Integrity



A BRIEFHISTORY

From humble beginnings, a university grew...

Since its inception in the early 1980s, the modest roots of the institution have become a formidable foundation strengthened through the adept and capable governance of its competent leaders creating positive impact on people. With a fierce commitment to provide quality service to all, Capiz State University, along with its strong and competent task force, maintains a vision with goals leading to a foreseeable future of producing globally-competitive graduates. Today, the university and its nine campuses and satellite colleges, is a landmark as much for its place in the community as its academic programs, research developments and extension services, and continues to grow.

A BRIEF HISTORY

THE PILLARS OF CAPSU

During his time as president, Dr. Botin worked hard to enhance and strengthen the faculty of the growing institution. Championing faculty development, he used to say that it is easier to build buildings than to build people. Perhaps this is due to the fact that he had to weather the odds for the sake of his colleagues. By and large, Botin's pursuit of enhancing the faculty despite the criticisms and difficulties merited him the eternal gratitude of those people who he had helped.

It is under Dr. Rochellir D. Dadivas' leadership when Capiz State University achieved many citations and accolades especially in the research development and extension upon the integration of HEIs in the province. Continuing the legacy left by the previous administration, Dr. Dadivas pursued and enhanced existing programs established and gave way to further innovations in the institution.

When Dr. Editha Magallanes was reappointed as president of the Capiz State University in 2012, it only reaffirmed her exemplary leadership that has eventually brought this thriving institution to prominence both in the national and the international stage.

Envisioning CAPSU as the center of academic excellence that renders quality service to the province and its constituents, Magallanes embarked on transforming the institution by prioritizing instruction, research, extension, and production through effective and efficient administration.

 Excerpts from the article "FULFILLING THE PROMISE: Making the Mark as SUC President" by Johnny Dariagan, Mark Glenn Villamor and Niño Manaog, Nuggets, Vol. 3 No. 1, April 2014 he Capiz State University started with the merger of Mambusao Agricultural and Technical College (MATEC) in Burias, Mambusao and the Capiz Agricultural and Fishery School (CAFS) in Bailan, Pontevedra to become the Panay State Polytechnic College (PSPC) by virtue of Batas Pambansa Blg. 91 signed by President Ferdinand E. Marcos on December 24. 1980.

At the time of the merging of the two schools, MATEC (started June 22, 1958 by virtue of RA 2088, which has two existing satellite campuses located in Tapaz and Sapian) and CAFS (started June 21, 1957 by virtue of RA 1785 and 1786) were headed by Dr. Ernesto V. Botin and Dr. Wenceslao O. Sison Jr., as Superintendents, respectively. The seat of administration of PSPC was in Burias, Mambusao.

On August 29, 1981, Dr. Ernesto V. Botin took his oath of office as the first PSPC President and Dr. Wenceslao O. Sison Jr. became his Vice President. With the appointment of Dr. Sison as College President of Northern Iloilo Polytechnic State College, Dr. Anthony N. Navarrosa was appointed to take over his place as Vice President which was later upgraded to the position of Executive Vice President. The head of the campuses were called Deans.

In 1982, with the approval of the Board of Trustees, the Office of the College President added satellite campuses in the municipalities of Dumarao and Pilar. In 1986, President Corazon C. Aquino reappointed Dr. Botin as PSPC President. When his term ended on July 24, 1993, Dr. Navarrosa, the Executive Vice President, served as Officer-in-Charge of the College until the appointment of Dr. Rochellir D. Dadivas as the second PSPC President on October 12, 1994.

During the time of Dr. Dadivas, he was assisted by Dr. Anthony N. Navarrosa, Executive Vice President; Dr. Editha L. Magallanes, Vice President for Academic Affairs; and Dr. Nicolas A. Braña, Sr., Vice President for Research, Development and Extension.

In accordance with the pertinent provisions of Republic Act 7722 (otherwise known as the Higher Education Act of 1994) and Republic Act 8992, on November 4, 1998, the Capiz Institute of Technology (founded 1917) in Roxas City, including its Department of Fisheries in Dayao (formerly Capiz School of Fisheries founded 1961), became an integral part of the PSPC system. This was approved in the 54th Regular Board Meeting held at the CHED Conference Room, San Miguel Avenue, Ortigas Center, Pasig City. However, the official turnover was done on October 25, 1999 by CHED Region VI-Western Visayas Director Tomas P. Parreño to PSPC President Dadivas. Then, on December 19, 2000, Sigma College of Science and Technology (started January 1, 1996 by virtue of RA 7973) in Sigma, Capiz was integrated into PSPC.

A BRIEF HISTORY

In 1999, Cong. Manuel "Mar" A. Roxas of the 1st District of Capiz filed a bill seeking for the conversion of PSPC into a state university. Both the City Council of Roxas City and the Provincial Board of Capiz passed the resolution supporting the bill.

On September 15, 2000, the Board of Trustees approved the new organizational structure of the College with three (3) units, namely: the Roxas City Unit, the Mambusao Unit and the Pontevedra Unit. Each unit was headed by a Chancellor. The Mambusao Unit has six (6) satellite campuses: Burias Campus in Mambusao, Sapian Campus, Tapaz Campus, Sigma Campus, Mambusao Campus, and Dumarao Campus. The Pontevedra

In March 2002 the bill for the conversion of PSPC into a state university was approved in the House of Representatives and the Senate approved the same measure on February 6, 2004. Cong. Rodriguez D. Dadivas of the 1st Congressional District and Cong. Fredenil H. Castro of the 2nd Congressional District were responsible in lobbying for the passage of the conversion law.

Then, a milestone was reached on March 21, 2004, when President Gloria Macapagal-Arroyo signed into law Republic Act No. 9273 at Capiz Provincial Capitol, Roxas City converting PSPC into a state university, the Capiz State University. At the time of the conversion, the incumbent

At the time of the conversion, the incumbent Governor of Capiz was Hon. Vicente B. Bermejo with Hon. Victor A. Tanco as Vice Governor. Following the provision of the University Charter, the seat of administration was transferred to Roxas City.

Unit has Pontevedra Campus and Pilar Campus; while the Roxas City Unit has Roxas City Campus and Dayao Campus. The first Chancellors were Dr. Nenita A. Beluso for Pontevedra Unit, Supt. Primitivo V. Bangcoyo for Roxas City Unit and Dr. Geronimo L. Gregorio for Mambusao Unit. The campuses were headed by Campus Administrators who report directly to the Chancellors.

In 2001, the seat of administration was transferred to Mambusao Campus for accessibility and ease of communication. The second sets of Chancellors were Dr. Edgar M. Dilla for Pontevedra Unit, Dr. Genoveva N. Labaniego for Mambusao Unit and Dr. Evaristo M. Magoncia for Roxas City Unit. With the retirement of Dr. Navarrosa in 2003, the position of Executive Vice President, being co-terminus, ceased to exist.

Governor of Capiz was Hon. Vicente B. Bermejo with Hon. Victor A. Tanco as Vice Governor. Following the provision of the University Charter, the seat of administration was transferred to Roxas City.

Dr. Rochellir D. Dadivas, the incumbent PSPC President at the time of conversion became the first University President. The three Vice Presidents were Dr. Editha L. Magallanes, Vice President for Administration and Finance; Dr. Aladino L. Leccio, Vice President for Academic Affairs; and Dr. Geronimo L. Gregorio, Vice President for Research and Extension.

On July 7, 2008, after the retirement of Dr. Dadivas as University President, Dr. Editha L. Magallanes was appointed as the second University President of Capiz State University. During the term of Dr. Magallanes, her

CONTINUING THE LEGACY

Dr. Editha C. Alfon, who after having been installed into office as University President of Capiz State University in September 8, 2016, further exemplifies her true dedication to quality service to the university with integrity, transparency, and accountability.

Dr. Alfon who rose from being a faculty member, a Registrar, a Campus Administrator, a Vice President for Academic Affairs, and now a University President, truly and completely prepared her to be one- a true and experienced leader. A very simple lady who intentionally looks at the person's capacity to lead, and willingly trains anyone who desires to be one.

Vice Presidents were Dr. Aladino L. Leccio for Administration and Finance, Dr. Herminia B. Gomez for Academic Affairs and Dr. Geronimo L. Gregorio for Research, Development and Extension (RDE). Per Board of Regents' Resolution No. 1112, series of 2009, the chancellor positions were abolished in view of overlapping functions with the campus administrators.

Having been rated Outstanding by the Evaluation and Search Committee towards the end of her first term as University President in June 2012, Dr. Editha L. Magallanes was re-appointed as President of Capiz State University on July 7, 2012.

With the retirement of Dr. Gregorio, Dr. Cora F. Navarra replaced him as Vice President for Research, Development and Extension effective November 7, 2012. The untimely death of Dr. Cora F. Navarra, left the VP RDE office vacant. Dr. Pedro G. Gavino was then designated as the Officerin-Charge on March 5, 2014 and assumed office on June 1 of the same year.

With the retirement of Dr. Herminia B. Gomez in September 17, 2014, Dr. Editha C. Alfon was designated as the Vice-President for Academic Affairs until September 7, 2016. And now, she serves as the University President after the retirement of Dr. Editha L. Magallanes.

Dr. Alfon holds the university presidency effective September 8, 2016 to date by virtue of Resolution No. 50, series of 2016. The three vice presidents of the new administration are Dr. Nilo D. Delfin as the VP for Administration and Finance, Dr. Susan O. Dangan as the VP for Academic Affairs, and Dr. Lucy A. Beluso as the VP for Research Development and Extension.

By virtue of BOR Resolution No 117, series of 2017, the post for Vice President for External Affairs and Linkages was created. Dr. Mary Ann B. Martelino was designated as the first Vice President for External Affairs and Linkages.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The year 2019 is remarkably one of the most successful years in the existence of Capiz State University as it unstoppably worked in addressing maximum clientele satisfaction in all its four-fold functions of instruction, research, extension and production.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

apiz State University successfully catered the instructional needs of its 25, 518 students from its graduate, tertiary, post secondary, and secondary programs and graduated 3, 838 in 2019, and produced the biggest number of Latin Awardees of 206. It was first in the existence of the university when it held its First Joint Commencement Exercises of the nine (9) campuses and satellite colleges at Villareal Stadium, Roxas City in April 2, 2019.

Fifty percent (50%) of the curricular programs with licensure examination registered passing rate higher than the national passing percentage, mostly were education and engineering. This was further proven by the 4th Placer produced by CapSU Pilar in the person of Rafy Dohinog Parpa in its Bachelor of Science in Social Work in the last August 2019 licensure examination.

Furthermore, the 2019 Mechanical Engineering registered a much higher passing rate of 80.95 %, very much higher compared to the national passing percentage of 43.07%. The three campuses of Pontevedra, Burias, and Dumarao which offer Bachelor of Secondary Education likewise registered passing rates much higher percentages of 67.26%, 58.89%, 58.97%, respectively. [Compared to the national passing percentage of 39.69%].

CapSU already crafted its SIP Manual and submitted for the BOR approval in December 2019. Consequently, thirty one (31) of the graduating students triumphantly enjoyed the internationalization programs of the university through their mobility in varied internship programs abroad in the field of education, hotel management, and agriculture in Thailand, Indonesia, and Israel. CapSU students were sincerely accommodated in Pattana Golf Club in Thailand, University Islam and State University of Padang, Indonesia, University of Muhammadiyah Prof. Dr. Hamka, Nakhon SI Thammarath Rajabhat University, and Oakwood Hotel in Thailand, Universitas Pedidikan, Indonesia (UPI) Bandong, Universitas Negeri Yoggakarta and Universitas Negeri Muhammadiyah Purwokert in Indonesia, and in Agro-Studies/CahampionFarm Magawari, and Daniel Hen Farm, Kefar Achim in Israel.

Relative to the ISO Certification, the university which was officially issued on Nov. 27, 2018, the 1st Surveillance visit in Oct. 24-25, 2019 also yielded positive result.

The university never ceased from soaring higher heights through constant submission of curricular programs for higher accreditation, eight (8) programs were submitted for Level 3-Phase 1, three (3) new programs were submitted for Preliminary Survey Visits and one (1) was submitted for Level 4-Phase 1 utilizing the OBE survey instrument.

Believing that human resources are the best assets of the academe that necessitate constant enhancement, as of December 2019, forty one [41] new instructor positions were filled-up, and seventy five [75] academic personnel were promoted to higher academic ranks based on NBC points. Likewise, seven [7] non-academic personnel were also hired, and six [6] were also promoted. As a matter of fact, as of December 2019, 53.11% of academic personnel occupied professorial positions, 31.0% are associate professors, 21.0% are asst. professors, and 37.0% are instructors.

Through the continuous professional enhancement program of the university, to date, 85 faculty members are presently enrolled in doctorate degree programs vertically articulated to their master's and are expected to graduate in two to three years.

The Best Faculty, Employee, and Student of the Year 2019 were awarded during the Foundation Day of Capiz State University.

Harmonization of curricular programs was also simultaneously conducted in the months of June to July 2019 to comply with the 36-unit requirement of CMO 20, S. 2013 for the General Education Courses.

CapSU was consistently adjudged for the 3rd time as Regional Winner for Gawad Kalasag during the awarding ceremony held last June 2019.

Mr. Anthony E. Lopez participated in the Women Deliver Conference in Vancouver, Canada last Jan. 31, 2019 and became part of the UBUNTU Servant Leadership joined by different countries of the world. Krishia Ann Labon was considered one of the Regional Finalists of TOSP, and nine [9] students of the university joined Batang Capiznon Award Search for TOSC.

Thirty eight thousand seven hundred sixty two (38,762) students also enjoyed the various medical and dental services of the university and excelled in the Annual Provincial Sandugo Blood Olympics Awarding Ceremony in Dec. 11, 2019.

A total of 46, 989 library users were served, borrowing at least 19, 371 books. Libraries have purchased 1,914 titles of books with 3,386 copies amounting to 5,468,513.99, and subscription of journals which reached 684,572.91. Major library development for the year were the construction of the new library buildings of CAPSU Pontevedra and the main campus, repainting of the Gabaldon Building of the Main campus, purchase of ICT and AV equipment, installation of air-condition units, upgrading of internet connections, and purchase and fabrication of furniture of libraries, and refurbishing of existing ones.



BOOKS UTILIZATION STATISTICS | CY 2019



Enhance industry collaboration and linkages with partner agencies

Capiz State University's involvement in international dimension and student mobility has never been more visible in the last few years. The key officials and other stakeholders took the initiatives to promote internationalization with the aim of establishing profile that reaches international standards of excellence.

apiz State University's involvement in international dimension and student mobility has never been more visible in the last few years. The key officials and other stakeholders took the initiatives to promote internationalization with the aim of establishing profile that reaches international standards of excellence.

To commence the internationalization process, the university developed an Internationalization Plan which will serve as the Bible of the university in its quest to be a globalized academic community. The plan was approved by the Honorable Members of the Board of Regents last December 2019 BOR Meeting. The same with other academic institutions, the university has the following reasons for internationalizing: to improve student readiness; internationalize the curriculum; enhance the

international profile of the institution; strengthen research and knowledge production; and diversify its faculty and staff.

As its maiden international activity, CAPSU takes part in student exchange programmes and academic collaborations with a number of foreign countries through programs such as: [1] the SEA-Teacher Project "Pre-Service Student Teacher Exchange in Southeast Asia" a project spearheaded by the Southeast Asian Ministers; [2] the SEA-TVET, a consortium which comprises Technical and Vocational Education and Training (TVET) institutions in SEAMEO Member Countries that agree to work together in harmonizing and internationalizing their programmers through curriculum harmonization, students and staff exchange, and industrial attachment, and resource sharing; and [3] Agro Studies International Internship Program in Israel. These initiatives suggest that the internationalization of higher education has found a place in Capiz State University.

In efforts to become globally diverse, Capiz State University has to invest more. There is a strong need to go through great lengths to catch up with the constantly evolving nature of this phenomenon by subscribing to and promoting practices that correspond to what is considered standard in the overall discourse of internationalization. While CAPSU continues to invest aggressively on what has worked so far --putting an international face on institutional elements from curricula to campus environment, all the way to program designs highlighting best practices which could attract international partnerships around the globe. Even so, the institution had remained committed to its internationalization goals as it intensify the growth in inbound and outbound mobility as well as the deepening of partnerships with counterparts in the neighbouring countries-all in the name of delivering quality service to all.

Moreover, strengthening the relationship between and/or among partner agencies is of utmost importance to express commitment and support in this significant endeavour.

For the Academic Year 2019, CAPSU has a total of 31 outbound student participants and 22 inbound student participants through international student internship and exchange programs.





SUBMISSIONS FOR IP PROTECTION




EXTENSION SERVICES





he administration is really trying its best so that everyone finds his way through promotion considering the points that academic personnel gained based on NBC 461 points. However for non - academic personnel, for as long as there are vacant position, everyone is given the chance to apply and pass the screening conducted by the promotion and selection board based on the Merit System of the University.

As of 2019, twenty-nine (29) Instructor I and Instructor II positions were filled up considering vertical articulation.

For non-teaching personnel, there were three (3) positions filled-up in the same year: one (1) Administrative Officer I (Cashier); 1 Administrative Aide IV; and 1 Nurse II.

Forty-one (41) academic personnel were promoted in 2019. Four (4) was promoted to Professor VI; 2 Professor V; 7 Associate Professor V; 4 Associate Professor IV; 3 Associate Professor III; 7 Associate Professor II: 1 Associate Professor I: 2 Assistant Professor IV: 2 Assistant Professor III: 1 Assistant Professor II: 3 Assistant Professor I: 4 Instructor III. and 1 Instructor II.

Six (6) non - academic personnel were promoted to Registrar III, Administrative Officer IV, Internal Auditor I, Accountant IV, Security Guard III and Administrative Assistant III.

OUALITY MANAGEMENT SYSTEM

CAPSU hurdles 1st ISO 9001:2015 Surveillance Visit

Capiz State University (CapSU) - With the ultimate aim to continuously improve and sustain the standards of Quality Management System, the university undergone the ISO 9001:2015 1st Surveillance Audit last October 24-25, 2019.

The two-day surveillance audit aimed to maintain confidence that the certified quality management system of the university continues to fulfill requirements between recertification audits. The certification scope covered during the audit was the Provision on Higher Education.

The opening meeting was held at the Conference Room of the Roxas City Main Campus and attended by the SOCOTEC auditors, university key officials, directors, campus administrators, quality assurance chairs, and student leaders of the nine (9) campuses. The Socotech auditors were headed by Mr. Kim Winston Pajares as the Lead Auditor, Ms. Miriam Abuana - Support Auditor, Mr. Mark Andrew Golez, and Mr. Erwin Quinto as the Technical Experts. Roxas City Main Campus, Burias, Pilar, Dumarao, and Central Administration were the campuses/sites visited by auditors.

At the closing meeting, Mr. Pajares gladly announced that the university sustained the ISO 9001:2015 Certification after a thorough assessment of its core functions.


