A BRIEF HISTORY

From humble beginnings, a university grew...

Since its inception in the early 1980s, the modest roots of the institution have become a formidable foundation strengthened through the adept and capable governance of its competent leaders creating positive impact on people. With a fierce commitment to provide quality service to all, Capiz State University, along with its strong and competent task force, maintains a vision with goals leading to a foreseeable future of producing globally-competitive graduates. Today, the university and its nine campuses and satellite colleges, is a landmark as much for its place in the community as its academic programs, research developments and extension services, and continues to grow.

HISTORY

he Capiz State University started with the merger of Mambusao Agricultural and Technical College (MATEC) in Burias, Mambusao and the Capiz Agricultural and Fishery School (CAFS) in Bailan, Pontevedra to become the Panay State Polytechnic College (PSPC) by virtue of Batas Pambansa Blg. 91 signed by President Ferdinand E. Marcos on December 24, 1980.

At the time of the merging of the two schools, MATEC (started June 22, 1958 by virtue of RA 2088, which has two existing satellite campuses located in Tapaz and Sapian) and CAFS (started June 21, 1957 by virtue of

appointment of Dr. Rochellir D. Dadivas as the second PSPC President on October 12, 1994.

During the time of Dr. Dadivas, he was assisted by Dr. Anthony N. Navarrosa, Executive Vice President; Dr. Editha L. Magallanes, Vice President for Academic Affairs; and Dr. Nicolas A. Braña, Sr., Vice President for Research, Development and Extension.

In accordance with the pertinent provisions of Republic Act 7722 (otherwise known as the Higher Education Act of 1994) and Republic Act 8992, on November 4, 1998, the Capiz Institute of Technology



A milestone was reached on March 21, 2004, when President Gloria Macapagal-Arroyo signed into law Republic Act No. 9273 at Capiz Provincial Capitol, Roxas City converting PSPC into a state university, the Capiz State University. At the time of the conversion, the incumbent Governor of Capiz was Hon. Vicente B. Bermejo with Hon. Victor A. Tanco as Vice Governor. Following the provision of the University Charter, the seat of administration was transferred to Roxas City.

RA 1785 and 1786) were headed by Dr. Ernesto V. Botin and Dr. Wenceslao O. Sison Jr., as Superintendents, respectively. The seat of administration of PSPC was in Burias, Mambusao.

On August 29, 1981, Dr. Ernesto V. Botin took his oath of office as the first PSPC President and Dr. Wenceslao O. Sison Jr. became his Vice President. With the appointment of Dr. Sison as College President of Northern Iloilo Polytechnic State College, Dr. Anthony N. Navarrosa was appointed to take over his place as Vice President which was later upgraded to the position of Executive Vice President. The head of the campuses were called Deans.

In 1982, with the approval of the Board of Trustees, the Office of the College President added satellite campuses in the municipalities of Dumarao and Pilar. In 1986, President Corazon C. Aquino reappointed Dr. Botin as PSPC President. When his term ended on July 24, 1993, Dr. Navarrosa, the Executive Vice President, served as Officer-in-Charge of the College until the

(founded 1917) in Roxas City, including its Department of Fisheries in Dayao (formerly Capiz School of Fisheries founded 1961), became an integral part of the PSPC system. This was approved in the 54th Regular Board Meeting held at the CHED Conference Room, San Miguel Avenue, Ortigas Center, Pasig City. However, the official turnover was done on October 25, 1999 by CHED Region VI-Western Visayas Director Tomas P. Parreño to PSPC President Dadivas. Then, on December 19, 2000, Sigma College of Science and Technology (started January 1, 1996 by virtue of RA 7973) in Sigma, Capiz was integrated into PSPC.

In 1999, Cong. Manuel "Mar" A. Roxas of the 1st District of Capiz filed a bill seeking for the conversion of PSPC into a state university. Both the City Council of Roxas City and the Provincial Board of Capiz passed the resolution supporting the bill.

On September 15, 2000, the Board of Trustees approved the new organizational structure of the College with three (3) units, namely: the Roxas City

Unit, the Mambusao Unit and the Pontevedra Unit. Each unit was headed by a Chancellor. The Mambusao Unit has six (6) satellite campuses: Burias Campus in Mambusao, Sapian Campus, Tapaz Campus, Sigma Campus, Mambusao Campus, and Dumarao Campus. The Pontevedra Unit has Pontevedra Campus and Pilar Campus; while the Roxas City Unit has Roxas City Campus and Dayao Campus. The first Chancellors were Dr. Nenita A. Beluso for Pontevedra Unit, Supt. Primitivo V. Bangcoyo for Roxas City Unit and Dr. Geronimo L. Gregorio for Mambusao Unit. The campuses were headed by Campus Administrators who report directly to the Chancellors.

In 2001, the seat of administration was transferred to Mambusao Campus for accessibility and ease of communication. The second sets of Chancellors were Dr. Edgar M. Dilla for Pontevedra Unit, Dr. Genoveva N. Labaniego for Mambusao Unit and Dr. Evaristo M. Magoncia for Roxas City Unit. With the retirement of Dr. Navarrosa in 2003, the position of Executive Vice President, being co-terminus, ceased to exist.

In March 2002 the bill for the conversion of PSPC into a state university was approved in the House of Representatives and the Senate approved the same measure on February 6, 2004. Cong. Rodriguez D. Dadivas of the 1st Congressional District and Cong. Fredenil H. Castro of the 2nd Congressional District were responsible in lobbying for the passage of the conversion law.

Then, a milestone was reached on March 21, 2004, when President Gloria Macapagal-Arroyo signed into law Republic Act No. 9273 at Capiz Provincial Capitol, Roxas City converting PSPC into a state university, the Capiz State University. At the time of the conversion, the incumbent Governor of Capiz was Hon. Vicente B. Bermejo with Hon. Victor A. Tanco as Vice Governor. Following the provision of the University Charter, the seat of administration was transferred to Roxas City.

Dr. Rochellir D. Dadivas, the incumbent PSPC President at the time of conversion became the first University President. The three Vice Presidents were Dr. Editha L. Magallanes, Vice President for Administration and Finance; Dr. Aladino L. Leccio, Vice President for Academic Affairs; and Dr. Geronimo L. Gregorio, Vice President for Research and Extension.

On July 7, 2008, after the retirement of Dr. Dadivas as University President, Dr. Editha L. Magallanes was appointed as the second University President of Capiz State University. During the term of Dr. Magallanes,

Continuing the legacy that Dr. Magallanes left when she retired in July 27, 2016, her successor Dr. Editha C. Alfon, who after having been installed into office as University President of Capiz State University in September 8, 2016, further exemplifies her true dedication to quality service to the university with integrity, transparency, and accountability.

Dr. Alfon who rose from being a faculty member, a Registrar, a Campus Administrator, a Vice President for Academic Affairs, and now a University President, truly and completely prepared her to be one- a true and experienced leader. A very simple lady who intentionally looks at the person's capacity to lead, and willingly trains anyone who desires to be one.

her Vice Presidents were Dr. Aladino L. Leccio for Administration and Finance, Dr. Herminia B. Gomez for Academic Affairs and Dr. Geronimo L. Gregorio for Research, Development and Extension (RDE). Per Board of Regents' Resolution No. 1112, series of 2009, the chancellor positions were abolished in view of overlapping functions with the campus administrators.

Having been rated Outstanding by the Evaluation and Search Committee towards the end of her first term as University President in June 2012, Dr. Editha L. Magallanes was re-appointed as President of Capiz State University on July 7, 2012.

With the retirement of Dr. Gregorio, Dr. Cora F. Navarra replaced him as Vice President for Research, Development and Extension effective November 7, 2012. The untimely death of Dr. Cora F. Navarra, left the VP RDE office vacant. Dr. Pedro G. Gavino was then designated as the Officer-in-Charge on March 5, 2014 and assumed office on June 1 of the same year.

With the retirement of Dr. Herminia B. Gomez in September 17, 2014, Dr. Editha C. Alfon was designated as the Vice-President for Academic Affairs until September 7, 2016. And now, she serves as the University President after the retirement of Dr. Editha L. Magallanes.

Dr. Alfon holds the university presidency effective September 8, 2016 to date by virtue of Resolution No. 50, series of 2016. The three vice presidents of the new administration are Dr. Nilo D. Delfin as the VP for Administration and Finance, Dr. Susan O. Dangan as the VP for Academic Affairs, and Dr. Lucy A. Beluso as the VP for Research Development and Extension.

By virtue of BOR Resolution No 117, series of 2017, the post for Vice President for External Affairs and Linkages was created. Dr. Mary Ann B. Martelino was designated as the first Vice President for External Affairs and Linkages.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The year 2018 is remarkably one of the most successful years in the existence of Capiz State University as it unstoppably work in addressing maximum clientele satisfaction in all its fourfold functions of instruction, research, extension and production.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

apiz State University successfully served the 12,759 students among its graduate school, tertiary, post-secondary and secondary programs as it triumphantly produced 3,838 graduates, 1 was a recipient of Summa Cum Laude, 17 were Magna Cum Laudes and 243 Cum Laudes.

Considering the overall takers of all curricular programs with licensure examinations, the registered passing percentage was higher than the national passing rate. This is evidenced by the topnotchers that the university produced in the person of Engr. Kim Hilbert D. Antatico (6th Placer) for Civil Engineering, and Registered Master Electrician Rodrigo A. Billones, Jr. (6th Placer) in the Licensure Examinations given on May 6 and 7, 2018 and August 26, 2018, respectively.

Six (6) students enjoyed student mobility when they were accommodated for their internship abroad, specifically in Pattana Golf Club and Resort in Bangkok Thailand which commenced on November 6, 2018.

As the university continuously dreams for ISO Certification, at long last on November 27, 2018 the ISO Certificate of Registration (Certificate No.: AJA18-0166) was awarded to CAPSU after a series of assessment conducted on August 13-17, 2018.

The university submitted 10 curricular programs for AACCUP accreditation and were granted Level II Reaccredited Statuses on August 1, 2018.

CAPSU never ceased from strategizing efforts so that all personnel are given due promotion considering their NBC-461 points. Thirteen (13) academic personnel and four (4) non-academic personnel were promoted to higher positions. Furthermore, 10 Instructor I positions and 15 non-academic positions were filled-up in 2018.

Different student services were provided to students through symposia, bloodletting activities, medical and dental examination and other services serving all the students.

For library development in 2018, libraries of the nine (9) campuses had purchased 843 titles of books totaling to 1,178 volumes.

Furthermore, continuous improvement of the physical set-up and facilities of the libraries was continuously undertaken like: repair and maintenance of buildings, improvement of furniture and fixtures, procurement of ICT facilities and office equipment, appliances, library automation, and database.

One hundred percent of the students also availed of the guidance and counseling services, 95% of them availed of Psychological Test, organized and trained peer facilitators, students' para-counselors for faculty, conducted career development and employment services, increased students' involvement in all activities, initiated activities in support to the administration, received various awards on student publication, attended seminar workshops in all levels.

The University garnered the GAWAD KALASAG grand championship on December 4, 2018 at the Camp Aguinaldo, Quezon City. CAPSU received a trophy and a grand prize of cash PhP 300,000.00

The Socio-Cultural Office conducted annual activities that aim to provide school-based cultural activities in all levels. There were 19 activities conducted by the office (15 local, 1 regional, 2 national and 1 international).

On December 13, 2018 CAPSU Main Chorale was hailed as Best Chorale Group during the Aliw Award Ceremony.

On November 6-10, 2018, the university participated in the Culture and the Arts Conference and garnered various awards.

CAPSU was declared 2nd runner-up garnering 35 golds, 58 silvers, and 69 bronzes in various events in the PASUC VI Regional State College and Universities Athletic Association Sportfest and Conference on December 18-23, 2018

The Research and Development and Extension Office (RDEO) of CAPSU, has been doing its best to hit the targets based on the performance indicators. The CAPSU faculty researchers completed 73 research studies on various areas on social sciences, natural/biological science, engineering, ICT and food development. Furthermore, 86 more studies were submitted to the Intellectual Property office of the Philippines (IPOPHL) through DOST-TAPI for Intellectual Property (IP) protection.

The University continuously collaborate with other agencies such as DA-BAR, DENR, DOST, NCCA, DILG, and WESVARRDEC among others. The PTV, a government network, chose the CAPSU's organic agriculture program funded by DA-BAR to be featured in its segment "MagAgri Tayo."

The role of Community Extension Services of Capiz State University is crucial in addressing existing and emerging challenges in the locality. CAPSU's extension services have evolved and adapted to the new environment on the development of capabilities of beneficiaries and other stakeholders in a wide variety of subjects that they need, including disaster preparedness, literacy and health, problem solving, management, entrepreneurship and decision making. With 295 skills training conducted and facilitated by the Extension Office of the RDE and campuses and satellite colleges which produced 16,592 beneficiaries from agriculture and fisheries sectors, PDL's, OSY, and rebel returnees, PWDs, and housewives.

Dr. Edna Nava was an awardee of GAWAD Katha-Likha Category of DOST-TAPC.

The IGP of the University has a net income of PhP1,426,784.70. As to infrastructure, there were 35 projects completed.

Citizen Satisfaction Index System for the Municipality of Dumarao, Capiz



n 2017, Capiz State University (CAPSU), in partnership with the Department of Interior and Local Government (DILG) conducted the Citizen Satisfaction Index System (CSIS) in Mambusao Capiz. The CSIS is a set of data tools designed to collect and generate relevant citizens' feedback on local governments' service delivery performance and on the citizens' general satisfaction.

Satisfied with the CAPSU team's performance, the DILG tasked the CAPSU pool of experts to conduct once more the CSIS in Dumarao for 2018.

The project is headed by Dr. Louis Placido F. Lachica (project manager) along with Prof. Malou D. Basquez (data processor), Dr. Leo Andrew B. Biclar, and Dr. Eimee D. Potato (field supervisors).

awig Visayas, a collaborative project of CAPSU and the National Commission for Culture and Arts (NCCA), generally aims to provide Innovation Platform for IP Communities, specifically, to develop and implement various activities towards sustained socio-cultural and inclusive economic development of Ati and Panay Bukidnon cultural communities in Western Visayas. The project covers 13 towns in Western Visayas with Ati and Panay Bukidnon communities, namely, Sagay and Calatrava in Negros Occidental; Malay and Nabas in Aklan; Libacao, Hamtic and Burunaga in Antique; Jamindan, Dumarao and Tapaz in Capiz; Barotac Viejo and Calinog in Iloilo; and Jordan in Guimaras.





ORGANIC AGRICULTURE PROGRAM OF **CAPIZ STATE UNIVERSITY**













APSU's Organic Agriculture Program, funded by the DA-BAR, through the all-out efforts of the project team composed of 11 technical expert has produced new technologies and extended to the community for the past four years: 1) Formulated Organic Fertilizer; 2) Organic Sugarcane and sugar syrup; 3) Organic rice, corn, and vegetables 4) Organic chicken eggs and meat; and 5) Organic milkfish and fishery products.

These programs were hosted by CapSU Dayao, Pontevedra and Burias, and closely monitored by DA-BAR.

CAPSU's Organic Agriculture Program aims at developing new technologies on organic farming and extending these to the farmers and various stakeholders.

Among the trainings conducted were: trainings on Vermicomposting, Revitalizing the Soil, EM Concoctions Production, Revitalizing the Soil, EM

Concoction Production and Organic Production, Vermicomposting Production, Organic Sugarcane and Corn Production, Organic Free Range Chicken Production and Feed Formulation.

On October 14-18, 2018, with the aid of the DA-BAR, CAPSU's organic agriculture program was chosen by the People's Television Network (PTV) of their TV program "Mag-Agri Tayo," focusing on the promotion of agriculture and aquaculture.


Capiz State University plays a catalyzing role, promoting and stimulating interactions between and within the Province of Capizl level.



NUMBER OF TRAININGS ON SKILLS DEVELOPMENT




NUMBER OF BENEFICIARIES SERVED



PERSONNEL DEVELOPMENT



he administration is really trying its best so that everyone finds his way through promotion considering the points that academic personnel gained based on their NBC 461 points. However for non - academic personnel, for as long as there are vacant position, everyone is given the chance to apply and pass the screening conducted by the promotion and selection board based on the Merit System of the University.

As of 2018, ten (10) Instructor I positions were filled up considering vertical articulation.

For non – teaching personnel, there were 15 position filled –up in the same year: one (1) College Librarian, 2 Guidance Counselor III; 2 Administrative Officer; 4 Administrative Aide; 2 Administrative Aide III; 1 Administrative Aide VI; one each for Farm Worker, Food Services Supervisor and Nurse II.

Thirteen (13) academic personnel were promoted in 2018. One was promoted to Associate Professor V; 2 Associate Professor IV; 3 Associate Professor I; 3 Assistant Professor 1; 1 Instructor III and 3 Instructor 1.

Four (4) non – academic personnel had the chance of being promoted to Administrative Aide VI, Administrative Officer II and Administrative Officer I.






