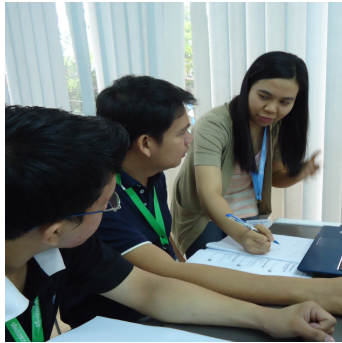

# HISTORY

THE CAPIZ STATE UNIVERSITY STARTED WITH THE MERGER OF MAMBUSAO AGRICULTURAL AND TECHNICAL COLLEGE (MATEC) IN BURIAS, MAMBUSAO AND THE CAPIZ AGRICULTURAL AND FISHERY SCHOOL (CAFS) IN BAILAN, PONTEVEDRA TO BECOME THE PANAY STATE POLYTECHNIC COLLEGE (PSPC) BY VIRTUE OF BATAS PAMBANSA BLG. 91 SIGNED BY PRESIDENT FERDINAND E. MARCOS ON DECEMBER 24, 1980.



■ THE MAN OF LABOR, AN ENDURING HERITAGE OF CAPIZ STATE UNIVERSITY

At the time of the merging of the two schools, MATEC (started June 22, 1958 by virtue of RA 2088, which has two existing satellite campuses located in Tapaz and Sapan) and CAFS (started June 21, 1957 by virtue of RA 1785 and 1786) were headed by Dr. Ernesto V. Botin and Dr. Wenceslao O. Sison Jr., as Superintendents, respectively. The seat of administration of PSPC was in Burias, Mambusao.

On August 29, 1981, Dr. Ernesto V. Botin took his oath of office as the first PSPC President and Dr. Wenceslao O. Sison Jr. became his Vice President. With the appointment of Dr. Sison as College President of Northern Iloilo Polytechnic State College, Dr. Anthony N. Navarra was appointed to take over his place as Vice President which was later upgraded to the position of Executive Vice President. The head of the campuses were called Deans.

In 1982, with the approval of the Board of Trustees, the Office of the College President added satellite campuses in the municipalities of Dumarao and Pilar. In 1986, President Corazon C. Aquino reappointed Dr. Botin as PSPC President. When

his term ended on July 24, 1993, Dr. Navarra, the Executive Vice President, served as Officer-in-Charge of the College until the appointment of Dr. Rochellir D. Dadvivas as the second PSPC President on October 12, 1994.

During the time of Dr. Dadvivas, he was assisted by Dr. Anthony N. Navarra, Executive Vice President; Dr. Editha L. Magallanes, Vice President for Academic Affairs; and Dr. Nicolas A. Braña, Vice President for Research, Development and Extension.

In accordance with the pertinent provisions of Republic Act 7722 (otherwise known as the Higher Education Act of 1994) and Republic Act 8992, on November 4, 1998, the Capiz Institute of Technology (founded 1917) in Roxas City, including its Department of Fisheries in Dayao (formerly Capiz School of Fisheries founded 1961), became an integral part of the PSPC system. This was approved in the 54th Regular Board Meeting held at the CHED Conference Room, San Miguel Avenue, Ortigas Center, Pasig City. However, the official turnover was done on October 25, 1999 by CHED Region VI-Western Visayas Director Tomas P. Parreño to PSPC President Dadvivas. Then, on December 19, 2000, Sigma College of Science and Technology (started January 1, 1996 by virtue of RA 7973) in Sigma, Capiz was integrated into PSPC.

In 1999, Cong. Manuel "Mar" A. Roxas of the 1st District of Capiz filed a bill seeking for the conversion of PSPC into a state university. Both the City Council of Roxas City and the Provincial Board of Capiz passed the resolution supporting the bill.

On September 15, 2000, the Board of Trustees approved the new organizational structure of the College with three (3) units, namely: the Roxas City Unit, the Mambusao Unit and the Pontevedra Unit. Each unit was headed by a Chancellor. The Mambusao Unit has six (6) satellite campuses: Burias Campus in Mambusao, Sapan Campus, Tapaz Campus, Sigma Campus, Mambusao Campus, and Dumarao Campus. The Pontevedra Unit has Pontevedra Campus and Pilar Campus; while the Roxas City Unit has Roxas City Campus and Dayao Campus. The first Chancellors were Dr. Nenita A. Beluso for Pontevedra Unit, Supt. Primitivo V. Bangcoyo for Roxas City Unit and Dr. Geronimo L. Gregorio for Mambusao Unit. The campuses were headed by Campus Administrators who report directly to the Chancellors.

In 2001, the seat of administration was transferred to Mambusao Campus for accessibility and ease

of communication. The second set of Chancellors were Dr. Edgar M. Dilla for Pontevedra Unit, Dr. Geneveva N. Labaniego for Mambusao Unit and Dr. Evaristo M. Magoncia for Roxas City Unit. With the retirement of Dr. Navarra in 2003, the position of Executive Vice President, being co-terminus, ceased to exist.

In March 2002 the bill for the conversion of PSPC into a state university was approved in the House of Representatives and the Senate approved the same measure on February 6, 2004. Cong. Rodriguez D. Dadvivas of the 1st Congressional District and Cong. Fredenil H. Castro of the 2nd Congressional District were responsible in lobbying for the passage of the conversion law.

Then, a milestone was reached on March 21, 2004, when President Gloria Macapagal-Arroyo signed into law Republic Act No. 9273 at Capiz Provincial Capitol, Roxas City converting PSPC into a state university, the Capiz State University. At the time of the conversion, the incumbent Governor of Capiz was Hon. Vicente B. Bermejo with Hon. Victor A. Tanco as Vice Governor. Following the provision of the University Charter, the seat of administration was transferred to Roxas City.

Dr. Rochellir D. Dadvivas, the incumbent PSPC President at the time of conversion became the first University President. The three Vice Presidents were Dr. Editha L. Magallanes, Vice President for Administration and Finance; Dr. Aladino L. Leccio, Vice President for Academic Affairs; and Dr. Geronimo L. Gregorio, Vice President for Research and Extension.

On July 7, 2008, after the retirement of Dr. Dadvivas as University President, Dr. Editha L. Magallanes was appointed as the second University President of Capiz State University. During the term of Dr. Magallanes, her Vice Presidents were Dr. Aladino L. Leccio for Administration and Finance, Dr. Herminia B. Gomez for Academic Affairs and Dr. Geronimo L. Gregorio for Research, Development and Extension (RDE).

Per Board of Regents' Resolution No. 1112, series of 2009, the chancellor positions were abolished in view of overlapping functions with the campus administrators.

With the retirement of Dr. Gregorio, Dr. Cora F. Navarra replaced him as Vice President-RDE effective November 7, 2012.

Having been rated Outstanding by the Evaluation and Search Committee towards the end of her first term as University President in June 2012, Dr. Editha L. Magallanes was re-appointed as President of Capiz State University on July 7, 2012.

On July 19, 2012 President Magallanes was recognized for her Outstanding Contribution to Education during the 3rd Asia's Best B-Schools Awards in Kitchener Road, Singapore. Then, on September 19, 2012, His Excellency President Benigno S. Aquino III awarded her as one of the Dangal ng Bayan for 2012 by the Civil Service Commission at Malacanang Palace, Manila in recognition of her adherence to the Eight (8) Norms of Conduct and Ethical Behavior in Government Service pursuant to Republic Act 6713 otherwise known as the Code of Conduct and Ethical Standards for Public Officials and Employees.

On September 25, 2012, President Magallanes became a recipient of the Exemplary Leader Award (Individual Category) along with Capiz State University (Institutional Category) awarded by the Asian Confederation of Businesses during the World Education Congress in Dubai, UAE. She was also chosen as Member of the World Education Congress based in India in 2012. She likewise received the Inspirational Leader Award during the World Education Congress Awards for Excellence in Education, Leadership and Teaching in Taj Lands End, Mumbai, India on June 19, 2013. On February 15, 2014 she became a recipient of the Women's Leadership Achievement Award by the World Women Congress in India.

With the retirement of Dr. Cora F. Navarra, Dr. Pedro Gavino became the Vice President for Research, Development and Extension on June 1, 2014.

On June 20, 2014, the Board of Regents approved the rationalization of the ten campuses provided in the CapSU Strategic Plan. Hence, there are three (3) major campuses, each headed by a Campus Administrator with seven (7) satellite colleges headed by satellite college directors. The Main Campus in Roxas City has Dayao for its Satellite College. The Pontevedra Campus has Pilar as its Satellite College. The Burias Campus shall have Mambusao, Sapan, Sigma, Dumarao and Tapaz as its satellite colleges.

On September 18, 2014, Dr. Editha C. Alfon was designated as the new Vice President for Academic Affairs in lieu of Dr. Herminia B. Gomez who retired from the service on September 17, 2014.

# EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

THE SCHOOL YEAR 2013-2014 MARKED CAPIZ STATE UNIVERSITY (CAPSU) WITH VARIOUS OPPORTUNITIES FOR REFLECTION ON ITS JOURNEY FROM ITS HUMBLE BEGINNINGS TO WHAT IT IS TODAY.

**S**upertyphoon Yolanda devastated almost all facilities in all campuses. Though hardly-hit, it did not cripple the highly spirited officials, faculty, staff and students of the University to accomplish its set-up goals. The ties with public-private partnerships gained impetus to spur the medical/infrastructure assistance that touched the lives of the students and helped them pursue education till graduation. This report tells the real-life stories of how the University overcame the effects of calamity and made a difference in the lives of mentors and students. The enrollment and graduates' trends indicated a momentum in its efforts to accomplish the vision, mission and goals of the University through its quadro-dimensional functions in instruction, research, extension and production.

**INSTRUCTION.** The three doctorate degree programs and four out of the seven master's degree programs are AACUP accredited. Of the 33 baccalaureate degree programs offered, 27 are accredited, two are newly offered while five are phased-out.

Of the 2,713 graduates for 2015, 12 were Magna Cum Laudes, 122 Cum Laudes, three (3) valedictorians, and three (3) salutatorians.

**RESEARCH.** The University completed numerous research studies in the social sciences, several research studies in the experimental field, and copyrights. There were research studies which won regional, national and international awards. Some international paper presenters were awarded best paper presenters in Indonesia, Thailand, Malaysia and Korea. These papers were published in the refereed journals. There were so many researches conducted by the faculty which have gained international awards during the year 2014.

**EXTENSION.** The University has undertaken public-private partnership in its extension services as well as develop linkages with the local and international agencies. Noteworthy are the livelihood skills trainings like welding, beauty care, woodworking, food processing, electrical installation, organic farming, building construction, values formation and many others, conducted in the remote areas of the province of Capiz. Community outreach programs were done by the University to the people of Roxas City as well as the province of Capiz.

**PRODUCTION.** To augment the income of the University, Income Generating Projects (IGPs) are ventured by the University through its printing press, fishponds, stall rentals, sugarcane and rice, among others.

# STUDENTS

## ◀◀ ENROLLMENT



The enrolment of the different campuses of Capiz State University by campus is reflected in Figure 1. As reflected, the huge enrolment of **4,981** was in Roxas City. This was followed by Pontevedra with **2,590**, Dayao with **1,335**, Burias (**1,308**), Sigma (**1,059**), Dumarao (**968**), Pilar (**918**), Poblacion Mambusao (**759**), Tapaz (**613**) and the lowest enrolment was by Sapian (**153**).

Of the 14,684 enrolment during the first semester, 592 belonged to the Advanced Education, 12,860 were enrolled under the Baccalaureate programs, 780 were registered in the Pre-Baccalaureate programs, while 452 were enrolled in the Laboratory High School.

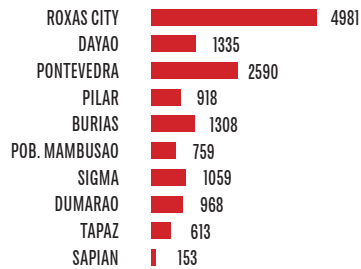


FIGURE 2. NUMBER OF ENROLLEES IN ADVANCED EDUCATION

In the Advanced Education, the highest registered number of enrolment was in the Doctor of Education (72). For the master's degree, 166 were enrolled in Master in Management major in Educational Management, followed by the Master of Arts (123), and the Master of Science (85), as shown in Figure 2.

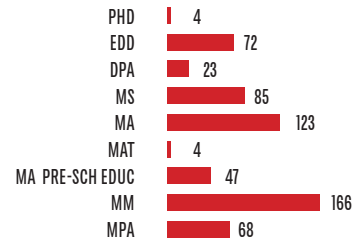


FIGURE 3. NUMBER OF ENROLLEES IN BACCALAUREATE PROGRAMS

For the Baccalaureate programs the Bachelor of Secondary Education had the highest number of enrollees of 2,052, followed by the Bachelor of Science in Business Administration (1,631), as displayed in Figure 3.

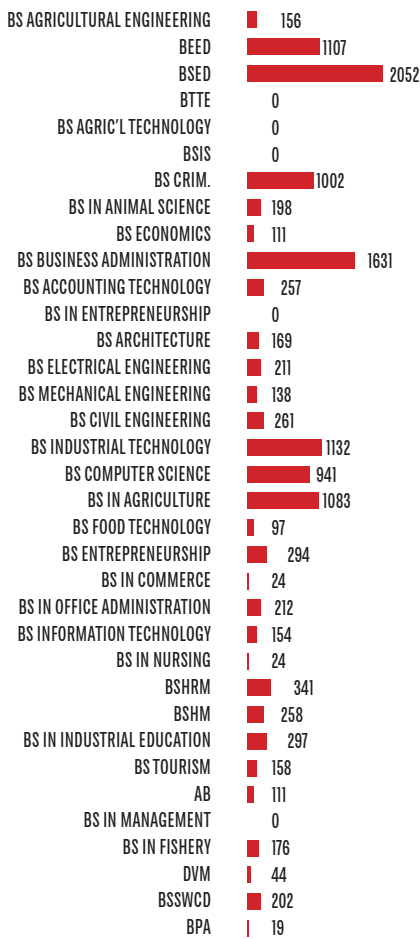
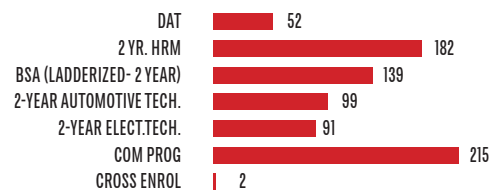


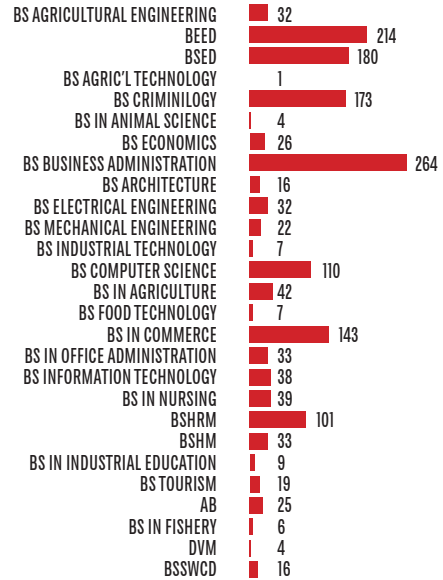
FIGURE 4. NUMBER OF ENROLLEES IN PRE-BACCALAUREATE PROGRAMS

In the Pre-Baccalaureate programs, the Computer Programming had the highest enrollees of 215, followed by the Two-Year Hotel and Restaurant Management (182), and the Two-Year Ladderized Agriculture (139), as shown in Figure 4.

FIGURE 1. NUMBER OF ENROLLEES BY CAMPUS

There were 2,713 graduates in all curricular programs during the Second Semester 2013-2014. Among the graduates, 12 were Magna Cum Laude, 122 were Cum Laude, 3 were Valedictorian and another 3 were Salutatorian. Displayed in Figure 5 were the graduates in the different Baccalaureate programs of the University as of April 2014.

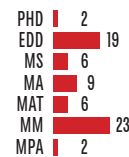
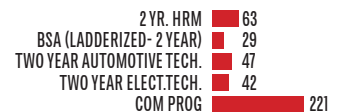


FIGURE 7. NUMBER OF GRADUATES IN PRE-BACCALAUREATE PROGRAMS

There were 402 graduates in the Pre-Baccalaureate programs. The Computer Programming has the highest number of graduates as reflected in Figure 7.

FIGURE 6. NUMBER OF GRADUATES IN ADVANCED EDUCATION

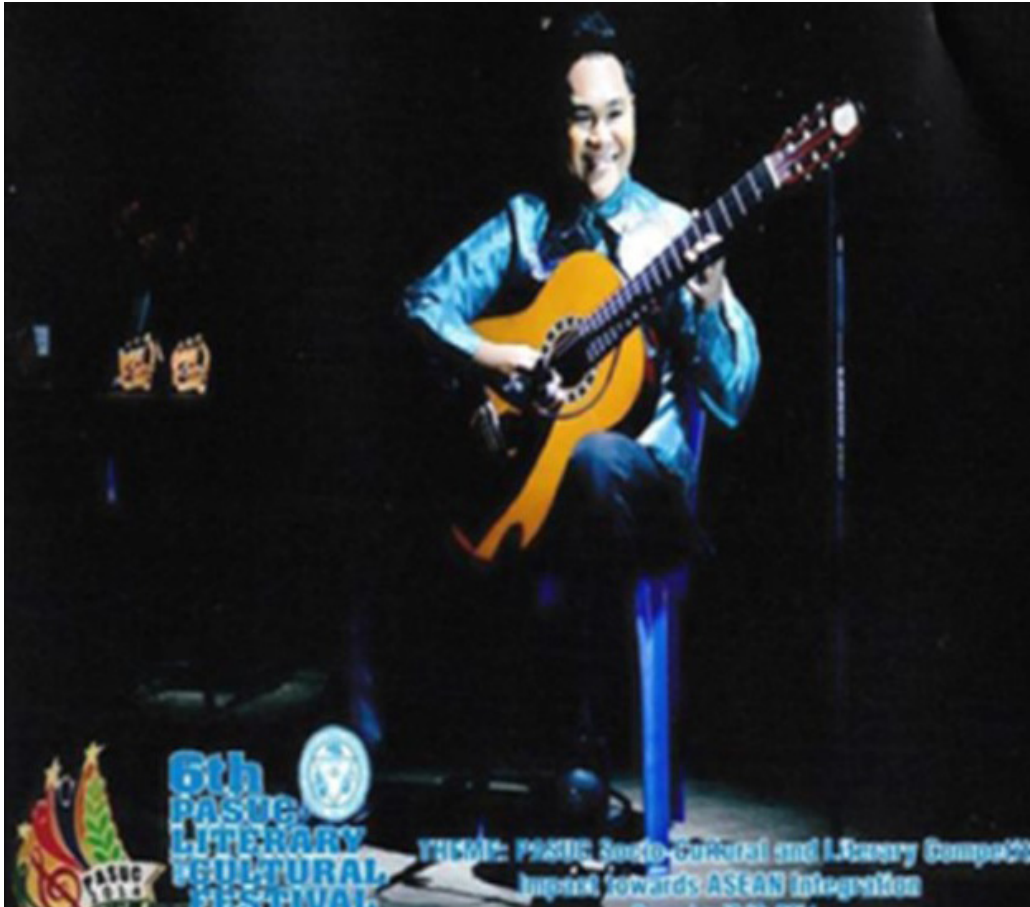

The University offers programs for doctorate, master's, and baccalaureate degrees. The three doctorate programs are AACUP-accredited, while of the seven master's degree programs, four are AACUP-accredited, the rest are newly offered.

Of the 33 baccalaureate degree programs offered, 27 are AACUP-accredited, two are newly offered while five are phased-out. The pre-baccalaureate courses are still in the process of registration with the TESDA.

The University maintains 500 laboratory high school students as mandated by the Board of Regents. Only Burias and Roxas City Main Campus are allowed to enrol 250 students each.

The College of Engineering invited the Technical Working Group (TWG) of OBE to assist the Roxas City Main Campus in the revision of course syllabi following the OBE format.

The University has to attune to the demands of the time. Several public forum were called by CHED for the revision of the curriculum following the OBE format and tailor fit for the K to 12 full implementation. The University is waiting for CHED to release the new Standards, Policies and Guidelines for OBE and K to 12 for the revision of all curricular programs.

# STUDENT SERVICES

The University through the student affairs office offers several student services to the students. **T**he oldest of these libraries is the Main Campus library, which was first organized in 1954, located in the Gabaldon Building, also the oldest existing building in the Main Campus, built during the Commonwealth Period, damaged during World War II, and reconstructed after the war.

The administration ensures that all students must have access to library services. Every year the library fees paid by the students are allotted to purchase books, subscription to newspapers, magazines, journals, and other publications needed by the students in the conduct of research. The library users: be it a faculty, student, or researcher from within or coming from other schools are recorded in the logbook. The library has a total collection of approximately 100,000 books.

Three librarians graduated Master in Library and Information Science (MLIS); one library staff also finished MLIS. Mrs. Marianne Esceleto, the designated supervising administrative officer for libraries, is pursuing her doctorate degree in education.

A Collection Development Policy is prepared to serve as a guide to those responsible for developing the collection.

This guides staff in making decisions about the selection, management, and preservation of library materials, and in allocating library budgets, and informs the public of the

principles that govern collection development of the library.

An index or list of the materials in the collection must be maintained. A catalog is a list, arranged by alphabet, by number, by title or by subject of books, maps, or other medium that comprises a collection. It is a list that records, describes and indexes the holdings of specific collection.

Preservation and conservation provides continuing access to library materials for as long as they are needed. To preserve and conserve the collection, library personnel and all library users must take responsibility for the proper care and handling of library materials.

The Library Committee acts as an advisory body in matters concerning the operation and maintenance of the Library. It reviews and recommends policies and procedures that will best serve the interest of both the library clientele/customers and the library.

In 2014 additional computers were purchased for the e-library services. Students are given access to internet services from 7 AM to 7 PM. The University has received donations from DOST for the Starbooks amounting to P1,670,000.00.

## 2014 EXTENSION STATISTICS

FOR 2014, MUCH HAS BEEN ACHIEVED BY THE CAPIZ STATE UNIVERSITY EXTENSION PROGRAM FOR ITS COMMUNITIES IN THE PROVINCE OF CAPIZ.

**S**eventy livelihood and skills trainings were conducted by the faculty and staff of Capiz State University (CapSU) to non-CapSU beneficiaries in the ten campuses across the province, which benefited 2,775 individuals, including out-of-school youth, barangay officials, barangay workers, farmers, fishers-folk, teachers, and even military personnel. October posted the month with the busiest schedule for the extensionists, with 15 activities, benefiting some 900 individuals—while the months of April and June had the lowest with no training registered.

After the devastation caused by Super typhoon Yolanda (International Name: Haiyan) in November 2013, CapSU—led by CapSU President Editha Magallanes—deemed it best to first restore the damaged

properties in its own campuses and then later reach out to the surrounding communities. In so doing, CapSU has not reinforced its reach to the communities through the varied extension programs currently in place. In its varied activities, it has also embarked on new partnerships and widened its participation.

Across the campuses of the province of Capiz, the extension personnel—led by the faculty and staff—worked hard with other stakeholders to effect more responsive and responsible engagement in the communities. Throughout the year, activities across the campuses served to help communities in rebuilding their properties and restoring their livelihood in the communities. All these contributed to the post-Yolanda rehabilitation efforts rendered by CapSU personnel in the province of Capiz.

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# POST-YOLANDA STRESS DEBRIEFING

## CAPSU FACULTY, STAFF CITE PERSONAL, PROFESSIONAL GAINS

**O**n Dec. 19–20, 2013, the Capiz State University Research, Development and Extension Center (RDEC) led the Stress Debriefing Training Workshop at the Roxas City Campus, in Roxas City. It featured Dr. Johnny Decatoria of Bacolod assisted by Ms. Gina Ferrer-Castro, Social Worker III of Bacolod City.

JP Lota Santiago of CapSU Sigma said the training served as refresher course for her. She noted that it only affirmed her knowledge on handling psychological first aid, or trauma healing, noting the step-by-step approach of stress debriefing. It also served to empower the personnel who must be able to help the victims cope with the shock and the aftermath of the tragedy. She said she is excited to apply her learning to her clients.

For her part, Dr. Leah Abella, faculty of Dumarao Campus echoed significant learning from the workshop. Abella saw the need to help the victims to cope with the shock or trauma caused by the tragedy. For Abella, it is not correct that [you] ignore what the victims are feeling or thinking or saying or even doing. She said that “the more the victims are able to ventilate their feelings to others, the more that they will be able to cope with it and move on.”

Based in the hilly area of Dumarao, Abella herself claimed how she had a near-death experience when Supertyphoon Yolanda struck. She said she had been stressed that she herself thought she needed to talk about her harrowing experience. She volunteered to narrate her experiences during the workshop proper. Abella likewise noted that those who will process the traumatized need to address one tragedy at a time so that healing can happen.

Mr. Gerard Lee Atienza, English teacher at Burias Campus, had to say that everyone

should be strong enough, or formidable, during times of tragedies like Yolanda. There is also the need for one to open up to others, so that he or she will be able to move on. After the workshop, Atienza personally asked his students regarding their Yolanda experiences. But he is happy to note that most if not all of their students were back to school when classes resumed in the first week of December, as if “parang walang nangyari (as if nothing happened).” Nevertheless, he also saw the need to conduct their own stress debriefing sessions with the students anytime soon.

Ms. Lorna Villaruz, nurse at the Dayao Campus, said that it is good that they were taught the step-by-step process in stress debriefing.

The workshop gave her an idea on “how we can be of help to our community, especially in times of calamities in which people get depressed after they have experienced the loss of their loved ones, properties and their livelihood.

Villaruz notes that by giving the victims opportunities to open up and share their experiences to those who empathize with them, their pains and fears are eased away bit by bit, and their anxieties alleviated.

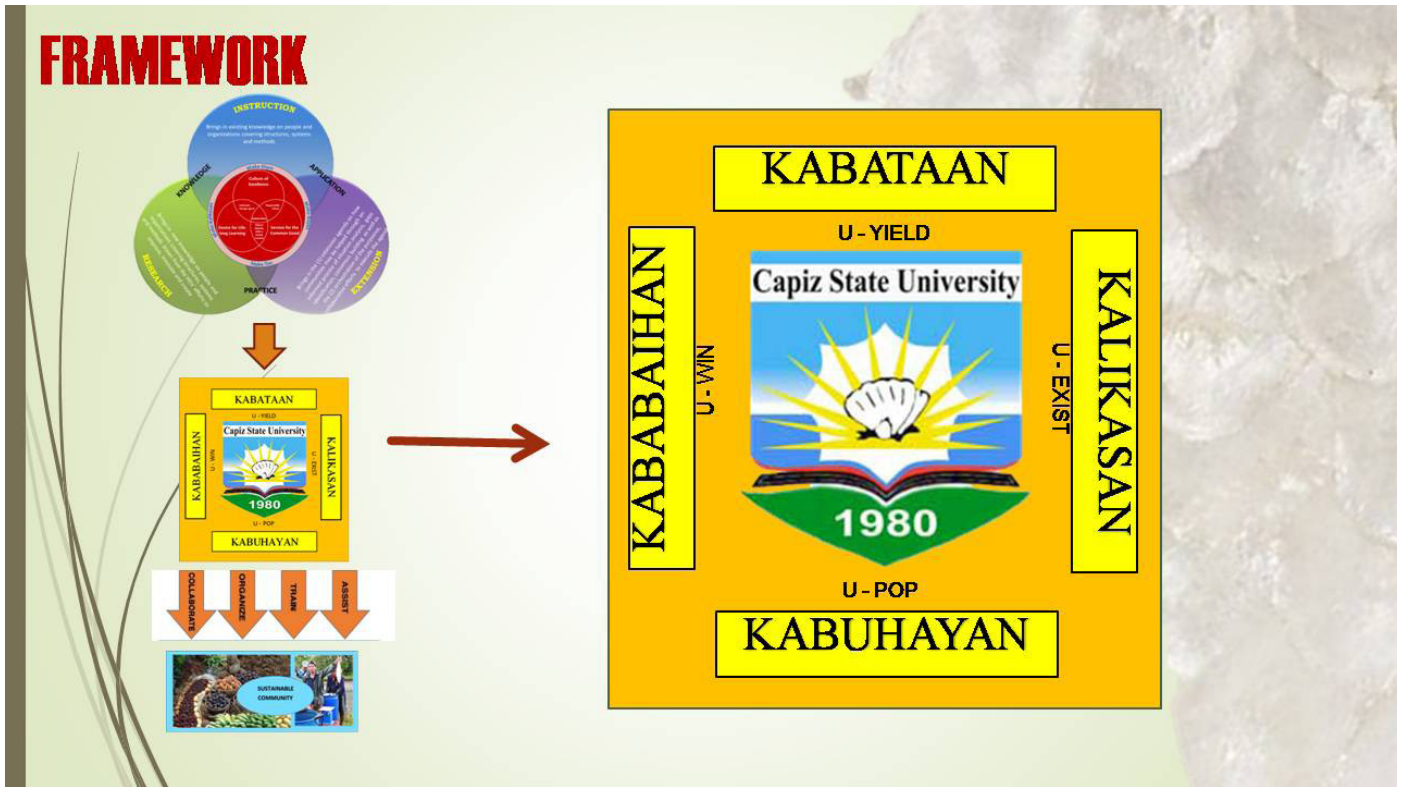
Stress debriefing is also good because the process allows victims to share their experiences which caused the trauma, while being able to provide avenues that allow them to recover and rebuild their homes and, most importantly, restore themselves to life.

**4K FRAMEWORK**

IN THE FIRST SIX MONTHS OF 2014, THE CAPSU RDE WAS IN TRANSITION IN TERMS OF LEADERSHIP—FROM THAT OF VP FOR RDE CORA NAVARRA, WHO WAS BEEN ILL SINCE THE LAST PART OF 2013, TO DR. PEDRO GAVINO, FORMER UBAO DIRECTOR, WHO WAS FORMALLY DESIGNATED IN APRIL.

Part of the legacy of Navarra’s leadership is the 4K or the Kabataan, Kababaihan, Kabuhayan at Kalikasan, the university’s extension agenda conceptualized since Navarra assumed leadership in 2012.

Under Dr. Emelita Solante, designated Extension director before and during the transition period, CapSU’s 4K was formally presented during Solante’s graduation in REAP (Re-Entry Action Plan), an executive course granted to key officials of the state university and colleges (SUCs) by the Commission on Higher Education (CHED) and the Development Academy of the Philippines (DAP).

Assisted by University Extension Associate

Niño Manaog, Solante packaged the 4K so as to accommodate the advocacies originally considered by Navarra’s leadership.

First, University toward Youth’s Intellectual, Education and Leadership Development Program, or U-YIELD, is designed as alternative learning systems for Out-of-School Youth, supported by students enrolled in the University, YIELD activities will teach skills to these OSYs not only to boost their morale and improve their health and well-being but most important provide livelihood for them, their families and their communities.

Second, University and Women toward Nation Building, or U-WIN seeks to benefit mostly women in the pilot community via livelihood and skills trainings and other capability-

building activities that will help them provide food, shelter and well-being for their family and their community.

Third, University’s Environment Intervention Strategies, or U-EXIST emphasizes on regreening the community soil, enriching the marine resources and restoring the value for the environment. Its activities will seek to push the pilot community residents to commit to environment-friendly practices.

And last, University’s People Outreach Program, or U-POP emphasizes the enhancement of peoples’ skills which will enable them to provide livelihood and well being for their families and their communities. It will likewise promote the spirit of volunteerism in the modern age.

**As CapSU’s Extension Agenda, 4K aims to consolidate all the efforts in extension of the faculty and staff of the CapSU campuses across the Province of Capiz. To do this, 4K will allow for the categorization of the extension activities according to the sector that it benefits, namely: youth, women, livelihood and environment.**

## CAPSU TRAINS SDCA PERSONNEL ON OYSTER MUSHROOM PRODUCTION

**O**n May 19-20, 2014, Dr. Emelita Solante, director of the Extension Institute of the Capiz State University (CapSU) and training-in-charge of CapSU's Mushroom Production project shared her expertise to four participants from the St. Dominic College of Asia (SDCA) at the Mushroom Training Center (MTC) here.

For two days, Solante taught mushroom culture to Dr. Nilda Balsicas, vice-president for academic affairs and research; Dr. Zenaida Sadiwa, community development officer; Mr. Gydion Nicolie Batuigas, OIC-program chair for nursing; and Mr. Nelson Capagngan, farm manager, all of SDCA.

Participants benefited much owing to their interest and enthusiasm to learn. After lecturing on the basic concepts involved in mushroom culture, Solante taught the participants hands-on on the different stages involved in oyster mushroom production.

First, they were taught the preparation of pure mushroom culture which includes the preparation of pure culture media; preparation of grain spawn or mother spawn; and preparation of fruiting bags which covers the mixing of substrates, composting, bagging, pasteurizing, inoculating and incubating.

According to Solante, pasteurization kills harmful microorganisms, which usually takes six hours; inoculation allows the grain spawn to be added to the pasteurized fruiting bag. Incubation, also called spawn run, then, allows the substrate to be "colonized" by the micro-organism, which usually takes not less than 45 days.

Solante also taught them on mushroom growing practices. Among other practices, Solante stressed that the mushroom grower should practice cleanliness in each of the processes involved. From the preparation of the culture media where the mushrooms will be grown up to the fruiting stage, the grower must see to it that the entire growing area is free of possible contaminants.

The training drew favorable responses. For one, Dr. Balsicas noted the nitty-gritty of the processes involved in mushroom production, citing how trial and error in their hands-on activities made them learn it best. For her part, Dr. Sadiwa found the inoculation procedure to be very meticulous even as she recognized its importance in the production.

IN OCTOBER, CAPSU HAS SIGNED A MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING (MOU) WITH THE SOROSORO IBABA DEVELOPMENT COOPERATIVE (SIDC), A DULY REGISTERED COOPERATIVE UNDER THE COOPERATIVE DEVELOPMENT AUTHORITY WHICH WILL ASSIST THE UNIVERSITY IN MAKING USE OF ITS AVAILABLE RESOURCES FOR PRODUCTIVITY.

Said MOU provides for three program components, namely: the Phase I: Module Development; Phase 2: Joint Venture Project on Second Generation Gilt Production; and Phase III: Hog Production Community Rollout Project. The agreement was formally signed by CapSU President Editha L. Magallanes and Dr. Angelito Bagui, SIDC chairman, as witnessed by Dr. David King, SIDC consultant and Dr. Pedro Gavino, vice-president for research and extension.

# DENR FUNDS CLONAL NURSERY, QPM FOR CAPSU BURIAS

THE CAPIZ STATE UNIVERSITY (CAPSU) WILL ESTABLISH A CLONAL NURSERY AND FACILITATE THE PRODUCTION OF QUALITY PLANTING MATERIALS (QPM) OF PREMIUM AND INDIGENOUS FOREST SPECIES IN ITS BURIAS CAMPUS. CAPSU HAS BEEN THE RECIPIENT OF THE 3.5 MILLION PESOS GRANT THROUGH THE DEPARTMENT OF ENVIRONMENT AND NATURAL RESOURCES (DENR) PER THE NATIONAL GREENING PROGRAM AND THE 2013 GENERAL APPROPRIATIONS ACT (REPUBLIC ACT NO. 10352).



In a Memorandum of Agreement signed by both institutions in December 2013, DENR will not only provide financial support to CapSU. In particular, it will assist the university in seed sourcing, collection, processing, and storage. And aside from helping CapSU in species selection, nursery operation and determination of number and species of seedlings, DENR will also monitor and evaluate the progress of the project.

CapSU Burias will manage the funds for the establishment of the clonal nursery and related facilities and complete such within a year from the release of the 15% mobilization fund; propose areas needed for the establishment of clonal facilities; produce 60,000 quality seedlings of premium and indigenous species; and provide the DENR with an accounting report on the use and disbursement of the fund.

The CapSU personnel identified to manage this project are Prof. James Gloria, chairperson; For. Felizardo Gimoto, assistant chairperson. Gloria and Gimoto will work with Engr. Russell Andaya, Engr. Ronnie Balacase, Mr. Gregorio Lopez and Mr. Wilfredo Ledesma, all members. To prepare for the best implementation of this project, said CapSU personnel attended and were already engaged in a number of activities related to the project.

On January 9-10, 2014, foresters James Gloria and Felizardo Gimoto, along with

Foremost, CapSU President Editha Magallanes encouraged the participants to take stock of the opportunities given to the University, which include the facilities and/or equipment donated by the national government agencies (NGAs) like the Department of Science and Technology and Department of Agriculture, among others.

The lecture workshop featured the transfer of Prof. Marife Hilapad, who recently completed her graduate studies in food technology from the Visayas State University. Hilapad lectured on methodology in food research and product development.

Gathering some 40 chairpersons, coordinators and staff for research, production and extension from across the CapSU campuses around Capiz, the said

capability-building initiative also sought to equip food product researchers with added tools focused on food research & development.

And to give the CapSU researchers and production managers the firsthand view on new food product equipment, RDEC led the participants to tour the facilities of the Fish Processing Center acquired by CapSU now based at the Roxas City Dayao Campus. Dr. Edna Nava, project in-charge, hosted the touring of delegation.

According to Dr. Guillermo Legada, Jr., CapSU research director, the capability-building also sought to harmonize their plans for specific products to be developed by each of the campuses.

Prof. Jocelyn Magallanes, research chair of

CapSU Sigma, found the donated equipment advanced, which will help much in the packaging the products. In particular, Magallanes found the Center's vacuum packing impressive in prolonging the shelf-life of the food products.

For her part, Prof. Nalyn Valzado, extension chair of CapSU Poblacion Mambusao, had to say that she was impressed by the provision of facilities in Dayao. Dr. Evelyn Borbonia, research chair of CapSU Pilar, found that the Dayao facilities can help their processing of silag tocino. Dr. Vivian Alejaga, research chair of CapSU Roxas City Dayao Campus, also said that the facilities will help improve the food products they have been developing. Prof. Candelaria Arro, research chair of CapSU Sapián, said that they are exploring the possibility of producing flour made from green mussel, modelled after milkfish flour produced in Dayao Campus.

**J**AMINDAN, CAPIZ—In response to the request by the 3rd Infantry (Spearhead) Division (3ID) of the Philippine Army based in Camp Macario Peralta Jr. here, the Capiz State University (CapSU)'s Research, Development and Extension (RDE) Office fielded its agriculture experts to conduct a lecture demonstration on integrated farming practices to military personnel and their dependents on Dec. 2-3, 2014.

For two days, Prof. Ramonita Caralde, agriculture instructor at the CapSU Buriás Campus and Mr. Ceferino Lizada, agricultural technician II of the Extension Institute, lectured on integrated farming practices to some 40 military personnel including their wives based in Camp Peralta. In their lectures and insights, Caralde and Lizada, stressed on the advantages of organic agriculture and other similar practices.

In particular, participants worked in groups to prepare foliar fertilizers—including fish amino acid, fermented fruit juice, fermented plant juice, and calcium phosphate—using materials sourced out from their own locations.

On the second day, after being taught the basics in vermicomposting, land preparation and planting and other related practices, soldiers and their dependents planted vegetables (pechay) on the plots that they also prepared.

According to Lieutenant Col. Isidro Purisima, 3ID's chief of staff, they sought the help of CapSU because they believed that its experts are the most qualified to help them maximize their natural resources to advocate organic farming and production. 3ID also seeks to provide food for themselves even as it also promises prospects for livelihood for their community.

Foremost, Purisima stressed that part of their advocacy is encouraging their own personnel to maximize the use of available lands from which they can also get their own food. Camp Peralta has a land area of 33,000 hectares, with a cantonment (operations) area of only 500 hectares. For this project to succeed, Purisima noted, it is best that the soldiers have a sense of ownership of the project they are involved with. He added that the initiative also sought to only "jumpstart" and allow for a bigger and more expansive partnership with the University.

FOR ONE DAY, THE FOOD EXPO ALLOWED THE CAPSU FACULTY RESEARCHERS TO DISPLAY A WIDE ARRAY OF THEIR FOOD PRODUCTS INCLUDING DELICACIES, CONDIMENTS, PASTRIES AND ICE CREAM.

Led by CapSU President Editha Magallanes, who is herself a nutrition scholar and enthusiast, the food expo also allowed the exhibitors to conduct food surveys for their respective food products and technologies. Walk-in visitors were asked to taste and sample their delicacies and products.

Among others, CapSU Burias Campus featured three delicacies, namely: Salmaco, a homemade ice cream made from saluyot malunggay and coconut; mushnut, a macaroon made from mushroom and coconut; and dried coconut (bukayo). All three were presented by Prof. Edna Navarra,

Prof. Elnor Briones and Prof. Marjorie Licatan, all of CapSU Burias Campus.

CapSU Sapián Satellite College offered a single food technology, namely: barquillos (apa) made from green mussels (tahong), produced in two varieties. The first variety used 50% flour and 50% tahong meat flour; while the second used 75% tahong meat flour. It was presented by Prof. Candelaria Arro, Prof. Maddy Gallardo and Prof. Arlene Tamayo, all of CapSU Sapián SC.

The CapSU Pontevedra campus showcased a variety of foods, including spicy bagongon, lumpiang bangus (milkfish), bolabolang bangus (milkfish meatballs) and crispy

toway. Meat contents in these products came in different concentrations. All food products were presented by Dr. Salvacion Degala, Extension Chair, Mrs. Elisa Delmindo and Research Chair, Dr. Jocelyn Dagudag and supported by their staff Mark Borines and Mr. Jay Martin Biclar.

Ms. Jennifer Perez Benlro of CapSU Pilar assisted in the distribution of relief goods including food and non-food items shelter tents and hygiene kits, benefiting thousands of beneficiaries in and outside the Municipality.

During the days when electricity was not yet restored to Yolanda-stricken areas, Benlro led skills training sessions on recycled candle-making—paperbag-making, hair-tying and making beadwork—to selected barangays of Pilar. Said activity was fully supported by almost 300 NSTP student of the campus.

Toward the end of the year, the program was awarded Best in PowerPoint Presentation in the Search for Best Research-based Extension Services held during the first-ever International Conference hosted by the Philippine Association of Extension Program Implementers, Inc. ## PILAR

For extension projects proposals, CapSU Sigma proposed livelihood and Extension trainings on meat processing and preservation, computer literacy for barangay officials, auto & electrical, food safety and hygiene and industrial housekeeping—all presented during its Research and Extension In-house Review.

From September 2014 to date, CapSU Sigma Satellite College has been training 120 individuals—including farmers, Out-of-school youth, housewives, barangay officials and professionals on driving/auto-electrical servicing, meat processing and preservation, computer literacy and basic food safety hygiene and sanitation.

CapSU Sigma also developed IEC Materials which supplemented their trainings and extension activities. Techno Guide on Food Preparation and Services by Prof. Susan Panes and Prof. Emelda Bacalangco; Techno Guide in Making Wonderful Products of Acrylic Beads by Prof. Roselyn Cabantud and Primer on Meat

### SIGMAHANON PROGRAM

The Capiz State University (CapSU) Sigma's SIGMAHANANON Program, which was conceptualized in the tradition of Pilar's SAVE program was formally launched in September—led by Prof. Ginalyn Obien who

authored the program and supported by Dr. Annalie Campos, college director.

Signed between CapSU and the local government units of the beneficiary barangays, the Memorandum of Agreement provides for the benefit Sigma housewives and out-of-school youth initially in selected barangays near the campus—Mangoso, Bangonbangon, Guintas and Poblacion Sur,

among others.

Even months before its launch, Sigma beneficiaries have already enjoyed the free lecture demos on driving, basic building and wiring installation and auto-electrical servicing (for men) and garments, novelty and clothes technology (for women). Moreover, household women in these communities have also been taught on meat processing and food technologies like homemade-style sardines, tocino and ice cream.

Furthermore, barangay folk and household women—including a significant number of unemployed and out-of-school youth—attended a series of lectures on climate change, teenage sexual behavior and common summer diseases. In some eleven skills training and Extension initiatives actually conducted under the program, the campus benefited more than 200 participants in selected barangays of Sigma, Capiz.

And in the recent extension summit sponsored by the Philippine Association of State Colleges and Universities (PASUC) held in Iloilo City for 2014, the program won first runner-up for the Livelihood and Entrepreneurship category from all the entries among the region. A certificate of merit and a cash award were received by Prof Ginalyn Obien of CapSU Sigma Satellite College.

## ROXAS CITY

### MOBILE TECHNOLOGY SCHOOL (MTS)

ONE OF THE CORE EXTENSION PROJECTS OF THE CAPIZ STATE UNIVERSITY IMPLEMENTED BY THE FACULTY OF THE ROXAS CITY CAMPUS, MOBILE TECHNOLOGY SCHOOL GIVES FREE SKILLS TRAININGS IN WELDING AND BEAUTY CARE TO THE LESS PRIVILEGED OUT-OF-SCHOOL YOUTHS AND UNEMPLOYED ADULTS.

A joint project of CapSU, Capiz provincial government, Technological Education Skills and Development Authority (TESDA), and the Department of Labor and Employment, MTS aims to improve the livelihood opportunities of selected municipalities in the province of Capiz and barangays in Roxas City.

Since its beginnings in 2007, MTS has graduated some 329 welders; 336 beauty care specialists. MTS has also produced 29 in consumer electronic services—particularly cellphone repair; 22 in furniture and cabinet making; and 23 in meat processing; 29 in food technology; 26 in electrical installations; 30 in refrigeration and air-conditioning; and 32 in motorcycle servicing. Of this total number of MTS graduates, some 85 percent have been employed as of 2013—gaining jobs here and abroad.

In 2011, CapSU facilitated the release of some 100 welding kits to MTS graduates in five Capiz towns—Sigma, Panitan, Sigma, Mambusao and Panay—and Bgy. Talon in Roxas City. In 2013, MTS started their trainings in motorcycle servicing to some 32 OSYs and dressmaking to some 126 household women and OSYs in Panay town. In 2014, MTS facilitated the release of 44 welding kits for graduates in Panay, Capiz and 32 welding kits for graduates in Lanot, Roxas City; and 17 beauty care kits for graduates in Bgy. Tiza, Roxas City.

## BURIAS

### COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT EXTENSION PROJECT (CDEP)

The Extension Department of CapSU Burias Campus delivered a number of accomplishments for 2014. After identifying Burias, Mambusao, Capiz as its pilot barangay for its Community Development Extension Project (CDEP), Dr. Raul Ticar, extension chairperson, submitted proposals to the campus administration for approval and coordinated with local stakeholders, namely: the coordinators of the different Colleges and the Brgy Council of Burias.

CapSU Burias also led the needs assessment survey and facilitated the election of farmer officers in the different sitios of Burias, namely: Agbukayo, Agkawayan, Agkaningay, Aliwas, Cabugao and CapSU proper. Then on August 11, 2014, it facilitated the induction of Sitio officers, ALS and Federation officers involved in CDEP. The program was formally launched through the Signing of the memorandum of agreement and launching of CDEP projects on Sept. 9, 2014, in partnership and collaboration with the barangay council members of Burias, LGU of Mambusao and CapSU Burias as the partner agency.

Beginning 2014, CDEP led a variety of

trainings to beneficiaries at the Burias Barangay Hall in Burias, Mambusao, Capiz. On October 1, Dr. Raul Ticar, Prof. Marjorie Licatan and Prof. Wilfredo Abogadie led the training on hog-raising intended for farmers, housewives, entrepreneurs, government workers. On November 11, extension coordinators and the faculty of the College of Business Administration also taught cooperative formation to farmers, housewives, entrepreneurs and government workers. On November 21, the same group launched and successfully carried out YES for Children Training Program especially for daycare children, Alternative Learning Systems members and Out-of-school Youth. Then, on December 17-18, Dr. Emelita Solante of the Mushroom Training Center conducted a Mushroom Development Training Production for farmers, CDEP officers, housewives and entrepreneurs.

And to benefit more residents in its identified pilot barangay, CDEP has proposed trainings on organic vegetable production, native chicken production, orchard asexual propagation, para-veterinarian technical and consultancy services and literacy trainings, among others.

## UNIVERSITY AGRO-INDUSTRIAL BUSINESS VENTURES

The University has ventured on some Agro-Industrial business ventures to augment the income of the University. By unfortunate chance due to Supertyphoon Yolanda almost all of the income generating projects of the University were severely damaged. The University could not do anything about the wrath of nature. The rice and cropland IGP were affected so much that the produce during the cropping season could not even suffice the amount for seedlings.

Fishponds were also affected so much because of heavy rains and the strong winds that destroyed many structures in the areas. The harvest for the period was not even enough for the initial capital. The piggery project was also affected because the roofings were tattered into pieces and blown away by the strong winds. Piglets that were about to be disposed were under stress and got sickly. The sugar plantation was also damaged because the wind flattened the healthy sugar plantation. The roofings, walls, tables and chairs of the canteens were also damaged when hit by the 250km per hour winds of Haiyan. The coconut plantation particularly in the upland were

left without leaves. It may take years for it to recover. Key officials of the University were so saddened with what happened to the income generating projects of the University.

Some of the businesses were just break-even, others losing, while there are those that are also gaining. There are campuses whose mandate is agriculture and fishery. The land area intended for fishponds and croplands are used both for instructional and income generating purposes. The Burias and Pontevedra campuses and the Dayao Satellite College were recipients of assistance from other government agencies like the Department of Agriculture (DA), National Economic and Development Authority (NEDA) Department of Science and Technology (DOST) in Region VI and the Commission on Higher Education (CHED) Central Office.

A training center as well as its laboratory equipment was put up in the Dayao Satellite College using the financial assistance coming from the DOST. DOST has also extended financial assistance to the Main Campus' Agro-industrial Technology Center to purchase the equipment needed. Below is the table showing the income-generating projects of the University in 2014.

## THE BOARD OF REGENTS

The governing body of the University is the Board of Regents (BOR) composed of the Chairperson and 14 members. In 2014 the CHED Commissioner Regent Maria Cynthia Rose Bautista is designated as the Chairperson of CapSU BOR. Regent Editha L. Magallanes, CapSU President is the Vice-Chair, and the members are: Regent Pia S. Cayetano, Chair, Committee on Education, Arts and Culture; Regent Roman Romulo, Chair Committee on Higher and Technical Education; Regent Ro-Ann A. Bacal, NEDA VI Regional Director; Regent Rowen Gelonga, DOST VI, Regional Director; Regent Larry P. Nacionales, DA VI, Regional Director; Regent John King Layos, SSG Federation President; Regent Roberto Tumlos, Faculty Federation President; Regent Herminia B. Gomez, Alumni Federation President; and Mr. Raymund A. Marte, Board Secretary The BOR meet once every quarter but can call for emergency board meeting if needed. ## PLANNING AND DEVELOPMENT

The University was able to gather its key officials, LGU officials and their representatives and stakeholders coming from the different sectors to consolidate and finalize the Strategic Plan of the University during Summer 2014 held at the training center of Dayao Satellite College. The revised Strategic Plan (2014-2023) was submitted to the Administrative Council and was approved by the BOR on June 20, 2014 subject for critique of NEDA Region 6. The Strategic plan was cascaded to all campuses and became the basis for the Annual Operational Plan for 2015.

The Action Plan and Project (APP) is already incorporated in the Strategic Plan. The University President has completed the executive course on Educational Management and Leadership with the Development Academy of the Philippines (DAP) and the CHED in collaboration with the PASUC. Also incorporated in the Strategic Plan are the Re-entry Action Plan of the VP (Academic Affairs), Research Action Plan and Project of the VP (RDE) and the REAP of the VP (Admin. & Finance and the REAP on Inventory System by the Chief Administrative Officer on Finance. This is in accord with the Executive Development Program for SUCs which is Initiative No. 9 (Strengthening Public HEIs).

## MONITORING & EVALUATION

A planning workshop was held twice a year for each campus to submit an Annual Operational Plan. This was consolidated and forms part of the University Operational Plan. Before the end of June a review of accomplishments for each campus was held. Then the Performance Management Team (PMT) of the University started to conduct the Monitoring and Evaluation of the accomplishments of each campus vis-a-vis their set up targets for the period. Monitoring and evaluation is conducted twice a year – ending June and December. The ratings would then serve as the basis for the Performance Based Bonus.

## FACULTY AND STAFF DEVELOPMENT

Several in-house trainings were conducted during 2014. The University conducted an Orientation on the Conduct of Fire and Earthquake Drill which was participated by the key officials, faculty, staff and students. The personnel of the Provincial and Regional Disaster Risk Reduction Management Team were invited to give the orientation.

The newly-hired faculty and staff underwent oath taking and then an orientation seminar about their duties and responsibilities. They are made to understand that automatically they become part of the CapSU family thereby they must serve with commitment. Some personnel are attending advanced education for professional development. Below is the table showing the number of office personnel on further studies:

# REHABILITATION OF THE BUILDINGS AND OTHER FACILITIES DAMAGED BY SUPERTYPHOON YOLANDA

THE REHABILITATION EFFORTS OF THE UNIVERSITY IS A MAJOR ACTIVITY UNDERTAKEN IN 2014. THE UNIVERSITY BUILDINGS AND OTHER FACILITIES WERE HARDLY-HIT BY SUPERTYPHOON YOLANDA. THE UNIVERSITY PRESIDENT TOGETHER WITH THE PDMIS DIRECTOR ATTENDED A CHED MEETING AT THE CHED CENTRAL OFFICE IN 2014.

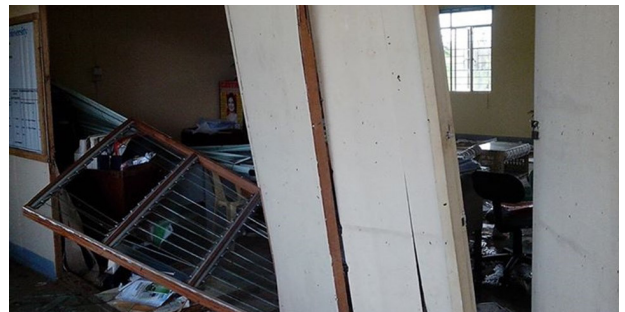
**O**ut of the 195 Million Pesos Prioritized Rehabilitation Proposal, CapSU was allocated 76 Million Pesos. But as of this date CapSU is still awaiting the release of the said funds.

Roofings of classrooms damaged by the Super typhoon Yolanda was temporarily replaced by galvanized iron and bamboos. The campuses made ends meet so that classes will continue despite damaged facilities. Some campuses adopted the two-session classes in order to cope with the number of days required for the semester.

The University Auditorium glass panels were all destroyed including the roofing of the classroom buildings and the office of the dean of engineering and architecture. The Philippine Nippon Institute and the White Dove Recruitment Agency were the generous donors of rehabilitating the damages. The rehabilitation was done on January 2014. The computer and the physical laboratory were all damaged but slowly the administration with its income from the tuition fees started rehabilitating the damages.

There were other agencies who came to CapSU and tapped some international organizations to finance the rehabilitation of damaged buildings but as of this date none had ever materialized.

There were several completed and on-going infrastructure projects undertaken by the University within the year. The University is awaiting the release of the funds intended for the rehabilitation of the damaged buildings, equipment and other facilities this year. The University also submitted several

proposals for rehabilitation of properties of the University to the Overseas Development Authority in Japan. The University did what could possibly be done to repair the damages based on its meager income from tuition fees. All purchases of the University passes through the Bids and Award Committee (BAC) which adheres to the provisions of RA 9184. Below is the table on the expenditures of the University in each campus/college for the infrastructure - rehabilitation and repair of the damages of Yolanda.

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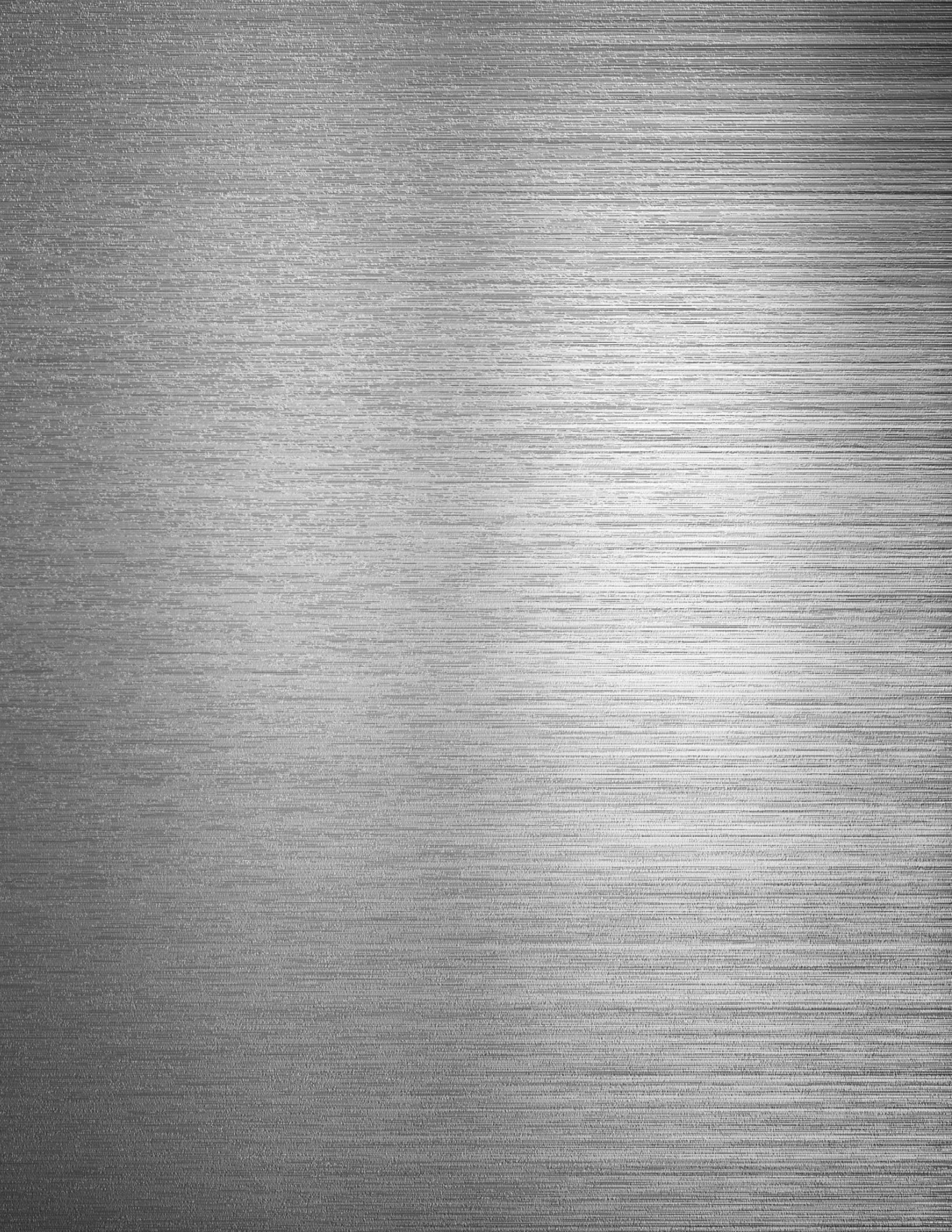
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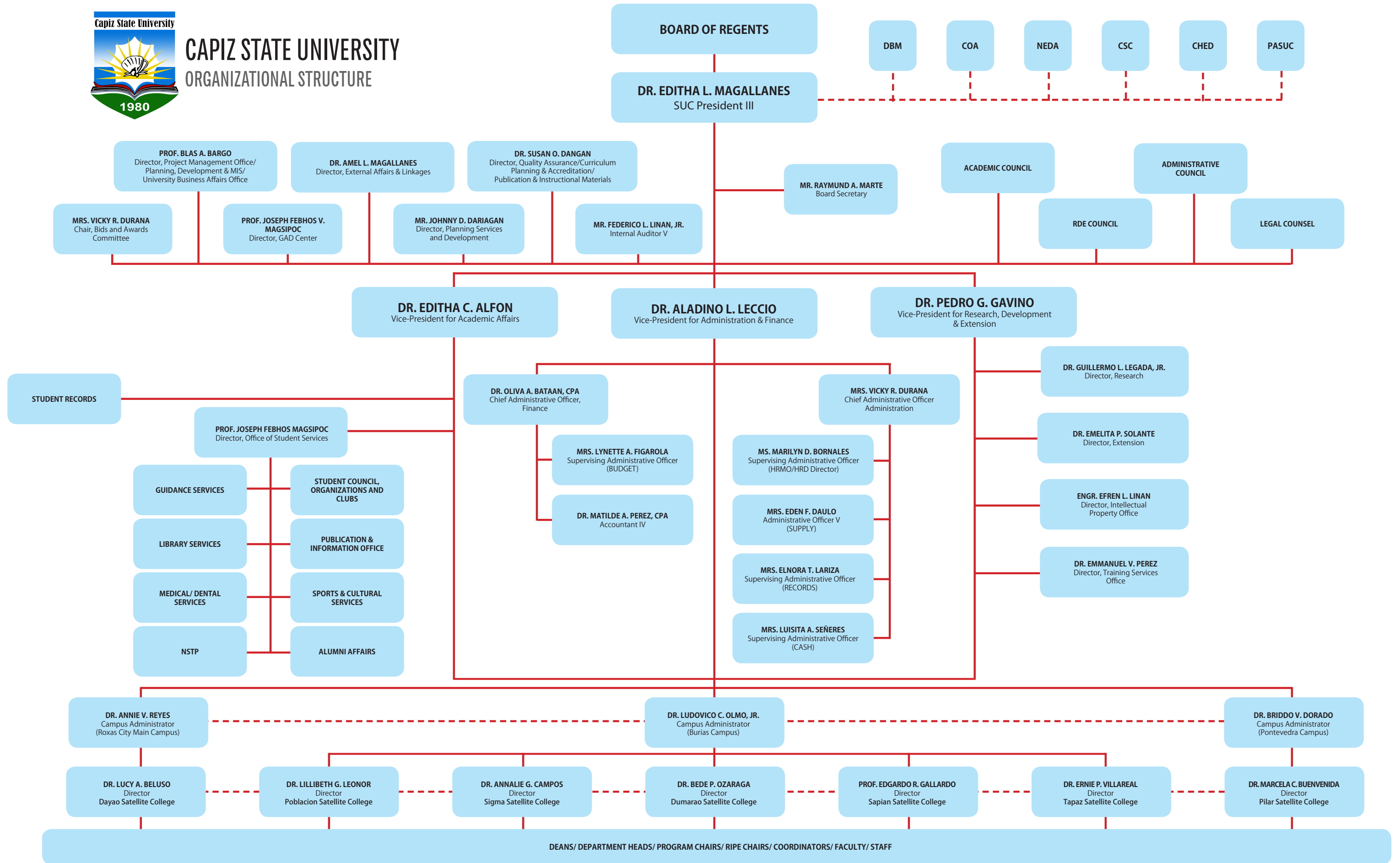
