that moved then Mayor Victor A. Tanco to take the matter very seriously. Several meetings ensued from the initial formal meeting sometime first week of September until the idea was brought to the attention of the Sangguniang Bayan chaired by then Vice-Mayor Heracleo Benjamin (former mayor of the municipality). Sangguniang Bayan resolution was then prepared, reviewed by both parties, and formally presented to and deliberated by the Sangguniang Bayan. The municipal resolution provided that the municipality shall take responsibility of providing for the College the area for the school site and the initial school building. For its part, the College shall provide for the teachers and the initial classroom facilities. Mayor Tanco and the Sangguniang Bayan's dream was not just an ordinary extension school of PSPC in Mambusao but an institution of higher learning that shall specialize in agriculture, education and forestry, this being the need of the town and complementary to the human and material resources of the municipality. At that time, the plan was for the college to be established at the foot of the mountain range of Barangay Bungsuan within the vicinity of the Dumarao Stock Farm. Negotiations to transfer to the College a 10-hectare area for the school site was materialized.

Meantime, the municipal resolution to open the branch in Dumarao was presented to the College Board of Trustees and this was approved under


Resolution No. 6, s. of May 1982. Dr. Nenita A. Beluso was then asked to proceed to Dumarao to take charge of the enrolment and the initial phase of administering the campus. Since the area was not yet available, the Municipality of Dumarao had negotiated to use the AMU Building of the Department of Agrarian Reform at Bungsuan, Dumarao. Initially, two year levels of high school were opened with an enrolment of 96 students. Dr. Nenita Beluso was formally designated Officer-in-Charge of the campus. With her were the four recruited emergency teachers, the pioneers of PSPC Dumarao in the person of Miss Teresita H. Arriola (now Oducado), Miss Arlena C. Hachuela (now Araneta), Mr. Nolito Ojacastro, and Mr. Gregorio L. Baranda. Life for the five of them was a difficult and challenging one. They had to take all kinds of rides just to reach the town. If unlucky and could not get a ride, they had to walk their way reaching the town of Dumarao past Angelus.

The next school year (1983-1984) when acquisition of the area of Bungsuan started to wane, the mayor decided to bring the school to the town proper, temporarily locating at the present Sports Complex. The area was wide; it was able to accommodate four sections, one third year, one second year, and two sections of first year. Classes continued to be held at the Complex with only black boards serving as divisions between classrooms while the extension of the municipal building was simultaneously being constructed. By this time, two teachers were hired in the persons of Mr. Violeto B. Ladoc and Ms. Loida Laurino (now Barrera).

In June of the next school year (1984-1985), PSPC Dumarao already had a complete secondary education program. At this time, classes were transferred to the municipal extension building. Despite its state of temporariness, enrollment continued to grow, now with six sections, two first year, two second year, one third year and one fourth year. Ms. Fatima L. Padernal (now Guanzon) was hired to reinforce the teaching staff. By the time it turned out its first batch of high school graduates, PSPC Dumarao made a record of 100% passing at the National Entrance Examination.

It has to be mentioned that in this school year, by around late August of 1984, when hope to acquire the area at Bungsuan seemed to be impossible, then Mayor Victor A. Tanco tried to seek the benevolence of landed Dumaraonons by donating a site for the College. The family of the late Gaudencio Arancillo Sr. led by then OIC Gaudencio Arancillo Jr. and siblings responded by donating 29 hectares of their land at Condingle. The heirs of Matias Basco and Mr. Augusto Herrero and family followed, making available for use of PSPC Dumarao a sprawling 35 hectare as school site. After the donation papers had been finalized, Dr. Ernesto V. Botin tried to move heaven and earth to get funding for a school building and fortunately funds had been approved for the first infrastructure in the branch. Soon, bulldozers and graders of the Philippine Army Engineering Battalion were mobilized and construction started. It would recall the presence of Dr. Ernesto V. Botin, most of the time, Dr. Anthony N. Navarrosa, and Mr. Pablo L. Espino bringing in gasoline/diesel.

Just when the second batch of construction materials were delivered about the end of October 1984, the province of Capiz had suffered the tragic blow of Typhoon Undang, devastating the whole of Dumarao, the school site included, wasting away structures initially erected and materials stocked up in the building site, blowing and tearing away books and everything, bringing PSPC Dumarao down to zero in almost everything.






The Undang memory was truly devastating but it did not deter everyone including administrators in Mambusao to rise and pick up the pieces. Thanks to the calamity funds extended by the national leadership at that time, the College had its share of an amount good enough for two buildings erected to what are now the buildings of the Agriculture Department.

June of the next school year (1985-86) was one of the great remembrance for it was during this time that PSPC Dumarao transferred to the present site. It was also as this time when the Bachelor of Science in Agriculture was extended to the branch. Two additional teachers in the persons of Mrs. Noemi C. Candelario and Mrs. Soledad D. Villareal were hired. Likewise, a support staff was recruited to include Mr. Eugenio G. Fresnillo, Ms. Kusela H. Delfin and Mr. Demosthenes L. Arancillo as Janitor, Clerk 1, and security guard, respectively. Everyone in PSPC Dumarao began with pioneering efforts to develop the campus. There was massive tree planting, the area being barren and devoid of any plant of value. Students had to do most of the job, bringing in compost and organic materials from their homes so that trees planted can have a good chance of surviving. As usual, the support from the municipal government was there. Tree planting materials were made available from the Mt. Tag-ao Reforestation Project including the technical expertise of Mr. Dale Mix, a Peace Corps volunteer. Again, life was not easy but it was challenging and very fulfilling for all of them at PSPC Dumarao community.

In June of 1986, Dr. Nenita Beluso was offered a scholarship for a doctorate degree at De La Salle University. Dr. Eulogio F. Pimentel took over as School Administrator. He continued what Dr. Beluso had started and even did better. He continued the tree planting activities. In August of 1991, PSPC Dumarao had already established its own Upland Integrated Farming System, Freshwater Tilapia Culture and formalized the tie-up with DENR for the Bamboo Research Project.

In the absence of Dr. Nenita Beluso, Prof. Manuel L. Gavino was designated Officer-in-Charge and consequently as School Administrator. Just like the past administrators, Dr. Gavino also continued bringing PSPC Dumarao to higher state of excellence, intensifying its role as a change agent and catalyst of development.

In August 1997, Prof. Manuel L. Gavino was recalled to Burias Mambusao Campus. He was succeeded by Dr. Genoveva N. Labaniego who strongly continued the programs of her predecessors and effectively introduced more development initiatives for the campus. It was during her term that the Doctor of Veterinary Medicine program from the Burias Campus was transferred to Dumarao as its campus flagship program. Likewise, the Bachelor of Science in Criminology was also offered which garnered 38.88 percentage in the licensure examination for criminologists in 2008. Dr. Edito L. Lago took over as campus administrator in July 2005 when Dr. Genoveva N. Labaniego was promoted to Vice-President for Academic Affairs and concurrently Chancellor of Mambusao Unit. At this time, several projects were initiated and put up, such as the Dumaraonon USA Computer Laboratory. Dumaraonon USA Corner in the Campus Library, phase two construction of the DVM building, acquisition of 20 computer units and other accessories, repair of Boys' Dormitory, availment of Mayor Beboy Benjamin's Scholarship grant, Governor Victor A. Tanco's Scholarship grant, Barangay Scholarship grants from Sangguniang Bayan of Dumarao, CHED Scholarship grants. Ten (10) new computer units were donated by Dumaraonon USA based in California, USA. Animal projects were also availed by the campus for use of DVM students. Teachers were hired to man the five curricular programs in the Dumarao Campus. Under the new leadership of University President, Dr. Editha L. Magallanes who succeeded Dr. Rochellir D. Dadivas who retired from government service in July 2008, the campus availed more funding assistance for its existence.

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
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CAPIZ STATE UNIVERSITY ORGANIZATIONAL STRUCTURE

Vision: CapSU is a credible and recognized leader in the pursuit of RDE

activities in the Visayas Region.

Mission: The University thru its RDE activities shall generate and extend

quality technical information, production and services in various discipline using appropriate approaches for sustained agro-

industrial development to improve the quality of life.

Goal: To actively support a sustainable agro-industrialization and

balanced socio-economic growth through technology generation and commercialization, continued capability building,

communication advocacy on market-driven innovations and

partnership with key sectors of development.

Core Values: The University's RDE programs, projects and activities shall be pursued by its qualified faculty and staff guided by such core values as Relevance, Excellence, Commitment, Advocacy and Participation (RECAP).

Objectives:

The University conducts RDE programs, projects and activities to achieve the following objectives:

- 1. To fulfill the mandate and commitment of the University to improve the quality of life in the service area through meaningful RDE activities.
- 2. To maximize, harness and utilize available human and material resources to produce relevant and quality output.
- 3. To accelerate and enhance material resource development, utilization, and commercialization.
- 4. To generate and verify resource-based and market-driven technologies through committed R&D activities.

- 5. To explore, develop and maintain various agro-environmental systems for sustainable development.
- 6. To assess economic and socio-educational system to optimize their use for development perspectives.
- 7. To package and disseminate generation/verified RD information for possible adaptation, utilization and commercialization.
- 8. To assist rural and urban households in coping with poverty-related problems through extension activities.
- To mobilize resources to activate the publication functions of the RDE Center.
- 10. To increase the involvement of the faculty members in RDE activities through the implementation of appropriate and acceptable rewards and incentive schemes.

- 2. Draw a detailed organizational structure in the middle management that would strengthen the RDE activities.

- 4. Enhance the role and activities of the Research and Extension Institute.
- 5. Establish a specific commodity assignment and their thrusts and priorities suited for each campus in the pursuit of their RDE programs and projects.
- 6. Continuously motivate the faculty and staff of the University to directly participate in the RDE endeavors of the University.
- 7. Conduct regular research symposium, in-house reviews, proposal making, conferences and other similar activities.
- 8. Initiate the immediate writing of the IPR Manual.
- 9. Conduct activities that would bring forth appreciation among the University's faculty and staff on RDE activities.

Major Accomplishments for CY 2009

Governance

The most important activities pursued during the year included the drafting of the several RDE policies that clarified problems including those in the middle management. The creation of research centers in the campuses augmented the R&D's output of the University. The drafting of the Intellectual Property Right (IPR) Manual guides the University in its efforts to secure patent, copyrights and the like in technology, invention, ideas, materials and others. The manual included several articles and sections which integrate products of research and extension into the total output of the University. RDEC spearheaded the conduct of rigorous routine R&D activities in the campus and University levels.

Human Resource Development

Considered indispensable in the research and extension programs and activities of the University, the human resource development constituted a major activity during the year. The RDEC formulated a Research and Extension continuing education for R&D managers, RDEC staff, research and extension chairs, faculty and staff. The ten campuses of the University were given trainings on how to identify their RDE thrusts and priorities and how to formulate and manage their respective campus RDE programs.






