BRIEF HISTORY

From humble beginnings, a university grew...

Since its inception in the early 1980s, the modest roots of the institution have become a formidable foundation strengthened through the adept and capable governance of its competent leaders creating positive impact on people. With a fierce commitment to provide quality service to all, Capiz State University, along with its strong and competent task force, maintains a vision with goals leading to a foreseeable future of producing globally-competitive graduates. Today, the university and its nine campuses and satellite colleges, is a landmark as much for its place in the community as its academic programs, research developments and extension services, and continues to grow.

BRIEF HISTORY

he Capiz State University started with the merger of Mambusao Agricultural and Technical College (MATEC) in Burias, Mambusao and the Capiz Agricultural and Fishery School (CAFS) in Bailan, Pontevedra to become the Panay State Polytechnic College (PSPC) by virtue of Batas Pambansa Blg. 91 signed by President Ferdinand E. Marcos on December 24, 1980.

At the time of the merging of the two schools, MATEC (started June 22, 1958 by virtue of RA 2088, which has two existing satellite campuses located in Tapaz and Sapian) and CAFS (started June 21, 1957 by virtue of RA 1785 and 1786) were headed by Dr. Ernesto V. Botin and Dr. Wenceslao O. Sison Jr., as Superintendents, respectively. The seat of administration of PSPC was in Burias, Mambusao.

On August 29, 1981, Dr. Ernesto V. Botin took his oath of office as the first PSPC President and Dr. Wenceslao O. Sison Jr. became his Vice President. With the appointment of Dr. Sison as College President of Northern Iloilo Polytechnic State College, Dr. Anthony N. Navarrosa was appointed to take

City, including its Department of Fisheries in Dayao (formerly Capiz School of Fisheries founded 1961), became an integral part of the PSPC system. This was approved in the 54th Regular Board Meeting held at the CHED Conference Room, San Miguel Avenue, Ortigas Center, Pasig City. However, the official turnover was done on October 25, 1999 by CHED Region VI-Western Visayas Director Tomas P. Parreño to PSPC President Dadivas. Then, on December 19, 2000, Sigma College of Science and Technology (started January 1, 1996 by virtue of RA 7973) in Sigma, Capiz was integrated into PSPC.

In 1999, Cong. Manuel "Mar" A. Roxas of the 1st District of Capiz filed a bill seeking for the conversion of PSPC into a state university. Both the City Council of Roxas City and the Provincial Board of Capiz passed the resolution supporting the bill.

On September 15, 2000, the Board of Trustees approved the new organizational structure of the College with three (3) units, namely: the Roxas City Unit, the Mambusao Unit and the Pontevedra Unit. Each unit was

over his place as Vice President which was later upgraded to the position of Executive Vice President. The head of the campuses were called Deans.

In 1982, with the approval of the Board of Trustees, the Office of the College President added satellite campuses in the municipalities of Dumarao and Pilar. In 1986, President Corazon C. Aquino reappointed Dr. Botin as PSPC President. When his term ended on July 24, 1993, Dr. Navarrosa, the Executive Vice President, served as Officer-in-Charge of the College until the appointment of Dr. Rochellir D. Dadivas as the second PSPC President on October 12, 1994.

During the time of Dr. Dadivas, he was assisted by Dr. Anthony N. Navarrosa, Executive Vice President; Dr. Editha L. Magallanes, Vice President for Academic Affairs; and Dr. Nicolas A. Braña, Sr., Vice President for Research, Development and Extension.

In accordance with the pertinent provisions of Republic Act 7722 (otherwise known as the Higher Education Act of 1994) and Republic Act 8992, on November 4, 1998, the Capiz Institute of Technology (founded 1917) in Roxas

headed by a Chancellor. The Mambusao Unit has six (6) satellite campuses: Burias Campus in Mambusao, Sapian Campus, Tapaz Campus, Sigma Campus, Mambusao Campus, and Dumarao Campus. The Pontevedra Unit has Pontevedra Campus and Pilar Campus; while the Roxas City Unit has Roxas City Campus and Dayao Campus. The first Chancellors were Dr. Nenita A. Beluso for Pontevedra Unit, Supt. Primitivo V. Bangcoyo for Roxas City Unit and Dr. Geronimo L. Gregorio for Mambusao Unit. The campuses were headed by Campus Administrators who report directly to the Chancellors.

In 2001, the seat of administration was transferred to Mambusao Campus for accessibility and ease of communication. The second sets of Chancellors were Dr. Edgar M. Dilla for Pontevedra Unit, Dr. Genoveva N. Labaniego for Mambusao Unit and Dr. Evaristo M. Magoncia for Roxas City Unit. With the retirement of Dr. Navarrosa in 2003, the position of Executive Vice President, being co-terminus, ceased to exist.

In March 2002 the bill for the conversion of PSPC into a state university was approved in the House of Representatives and the Senate approved the same measure on February 6, 2004. Cong. Rodriguez D. Dadivas of the 1st

Congressional District and Cong. Fredenil H. Castro of the 2nd Congressional District were responsible in lobbying for the passage of the conversion law.

Then, a milestone was reached on March 21, 2004, when President Gloria Macapagal-Arroyo signed into law Republic Act No. 9273 at Capiz Provincial Capitol, Roxas City converting PSPC into a state university, the Capiz State University. At the time of the conversion, the incumbent Governor of Capiz was Hon. Vicente B. Bermejo with Hon. Victor A. Tanco as Vice Governor. Following the provision of the University Charter, the seat of administration was transferred to Roxas City.

Dr. Rochellir D. Dadivas, the incumbent PSPC President at the time of conversion became the first University President. The three Vice Presidents were Dr. Editha L. Magallanes, Vice President for Administration and Finance; Dr. Aladino L. Leccio, Vice President for Academic Affairs; and Dr. Geronimo L. Gregorio, Vice President for Research and Extension.

When Dr. Editha Magallanes was reappointed president of the Capiz State University in 2012, it only reaffirmed her exemplary leadership that has eventually brought this thriving institution to prominence both in the national and the international stage.

Envisioning CAPSU as the center of academic excellence that renders quality service to the province and its constituents, Magallanes embarked on transforming the institution by prioritizing instruction, research, extension, and production through effective and efficient administration.

Perhaps this is due to the fact that he had to weather the odds for the sake of his colleagues. By and large, Botin's pursuit of enhancing the faculty despite the criticisms and difficulties merited him the eternal gratitude of those people who he had helped.

On July 7, 2008, after the retirement of Dr. Dadivas as University President, Dr. Editha L. Magallanes was appointed as the second University President of Capiz State University. During the term of Dr. Magallanes, her Vice Presidents were Dr. Aladino L. Leccio for Administration and Finance, Dr. Herminia B. Gomez for Academic Affairs and Dr. Geronimo L. Gregorio for Research, Development and Extension (RDE). Per Board of Regents' Resolution No. 1112, series of 2009, the chancellor positions were abolished in view of overlapping functions with the campus administrators.

Having been rated Outstanding by the Evaluation and Search Committee towards the end of her first term as University President in June 2012, Dr. Editha L. Magallanes was re-appointed as President of Capiz State University on July 7, 2012.

With the retirement of Dr. Gregorio, Dr. Cora F. Navarra replaced him as Vice President for Research, Development and Extension effective November 7, 2012. The untimely death of Dr. Cora F. Navarra, left the VP RDE office vacant.

Continuing the legacy that Dr. Magallanes left when she retired in July 27, 2016, her successor Dr. Editha C. Alfon, who after having been installed into office as University President of Capiz State University in September 8, 2016, further exemplifies her true dedication to quality service to the university with integrity, transparency, and accountability.

Dr. Alfon who rose from being a faculty member, a Registrar, a Campus Administrator, a Vice President for Academic Affairs, and now a University President, truly and completely prepared her to be one- a true and experienced leader. A very simple lady who intentionally looks at the person's capacity to lead, and willingly trains anyone who desires to be one.

Dr. Pedro G. Gavino was then designated as the Officer-in-Charge on March 5, 2014 and assumed office on June 1 of the same year.

With the retirement of Dr. Herminia B. Gomez in September 17, 2014, Dr. Editha C. Alfon was designated as the Vice-President for Academic Affairs until September 7, 2016. And now, she serves as the University President after the retirement of Dr. Editha L. Magallanes.

Dr. Alfon holds the university presidency effective September 8, 2016 to date by virtue of Resolution No. 50, series of 2016. The three vice presidents of the new administration are Dr. Nilo D. Delfin as the VP for Administration and Finance, Dr. Susan O. Dangan as the VP for Academic Affairs, and Dr. Lucy A. Beluso as the VP for Research Development and Extension.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY 2017

2017 is undoubtedly one of the most remarkable and productive years for Capiz State University in its creation as it continuously soar and climb greater heights in fulfilling its roles and commitment as an academe in adherence to its mandate.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

he university happily and productively served the 22, 736 students from its graduate, tertiary, post secondary and secondary levels, producing 3, 607 graduates, 241 were recipients of Latin honors Magna Cum Laudes and Cum Laudes.

Varied curricular programs with licensure examinations registered passing percentages higher than the national passing rate. As a matter of fact, the Top 1, Top 7, and Top 8 in the Registered Mechanical Engineers in the person of Clint Kenneth Reducto (93.00%), John Louiese Villadore (90.00%), and Edcel Icalina (89.00%) are from this university.

Another accolade is added to its existence was the honor and glory brought by Jonathan A. Garcia of CapSU Pilar who was the Top 2 in the Licensure Examination for Teachers in 2017.

The four-rounds of accreditation visits from the lowest level up to the highest OBE-Level IV from the months of April, July, August and October manifest the desire of the administration, faculty, staff and students to cooperatively put their efforts forward in assisting all the 31 programs to grow and keep pace with the trend in accreditation.

Excellence in culture and the arts is apparently reflected in the victorious participation of students to the Regional and National Cultural Contests CapSU students championed Ms. PASUC VI, Choral Singing, Instrumental Solo, and Pop Solo, ranked 2nd in Extemporaneous Speaking, Story Telling, Instrumental Solo (Violin), and Quiz Bowl. While, 2nd runner-up and 4th runner-up in Choral Singing and MS. PASUC in the national level.

A big number of academic and non-academic personnel were hired and promoted this 2017. Sixty were newly hired and 28 were promoted to higher positions/ranks.

The university happily co-hosted the national conference with Reading Association of the Philippines, Incorporated in November 30-December 2, 2017.

The University has to live to the demand of being ISO 9001-2015 certified by 2018. Relative to this dream, series of orientation seminars for Internal Auditors were conducted, all processes and required forms and documents were harmonized, first internal audit happened by campus, and the management review meeting was also conducted.

It's also a breakthrough for the Research and Development and Extension Office for it had complied almost its targets based on the performance indicators. CapSU faculty completed a total of 88 researches, 66 of which were presented in the Annual University Symposium and 22 were applied for IPR through the IPMO Office. For the last 3 years, there were 90 researches and 46 technologies were registered to the IPOHIL, and 40 are still undergoing review.

CapSU has funded 81 faculty researches from the funds allocated amounting to PHP 5,648,868.99 under the 4 RDE Centers. The university also collaborated with other funding agencies such as DA-BAR, UPV and DENR, BLGS, NCCA and DILG, Regional Office and WESVARRDEC. It also made

a spark in the international and regional research conferences by taking home Best Paper Awards. Aside from that, MOU were forged on exchange for faculty researchers, joint research activities, exchange academic information and publication with universities in South Korea, Bangladesh, Japan and Indonesia.

Finally, the year concluded with a thrilling moment as the RDE Office acquired its HI-ACE Van to be used for research and extension functions. With the primary goal of achieving sustainable partnership with the government and private organization in poverty alleviation, the University can now respond more adequately to the training needs of communities, industries, public and private agencies/organizations and to the members of the academe. It is envisioned that the community can be uplifted from helplessness to self-reliance, from ignorance to increased awareness. from indifference to positive involvement, and from aimlessness to commitment. These shall be realized through the effective implementation of the University's Community Extension Programs. Two hundred forty five (245) skills and livelihood trainings conducted by Community Extension services office in different campuses which benefited 10, 979 beneficiaries and weighted average of 14, 858.75 beneficiaries from communities located within the province of Capiz. Recent accomplishments in these functions may be considered as entry activities to capacitate community members as they strive to find and utilize options that can empower them economically and socially.




The Office of the Academic Affairs establishes academic climate for quality instruction and serves as extension arms of the President in the conduct of organization's academic-related affairs.


Of the 11,548 enrolment for the First Semester, SY 2017-2018, expectedly the largest (9,731) were from the tertiary, followed by the secondary (904) and graduate program which was 883. The largest enrolment were from the 3 bigger campuses of Roxas City (4,807), Pontevedra (1,933) and Burias (1,207).

Similarly, the same trend is shown as to level and campus, although a decrease of enrolment is felt during the Second Semester of this school year.






Second Semester SY 2017-2018

Capiz State University never stops from dreaming high in program accreditation.

As of 2017, the University indulged in the four (4) rounds of accreditation visits. The first AACCUP accreditors' visit was in April 6-7, 2017 when the five (5) curricular programs were submitted for Candidate Status. The next visit happened in July 24-29, 2017 when BSOA of Mambusao Satellite College was submitted for Level I, BSEd, BS Crim and BSAS of Dumarao Satellite College together with the three (3) graduate degree programs of Burias Campus which were submitted for Level III and the BS AgEng to the highest OBE Level IV-Phase I.

The third accreditation visit happened in Aug 14-16, 2017, when the 5 graduate programs of Pontevedra Campus and six (6) of Pilar Satellite College were visited for Level I.

The last batch of accreditation happened in October 16-21, 2017 when three (3) graduate degree and 3 undergraduate degree programs of the Roxas City Main Campus and one of Dayao Satellite College were visited for Level II.

SCHOLARSHIPS



he students of Capiz State University are highly privileged to enjoy external and internal scholarships from varied sources. Of the 9,722 who were granted external scholarships, the biggest (4,173) were from the TD-02 Gugma ni Castro through the courtesy of Congressman Castro of the Second District of Capiz now the Deputy Speaker of the Philippines. 




FACULTY

SEMINARS AND TRAININGS





Like those universities, Capiz State University has to live up to the standard in its pursuit of continuous development of providing quality education to its clientele. It has to face the challenges and try to be the best in its field. And, one of the mechanisms to live up to the standard is the application for quality management system ISO-9001:2015.

The latest standard, ISO 9001:2015, places a greater emphasis on a company's use of risk analysis to anticipate challenges in managing business processes. It also requires organizations to be aware of, and anticipate the needs of company stakeholders including employees, shareholders and customers, in the development of future products and services.

The university in its quest for quality management system has undergone several steps leading to ISO certification such as orientation awareness among concerned personnel and offices, internal auditors training, internal audit, and management review. Faculty and staff across all aspects of the university are working together toward a common goal and in the process will be gaining appreciation of their commitment. This cross-pollination will be an interesting outcome to be anticipated.

LIBRARY IMPROVEMENTS

The highlights of the University Library System for the Year 2017 are as follows:

- First University Book Fair Last May 2017, to facilitate and give faculty more access to selecting quality books and learning materials, a Book Fair was conducted at CapSU Main Campus Library. CapSU Bailan Library conducted a workshop participated in by various faculty and staff, while the CapSU Main Library organized a talk participated by students which highlighted the importance of reading and books.








NUMBER OF COMPLETED RESEARCH WITH THE NUMBER OF RESEARCH SUBMITTED FOR IP PROTECTION




These are the completed researches of the University with the data of researches submitted for IP Protection. In 2017, 66 researches were completed and presented in the University In-House review. Of the 80 researches submitted for IP Protection, 22 have been approved by the Intellectual Property of the Philippines (IPOPHL) and 56 are still undergoing the review process.

For the past three years, a total of 148 research studies were submitted for IP (Intellectual Property) protection. As of 2017, a total of 46 researches were granted utility models and 1 research study was classified as an invention.

In 2017, an Intellectual Property (IP) audit was conducted by the DOST-TAPI led by Caezar Angelito E. Arceo, auditing patent agent in February, 2017. As a result, 80 researches initially qualify for Utility Model, 22 for copyright and one for invention.



APPROVED UTILITY MODELS AS OF 2017





HIGHLIGHTS OF FUNDED PROJECTS

PANAY-GUIMARAS TRADITIONAL KNOWLEDGE SYSTEMS (TKS) FOR CULTURAL RESILIENCY AND SUSTAINABLE DEVELOPMENT



The project was conducted to revitalize the core culture of the Indigenous Peoples in Capiz, specifically the Panay-Bukidnon and Aetas in Jamindan, Tapaz and Dumarao, respectively via mapping their traditional knowledge system (TKS) for cultural and resiliency and sustainable development. The choice of these concerns as overreaching themes is anchored on the idea of environmental protection and conservation advocated by the Department of Environment and Natural Resources (DENR) wherein ecosystem is treated holistically as a prized heritage in itself. The TKS covered in this project are the forest biodiversity (forestry), water bodies and coastal environment (fisheries), arable and habitable terrains (agriculture), sustainable arts and crafts (arts and crafts), and environmental rituals and traditions (literatures). All these themes are anchored on the umbrella of cultural resiliency and sustainable development aimed to highlight unique experiences and best practices for environmental protection and conservation to foster resiliency and sustainability of indigenous/traditional knowledge system.

The researchers, anthropologists and chapter writers from University of the Philippines - Visayas, spearheaded the project. Out of 10M, UPV collaborated with other SUCs (State Universities and Colleges) in the region

having Php750, 000.00 each. Among the SUCs to take part in this project are Aklan State University, University of Antique, West Visayas State University, Guimaras State College and Capiz State University.

As the only state university in the province of Capiz, Capiz State University, (CapSU), through its RDE Office aims to emphasize the vital role of TKS in knowing, understanding, and sustaining the Capizeños best practices as the key for national development. The project's objectives were carried out by the CapSU pool of researchers, to include Dr. Leo Andrew B. Biclar, Dr. Adelfo Z. Virtudazo, Dr. Louis Placido F. Lachica, Dr. Stephanie S. Pimentel, Mr. Rector John A. Latoza and Dr. Nida I. Gavino with the aid of their research assistants. Dr. Editha C. Alfon and Dr. Lucy A. Beluso who also served as the consultants of the said research project. On the part of CapSU, the project had commenced last December 2016 and were completed on March 2017. The research outputs of the project were presented in the 2017 Philarm International Research Conference in Baguio City and 10th PNEE International Research Conference in Tarlac City. The latter recognized CapSU as Best Paper with the entry entitled Environmental Practices and Rituals of the Indigenous Peoples in Capiz presented by Dr. Leo Andrew B. Biclar, the University Research Director.

2017 CITIZEN SATISFACTION INDEX SYSTEM MUNICIPALITY OF MAMBUSAO, CAPIZ



The Citizen Satisfaction Index System (CSIS) is a set of data tools designed to collect and generate relevant citizens' feedback on local government service delivery performance and on the general satisfaction of citizens. DILG Memorandum Circular No. 2012-113 promulgated the implementation of the CSIS, a client/citizen perception-based performance assessment that measures the public service satisfaction. To contextualize satisfaction data, the analysis involves several steps covering the concepts of awareness, availment, satisfaction, and need for action (CSIS Manual, 2017).

ENHANCING AND OPERATIONALIZING INTELLECTUAL PROPERTY (IP) MANAGEMENT AND BUSINESS DEVELOPMENT OFFICE IN **CONSORTIA MEMBER AGENCIES**

This project was approved during the 12th Special PCAARRD Directors' Council Meeting, 32nd Regular PCAARRD Governing Council (GC) Meeting and 8th DOST-GIA EXECOM meeting held on July 25, 2017, August 3, 2017, and August 10, 2017, respectively with Cavite State University as project leader.

Capiz State University, a consortia member university, was selected as one of the 10 universities in the country to be part of the project. Selection was based on the performance and accomplishments of each university in terms of technology generation and protection on DOST-PCAARRD funded projects.

At present, the project office is temporarily located at the College of Engineering in the Main Campus Roxas City along with the Social Science Research and Development Center.

IP PROTECTION SUBMITTED AND APPROVED

CAPSU ORGANIC AGRICULTURE RESEARCH AND DEVELOPMENT PROGRAM

The Organic Agriculture Program of Capiz State University is under progress. Some materials needed in each component were already delivered for utilization. The Organic Free-ranged Chicken Production component has already produced formulated feed to increase the head production of native chicken. The formulated feed will be subjected for analysis. Component on Organic Soil Ameliorants produces vermicomposts and organic vegetables as the by-products while its sugarcane is to be harvested in March 2018. The vermicompost and vermicast were subjected for analysis. As resulted from the analysis, further study on vermicomposting was recommended and its proposal was submitted to DA-BAR for funding. The component on Organic Production of Milkfish on the other hand has made their harvest on the first trial and the ponds are now ready for the second trial. Analysis of data for each component is being prepared for presentation to DA-BAR.

Common problems encountered in the implementation are in the process of procurement due to the incompliance of the suppliers of the specifications made. Likewise, weather condition also affected the delayed of the implementation since Capiz had encountered several typhoons.









LAWIG VISAYAS: SAKAYAN KUMBUYAHANAY – WESTERN VISAYAS CULTURAL DEVELOPMENT FOR ATI AND PANAY BUKIDNON COMMUNITIES



A new partnership for a research program was formed between CAPSU and the National Commission for Culture and the Arts (NCCA). This program aims to develop and implement various activities towards sustained cultural development for Western Visayas for Ati and Panay-Bukidnon cultural communities funded by the NCCA amounting to Php 3,300,000. This is an integrated cultural development program in 13 towns in Western Visayas with Ati and Panay Bukidnon communities, namely, Sagay and Calatrava in Negros Occidental; Malay and Nabas in Aklan; Libacao, Hamtic and Burunaga in Antique; Jamindan, Dumarao and Tapaz in Capiz; Barotac Viejo and Calinog in Iloilo; and, Jordan in Guimaras, which will establish a pro-active cultural renaissance, propelling genuine community-based productivity and development. Dr. Leo Andrew B. Biclar, Dr. Emelita P. Solante, Dr. Louis Placido Lachica, and Dr. Rodyard Madiclum are implementing the project.





STATUS OF RDE CENTERS FUNDED PROJECTS






STATUS OF RDE CENTERS FUNDED PROJECTS





For the year 2017, CESO has conducted 245 trainings conducted by the different campuses and satellite colleges (Fig. 1). Among the campuses, Roxas Main campus conducted the most number of trainings (75). This was followed by the Pontevedra and Burias Campuses with 32 and 31 trainings, respectively.


For the year 2017, the extension arm of the University was able to served 10,983 clientele (Fig. 2) all over the province of Capiz imparting them with various technologies for adoption. The three campuses of CAPSU were able to produce more trainee graduates as compared with the six satellite colleges. Among the campuses, Roxas City main campus produced the most number of trainees (1,966) followed in descending order by Burias (1785) and Pontevedra campus (1737). Among the satellite colleges, the highest number of trainees was from Dumarao (1219) while the least was from Tapaz (523). The accomplishment of the University in terms of the number of persons trained was a collaborative effort of the eversupportive, hardworking and persistent extension providers (faculty & staff).

Number of Persons Trained Weighted by Length of Training




The Community Extension Service Office (CESO) was able to produce 14,858.75 trainees weighted by the length of training (Fig. 3). For the past two years, the University was able to consistently meet its very high target in this particular indicator. Roxas City Main campus still produced the highest number of trainees weighted by the length of training (3079.5). This was due to the vocational/technological trainings offered by the main campus with a duration of 10 days per training. Pontevedra campus ranked second with 2233.25 while Tapaz Satellite College produced the least number with 523.

CAPSU Extension Services had performed well in this particular indicator extending technical services to _____ beneficiaries. Pontevedra campus has provided the highest number of technical advise equivalent to 38%. Dumarao Satellite College ranked second (33%) because of their veterinary services followed by the Main Campus (22%).

PRODUCTION

The IGP's existence contributes to the good standing and image of the University. It gives an indelible impression to the general public and the government that the University has the capability to source out funds to augment meager resources by engaging in the IGPs and not be totally dependent on government subsidy/allocations. This year's immense income of Php 2,532,615.39 generated from the various IGPs of the system have continuously provided opportunities for interfacing instruction, research and extension.

he University has ventured on some agro-industrial projects such as printing press, review center, canteens, rents and leases, coconut production, fishpond and other income generating projects. Not so much income was gained from CapSU Pontevedra because it is undergoing repair and rehabilitation.

Much of income was obtained from the review center of CapSU Dayao and Printing House of the University.

For Calendar Year 2016, the University has a net income of PhP 920, 780.20 and for Calendar Year 2017, it earned a net income of PhP 2, 532. 615.39 with an increase of 275 percent. The target net income for income generating projects for Calendar Year 2018 is 5 million pesos or more.

STRATEGIC PLANNING STRATEGIC PLANNING REVISION 2018-2027



he revision of the University's Strategic Plan for 2018-2027 (Ambisyon CAPSU 2027) started with the preparation of strategic plan of campuses and satellite colleges. The existing University strategic plan was revised to set new goals for the future of the University. This will define new strategies in order to achieve the strategic goals of the fourfold mandate: Excellence in Instruction, Excellence in Research, Excellence in Extension and Production, with the Excellence in Governance and Administration.



In order to prepare the University's Strategic Plan for 2018-2027, the top management, faculty and staff, students, stakeholders and few members of the Board of Regents converged and actively participated in a focus group discussions to conceptualize the vision and plans of the University. The final workshop was conducted on October 23-24, 2017.

The Draft Ambisyon CAPSU 2027 was presented in a special Administrative Council Meeting and to the Board of Regents and was conditionally approved through BOR Resolution No. 116 s. 2017. The Organizational Structure of the University was also reviewed, revised, discussed and was approved by the Board of Regents.


