

#### **Brief History**

Batas Pambansang Blg. 91, signed by Pres. Ferdinand E. Marcos on December 4, 1980, merged the Mambusao Agricultural and Technical College (MATEC) and the Capiz Agricultural and Fishery School (CAFS) to become the Panay State Polytechnic College (PSPC).

On August 29, 1981, Dr. Ernesto V. Botin took his oath of office as first PSPC president and was reappointed in 1986 by President Corazon C. Aquino and his term ended on July 24, 1993.

Dr. Anthony H. Navarrosa, the executive vice-president, served as OIC until the appointment of the second president, Dr. Rochellir D. Dadivas took effect on October 12, 1994.

On November 4, 1998 the Capiz Institute of Technology became an integral part of the system as approved in the 54th Regular Board Meeting held at the CHED Conference Room, San Miguel Avenue, Ortigas Center,

Pasig City; however, the official turnover was on October 25, 1999 while the Sigma College of Science and Technology was formally turned over on December 19, 2000.

On September 15, 2000, the Board of Trustees approved the new organizational structure of the College with three (3) existing units, namely: the Roxas City Unit, the Mambusao Unit and the Pontevedra Unit. Each unit was headed by a chancellor.

The Mambusao Unit has six (6) satellite campuses: the Burias Campus in Mambusao, Sapian Campus in Sapian, Tapaz Campus in Tapaz, Sigma Campus in Sigma, Dumarao Campus in Dumarao and Poblacion Mambusao Campus in Mambusao.

Pontevedra Unit has Pontevedra Campus in Pontevedra and Pilar Campus in Pilar while, the Roxas City Unit has the Roxas City Main Campus and the Dayao Campus.

Republic Act #9273 converted the Panay State Polytechnic College in the Province of Capiz into Capiz State University by President Gloria Macapagal Arroyo on March 21, 2004 at the Capiz Provincial Capitol, Roxas City, Capiz, Philippines.

On July 7, 2008, Dr. Editha L. Magallanes became the third president of the University and also the first lady president of the Capiz State University. In 2009, the chancellor positions of the three (3) units were abolished and each campus was headed by a campus administrator.

For its years of commitment to the challenges of education as the key factor in technological and rural development, the Capiz State University etablished a name in the field of tertiary education in the province of Capiz and the whole region of Western Visayas.

The Center for Administration of the University was in Roxas City Campus while the Center for Academic Affairs was in the Mambusao, Poblacion Campus.

Presently, Capiz State University has ten (10) sites strategically located in the first and second districts of Capiz. In the First District of Capiz are the Roxas City Main Campus, Dayao Campus, Pontevedra Campus and Pilar Campus while in the Second District are the Poblacion Mambusao Campus, Burias Campus, Sapian Campus, Dumarao Campus, Sigma Campus and Tapaz Campus.

The University primarily provides advanced instruction and professional training in agriculture, fishery and forestry, science and technology, arts and humanities, education and other related fields. It also undertakes research, extension, and production activities and provide progressive leadership in its areas of specialization.

The governing body of the University is the Board of Regents which shall be composed of the CHED Commissioner as the chairperson, the University President as vice chairperson, Chairperson of the committee on education, arts and culture of the Senate, Chairperson of the Committee on Higher and Technical Education, House of Representatives, Regional Directors of NEDA. DOST and DA, Presidents of the Federation of the University Student Council, Faculty Federation, Alumni Association and two (2) prominent citizens as members.







## FACULTY/STAFF DEVELOPMENT

To enhance the capability of the faculty and staff, the University sent the personnel to various seminars, trainings and workshops. For 2011, promotion and re-classification of the teaching and non-teaching personnel took place. Eight (8) non-teaching personnel were promoted; seventeen (17) for the teaching personnel; and only one (1) was promoted due to the creation of position.







he Extension Institute (EI) of the Capiz State University (CapSU) is mandated to lead the University's thrust of extension, one that seeks to constantly help improve the rural communities in many ways.

Established in the early 1980s in the early days of then Panay State Polytechnic College, the Extension Institute of what was to become Capiz State University (CapSU) has been designed in such a way that the local communities and their constituents where CapSU campuses are located directly benefit from the skills trainings and livelihood alternatives and similar other mechanisms extended by CapSU's technological experts and its partners.

CapSU's linkages with government agencies, non-government entities and other similar partnerships not only help provide financial support for projects but also supply the expertise needed to effectively carry out various programs that benefit the target clientele in these said communities.

Because it banners CapSU's community involvement and service, the Extension Institute does not only engage itself in the activities of the communities, but also covers responsibilities that have direct impact on the aspects of people's lives. It caters to the people from all walks of life—from the academe to barangay folks to women's groups to farmers and even to the members of the clergy.

And for the past year 2011, the Extension Institute has been involved in activities all designed to help alleviate poverty in rural communities, by extending its human resource services to the least fortunate, the marginalized and the underprivileged.

Working under the vision of its dynamic leader, CapSU President Editha Magallanes, and through the involvement of its personnel and the performance of each of the CapSU campuses across the province of Capiz, the Extension Institute led by Director Raul Ticar has performed more than what is expected, benefiting numerous groups and communities in and outside of Capiz.

#### Skills and Livelihood Trainings Conducted

Across the year, the Extension Institute based in Poblacion, Mambusao, Capiz has initiated the conduct of some 20 livelihood and skills trainings, benefiting numerous groups and communities from farmers organizations to students groups to barangay folks to local government officials—across the province.

In April and May, Navarra went to 11 barangays in Dao, Capiz to

lead the lecture and demonstration of the preparation of natural and organic foliar fertilizers and pesticides. In all, the Techno Gabay collaboration benefited some 305 farmers, 59 barangay officials, 37 housewives and 29 employees of the local government units (LGUs) in the barangays including barangay health workers, teachers and Civilian Volunteer Organization (CVO) officers.

Working hand in hand with the personnel of the Philippine Coconut Authority (PCA), the Extension Institute led two lecture training sessions on coconut toddy sugar production catering to different clienteles. On July 28, 2011, some eight personnel from the PCA led by Regional Coconut Development Officer Jose Cruz lent their services in the lecture training at the CapSU Extension Institute in Poblacion, Mambusao, Capiz. The capability building initiative was attended by 13 faculty members of CapSU Mambusao, six coconut farmer cooperators, 35 CapSU students, personnel of the CapSU Mambusao FITS Center and five Technology Services Specialists (TSS) representing the FITS centers of CapSU.

On March 15, 2011, 13 housewives of Cuartero, Capiz attended the skills lecture and training on pineapple processing led by Prof. Edna Glory, food technology specialist from CapSU Tapaz Campus.

On March 24, 2011, the Extension Institute led the training on tilapia and hito propagation and organic fertilizers preparation to some 60 farmers in barangay Carida, Tapaz, Capiz. The initiative led by Dr. Raul Ticar featured the fish raising lectures of Technology Services Specialist Ceferino Lizada and the organic practices seminars by University Extension Specialist Eduardo Navarra.

Then on October 28, 2011, this training was replicated by TSS Ulysses Bendicio of the President Roxas FITS Center in barangay Pondol of the said town. In coordination with Techno Gabay Team Leader Eduardo Navarra, the initiative benefited some 30 constituents of the barangay including housewives and farmers.

In September, some 25 farmers and homemakers in barangay Bilao, Sapian, Capiz were taught skills in how to prepare coco jam and coco candy for livelihood and business. Funded by Department of Science and Technology (DOST) based in CapSU Roxas Campus, the training was led by Dr. Ethelda Braña, home economics specialist of CapSU Burias Campus.

In December 2011, Extension Chairperson Edna Glory of CapSU Tapaz led the training on calamansi juice making to some 10 members of Tapaz LGU including barangay health workers, volunteers and casual employees. In the same month, some 20 members of the Agrarian Reform Beneficiaries Multipurpose Cooperative (ARB MPC) of Maninang, Sapian, Capiz joined the cooking lecture and demonstration of saging pinasugbo conducted by Prof. Nalyn Valzado of CapSU Mambusao's food technology department, assisted by food major Sheryl Dumlao of the same campus.

These activities featured the extension services of its resident personnel who generously shared their expertise in agriculture and livelihood alternatives. These engagements likewise involved the technical assistance of CapSU's partners with thrusts similar to the concerns of the university. Eduardo Navarra, who is also CapSU's Techno Gabay Team Leader for the Western Visayas Agriculture and Resources

Research and Development Consortium (WESVARRDEC), assisted the Dao Farmers Information and Technology Services (FITS) Center in promoting organic agriculture to its farmers and constituents.

#### Techno Gabay

The Techno Gabay (TG) of the Capiz State University has been very busy in 2011, conducting activities and helping implement programs that benefit the farmers and other clients, while being able to coordinate with fellow stakeholders and partners. The year's accomplishments consisted of numerous skills and livelihood trainings, documentation assistance to varied groups, attendance in capability building initiatives and coordination activities and representations.

#### Representation and Coordination Activities

For the period in review, Techno Gabay Team Leader Eduardo Navarra represented CapSU as partner member agency and initiated various coordination activities. On January 21, Techno Gabay Team Leader Eduardo Navarra met with the managers of the seven FITS Centers including the newly established in 2010. At the OPA Capiz FITS Center in Roxas City, Navarra, along with Regional Techno Gabay (RTG) Coordinator Anna Mae Relingo, briefed the participants on the Techno Pinoy program of WESVARRDEC and PCAARD. The PMA issued PCAARD materials to FITS Centers. Then on separate dates in February, Navarra visited and monitored the FITS Centers in his jurisdiction, particularly the Dumalag FITS Center and the Dao FITS Center. In various instances, and through text messages or mobile phone calls made with the FITS managers or personnel, Navarra updated and followed up their activities.

Then on March 23, CapSU again met with the FITS Center managers and personnel at the Dumalag FITS Center, Poblacion, Dumalag, Capiz. Six managers attended and some of them were joined by their Information Service Specialists or Technology Service Specialists (TSS). In Dumalag, Navarra stressed that the FITS centers' personnel must make use of their logbook to record all activities being done in their offices and stations. Navarra said that these will be the basis of collating and consolidating their accomplishment report at the end of each year. Participants were also briefed on the details on WESVARRDEC's upcoming Techno Gabay Summit and Technomart to be held in Iloilo City in May. In turn, the FITS managers updated the PMA on their plans, projects and activities.

In April, TG Team Leader Eduardo Navarra again led FITS Centers Visits and Monitoring, particularly Dao FITS Center where the organic agriculture promotion was widely bannered. The TG team also made coordination with all its FITS Centers for the first Regional Techno Gabay Summit and Technomart of WESVARRDEC. To facilitate the FITS Centers participation in the summit, TG TL Eduardo Navarra asked the managers to prepare their commodities

for exhibit at the summit while University Extension Associate Nino Manaog prepared the tarpaulins for display. Then, to prepare for the Regional Techno Gabay Summit and Technomart Meeting, Eduardo Navarra and Nino Manaog met with the WESVARRDEC RTG at the UP Visayas Kitchenette, Iloilo City. In the same day, Navarra joined the Public Consultative Meeting on the Selection of Nominees for National Organic Agriculture Board (NOAB) at the Hotel in Reclamation Area, Bacolod City. Taking part in this consultation served as exposure for the said personnel to collaborate with the national organic groups such as NOAB.

On May 25–26, the CapSU team joined fellow PMAs from the region to stage the first ever Regional Techno Gabay Summit and Technomart of the Western Visayas Agriculture and Resources Research and Development Consortium (WESVARRDEC) at the Amigo Plaza Mall, Iznart St. in Iloilo City. Led by Dr. Raul Ticar, and featuring the products of all seven FITS Centers from the province of Capiz, CapSU brought FITS Centers sample products and focus commodities including coco shell products, vermicast, abaca, engineered bamboo materials, etc. Then, the Dumalag FITS Center was conferred the Best FITS Center Award for the region in 2011.

Based on the citation, FITS Dumalag scored high in organization and management, delivery of FITS Services, maintenance of minimum requirements, and resource generation and linkage, four criteria announced by WESVARRDEC.

Led by ITS Manager Ronelyn De Tomas, the Dumalag FITS Center joined by its personnel including Magsasaka Siyentista Randy Fancubila and CapSU TG Team Leader Eduardo Navarra—received a plaque of recognition and cash prize from Dr. Arturo Argañosa, officer-in-charge of

Technology Outreach Promotion Division of the Philippine Council for Agriculture, Aquatic and Natural Resources Research and Development (PCAARD), UP Visayas Chancellor Minda Formacion, chair of the Regional Research and Development Coordinating Committee (RRDCC) and Director Joseph Edward Idemne of WESVARRDEC.

According to its 2010 Annual Report, the proactive leadership of Dumalag FITS Manager Ronelyn de Tomas fully supported by the staff and the dynamic involvement of Magsasaka Siyentista (MS) Randy Fancubila helped render varied technical and agricultural services to some 3,500 farmers for the past year.

Since October 2010, the activities of the Capiz State University (CapSU) Extension Institute have been featured on thecapsumonitor. blogspot.com, a web log mechanism incepted by University Extension Associate Nino Manaog. Since its inception, the blogsite has been promoting the activities of the Research, Development and Extension Center of the University.

In early 2010, articles about the TG efforts published on this website caught the eye of Marissa Tuazon, coordinator for Western Visayas of Pakisama, or Pambansang Kilusan ng Samahang Masasaka based in Mambusao, Capiz to partner with CapSU TG. Tuazon eventually met with Mr. Navarra and brought the Mambusao farmers groups

representing four barangays. Pakisama requested Navarra's technical assistance on organic farming practices, while Manaog agreed to assist them in documenting their activities. In April, University Extension Associate Nino Manaog joined the Pakisama's study tour of muscovado processing plants in Antique and had a feature story published on Panay News.

On July 14, 2011, the two groups facilitated the meeting of President Magallanes and Pakisama Operations Manager Felix Zamar at the President's Office, CapSU Central in Roxas City. The meeting allowed for the two key officials to work on future partnerships for the farmers and their target clientele.

In the succeeding months, TG TL Eduardo Navarra continued the visits to FITS centers and monitoring TG Team Leader and also attended important WESVARRDEC meetings. On September 6, CapSU also attended the 3rd Quarter Meeting Techno Gabay Group, West Visayas State University, Iloilo City. On September 16, CapSU joined the Dao FITS Center personnel and Dao LGU officials as they launched the Dao Farmers Day Celebration in Poblacion, Dao, Capiz. No less than MS Ramon Peñalosa, Jr. of OPA Negros Occidental FITS Center Navarra promoted organic farming technologies and activities in their municipality. During the program, Navarra introduced MS Ramon Peñalosa, Jr. to the farmers before his lecture proper, taking pride in the concerted efforts for the establishment of the said FITS Center. As regards coordination activities, the TG Team Leader facilitated the travel of RACG Coordinator Cora Navarra in her attendance to the WESVARRDEC meetings at the Northern Iloilo Polytechnic College in Estancia, Iloilo in September and at the Iloilo State College of Fisheries in Dingle, Iloilo in December.


#### **Documentation Activities**

On December 1, CapSU likewise covered the launching of the Bibal Integrated Farm and Tilapia Hatchery Training Center in barangay Magubilan, Panay, Capiz. The event was witnessed by Panay FITS Center personnel Director Larry Nacionales, LGU officials and Capiz local media. Along with other Capiz media, Manaog covered the launching event and featured former WESVARRDEC MS Rodolfo Bibal on Panay News.

Located at the middle of Bibal's farm, the training center can accommodate some 200 persons at one time. The area also has a central view of the farm production where Bibal's farming practices can be exhibited. In the near future, the center will also feature dormitory accommodations for farm tourists.

Bibal is one of the proprietors of a sprawling 7.5 hectares of land where he grows rice and vegetables and raises tilapia and sizably profits from them. In these areas, Bibal practices intercropping, planting banana, ginger, alugbati, papaya, kalamansi, ampalaya, pepper, eggplant and string beans to maximize whatever area is left available. Currently employing some 15 farmhands assigned to the fish ponds, vegetable plots and rice fields, Bibal's integrated farm is one profitable venture.

According to Juanito Hecita, Jr., manager of the Panay FITS Center, Mr. Rodolfo Bibal is likely to be identified as the official Magsasaka Siyentista (MS) for the FITS Center, once the selection for MS is in place.

On December 7–8, CapSU Extension Institute led by Dr. Raul Ticar joined the RTGP and RACG Joint 4th Quarter Meeting and Annual Report Writeshop in Aklan State University in Banga,

The team presented their TG annual accomplishment reports to WESVARRDEC and also collated FITS Centers' annual report documents needed for Annual Accomplishment Report.

Towards the end of the year, Nino Manaog helped the President Roxas FITS Center and the Panay FITS Center in gathering, sorting, writing and packaging their 2011 Accomplishment Reports. Manaog also facilitated the publication of the same output on the CapSU website and Panay News.

#### Agricultural and Technical Services

On April 25-29, under the Dao Organic Agriculture Program

(DOAP), CapSU worked with the Dao FITS Center. TG Team Leader Eduardo Navarra assisted in the conduct of organic lecture sessions to some 120 farmers from barangays Quinabcaban, Ilas Sur, Agtangway, Quinayuya.

In May, the concerted efforts for some 500 farmers coming from barangays Nasunugan, Centro, Daplas, Lacaron, Poblacion, Mapulang Bato, Bita, Aganan, Duyoc, Matagnop. Navarra helped the Dao FITS Center in conducting organic lecture sessions and also facilitated actual demonstration of IMOs and fertilizers preparations.

On June 28, 2011, Training Coordinator Eduardo Navarra of the Capiz State University (CapSU) Extension Institute led a training lecture on organic farming and vegetable production to some 20 farmers representing barangays Ondoy, Matnog, Sta. Cruz, Ilaya and Basiao, all of Ivisan town in Capiz. Held at the Ivisan Farmers Information and Technology Services (FITS) Center in Poblacion, Ivisan, Capiz, the livelihood training formed part of the two day Vegetable Production and Post-Harvest Handling Training led by

the Office of the Municipal Agriculturist (OMA) of Ivisan under the leadership of Municipal Agriculturist Letecia Andrada and Agricultural Technologist Giovannie Lawag. Among others, Eduardo Navarra briefed the participants on the disadvantages of commercial modern farming and stressed on the advantages of organic farming, stressing on how to best equip and protect the soil for quality production.

On July 14, 2011, Training Coordinator Eduardo Navarra and University Extension Associate Niño Manaog, joined the Pambansang Kilusan ng mga Samahang Magsasaka (Pakisama), a national nongovernment organization advancing rural improvement through farmers' empowerment, to conduct a livelihood skills training on organic farming and natural farming practices to some 20 farmers of barangay Pinay, Mambusao, Capiz at the Pinay Barangay Hall in Pinay, Mambusao, Capiz. Ms. Marissa Tuazon, Pakisama's provincial coordinator for Capiz, along with Mr. Navarra, led the members of Pinay Farmers Multipurpose Cooperative (PFMPC) in learning to prepare IMO concoctions which can be used as foliar fertilizers for their farms. After lectures on organic farming and preparation of IMO concoctions, Pinay Barangay Captain Bernardo Ponce and PFMPC

Working in groups, the farmers sourced the locally available materials from the barangay and took part in preparing Fermented Plant Juice, Fermented Fruit Juice (FFJ), Oriental Herbal Nutrient (OHN) and Fish Amino Acid (FAA).

Since January 2010, CapSU has been extending its consultancy services to Tumalalud National High School students on vermiculture. Eduardo Navarra coordinated with Loreli Legada, research adviser at the Mambusao National High School in barangay Tumalalud, Mambusao, Capiz on the conduct of her students' research on producing vermicast. Navarra facilitated the preparation and production of vermiculture for students' learning. Three undertook the project which later won as best regional award sponsored by DepEd in December.

In the first Regional Science and Technology Fair sponsored by the

Regional Office of the Department of Education (DepEd) October 15–16, 2011 in Iloilo City, the study titled "Growth of African Nightcrawlers and the Macronutrient Content and pH of Their Vermicompost Using Various Substrates" was named the Best

The award-winning study undertaken by Jayson I. Gula, Team Leader and Irene Francisco and Mark Stephen Guion, all fourth year students of Mambusao National High School in Tumalalud, Mambusao, Capiz bested all other eight entries from across Western Visayas. The young researchers were assisted by Ms. Loreli Legada, Research Adviser and Mr. Rolando Ricardo, Jr., school principal.

To empower farmers by way of advocacy—this was the essence of the assistance extended by selected personnel of the Capiz State University (CapSU) during the Advocacy Training and Planning Workshop led by the Plan International (Plan) in cooperation with the Philippine Partnership for the Development of Human Resources in Rural Areas (PhilDHRRA) held on August 1–3, 2011 at the Lawaan Garden Inn in Lawaan, Roxas City. The workshop convened some 20 participants composed of agricultural technicians and members of three farmer's organizations representing three towns of Capiz, namely: the Maayon Community-based Agricultural Development Organization (MCBADO); the United Men and Women for Agricultural and Fishery Development (UMWAD) Pilar; and the Pontevedra Fishers and Farmers Development Organization, Inc. (PFiFaDO). Plan and PhilDHRRA officers were assisted by CapSU personnel including Engr. Corazon Ditarro and Engr. Marty Delfin of CapSU Pontevedra's agricultural engineering department and Niño Manaog, university extension associate of CapSU's Research, Development and Extension Center (RDEC). And on August 25–26, CapSU joined the same farmers groups organized by Plan International, PHilDHRRA—MCBADO, UMWAD Pilar and PFiFaDO in their study tour of vermicomposting sites in Panit-an and Panay, Capiz. Navarra lectured on organics and promoted FITS Center modalities, WESVARRDEC & PCAARD.

On November 9, a Livelihood Training on Bangus Deboning was held in Quiajo Barangay Hall, President Roxas, Capiz. Through the efforts of the FITS Center personnel, Navarra met with Mayor Raymund Locsin and the barangay officials and women's groups and established contacts.

On October 28, 2011, TSS Ulysses Bendicio of the President Roxas FITS Center led the coconut toddy sugar production in barangay Pondol of the said town. In coordination with Techno Gabay Team Leader Eduardo Navarra, the initiative benefited some 30 constituents of the barangay including housewives and farmers.

To help rehabilitate the hilly agricultural lands in their municipality, the Farmers Information and Technology Services (FITS) Center based in President Roxas, Capiz hosted a two-day training cum study tour on Sloping Agricultural Land Technology (SALT) on November 15–16, 2011 at the President Roxas FITS Center in Poblacion, President Roxas, Capiz.

of Benito Labindao, Agriculturist II and Lilia Peñaranda, chief of the Regional Integrated Agricultural Research Center for Hillyland Development based in Malapad Cogon, Sigma, Capiz. Established in 1998, the Regional Integrated Agricultural Research Center for Hillyland Development is mandated by the Department of Agriculture Region 6 "to generate technologies suitable to the upland farmers and produce quality planting materials for them." On November 21–23, the CapSU TG Team leader Eduardo Navarra promoted FITS Center modalities and the advocacies of WESVARRDEC to some 50 farmers and agricultural workers during the Farmers Field School- Palaycheck Agro Ecosystems Analysis (AESA) of the Panay FITS Center in Poblacion, Tico, Tanza Sur, Panay Capiz. 
#### ENRICHING RURAL COMMUNITIES











#### SUMMARY OF GROSS INCOME OF IGPs BY CAMPUS
