#### Integrity



# A BRIEF HISTORY

# From humble beginnings, a university grew...

Since its inception in the early 1980s, the modest roots of the institution have become a formidable foundation strengthened through the adept and capable governance of its competent leaders creating positive impact on people. With a fierce commitment to provide quality service to all, Capiz State University, along with its strong and competent task force, maintains a vision with goals leading to a foreseeable future of producing globally-competitive graduates. Today, the university with its nine campuses and satellite colleges, is a landmark as much for its place in the community as its academic programs, research development and extension services, and production continue to grow.

# THE PILLARS OF CAPSU

During his time as president, Dr. Botin worked hard to enhance and strengthen the faculty of the growing institution. Championing faculty development, he used to say that it is easier to build buildings than to build people. Perhaps this is due to the fact that he had to weather the odds for the sake of his colleagues. By and large, Botin's pursuit of enhancing the faculty despite the criticisms and difficulties merited him the eternal gratitude of those people whom he had helped.

It is under Dr. Rochellir D. Dadivas' leadership when Capiz State University achieved many citations and accolades especially in the research development and extension upon the integration of HEIs in the province. Continuing the legacy left by the previous administration, Dr. Dadivas pursued and enhanced existing programs established and gave way to further innovations in the institution.

When Dr. Editha Magallanes was reappointed as president of the Capiz State University in 2012, it only reaffirmed her exemplary leadership that has eventually brought this thriving institution to prominence both in the national and the international stage.

Envisioning CAPSU as the center of academic excellence that renders quality service to the province and its constituents, Magallanes embarked on transforming the institution by prioritizing instruction, research, extension, and production through effective and efficient administration.

 Excerpts from the article "FULFILLING THE PROMISE: Making the Mark as SUC President" by Johnny Dariagan, Mark Glenn Villamor and Niño Manaog, Nuggets, Vol. 3 No. 1, April 2014 he Capiz State University started with the merger of Mambusao Agricultural and Technical College (MATEC) in Burias, Mambusao and the Capiz Agricultural and Fishery School (CAFS) in Bailan, Pontevedra to become the Panay State Polytechnic College (PSPC) by virtue of Batas Pambansa Blg. 91 signed by President Ferdinand E. Marcos on December 24, 1980.

At the time of the merging of the two schools, MATEC (started June 22, 1958 by virtue of RA 2088, which has two existing satellite campuses located in Tapaz and Sapian) and CAFS (started June 21, 1957 by virtue of RA 1785 and 1786) were headed by Dr. Ernesto V. Botin and Dr. Wenceslao O. Sison Jr., as Superintendents, respectively. The seat of administration of PSPC was in Burias, Mambusao, Capiz.

On August 29, 1981, Dr. Ernesto V. Botin took his oath of office as the first PSPC President and Dr. Wenceslao O. Sison Jr. became his Vice President. With the appointment of Dr. Sison as College President of Northern Iloilo Polytechnic State College, Dr. Anthony N. Navarrosa was appointed to take over his place as Vice President which was later upgraded to the position of Executive Vice President. Then, the heads of the campuses were called deans.

In 1982, with the approval of the Board of Trustees, the Office of the College President added satellite campuses in the municipalities of Dumarao and Pilar. In 1986, President Corazon C. Aquino reappointed Dr. Botin as PSPC President. When his term ended on July 24, 1993, Dr. Navarrosa, the Executive Vice President, served as Officer-in-Charge of the College until the appointment of Dr. Rochellir D. Dadivas as the second PSPC President on October 12, 1994.

During the time of Dr. Dadivas, he was assisted by Dr. Anthony N. Navarrosa, Executive Vice President; Dr. Editha L. Magallanes, Vice President for Academic Affairs; and Dr. Nicolas A. Braña, Sr., Vice President for Research, Development and Extension.

In accordance with the pertinent provisions of Republic Act 7722 (otherwise known as the Higher Education Act of 1994) and Republic Act 8992, on November 4, 1998, the Capiz Institute of Technology (founded 1917) in Roxas City, including its Department of Fisheries in Dayao (formerly Capiz School of Fisheries founded 1961), became an integral part of the PSPC system. This was approved in the 54th Regular Board Meeting held at the CHED Conference Room, San Miguel Avenue, Ortigas Center, Pasig City. However, the official turnover was done on October 25, 1999 by CHED Region VI-Western Visayas Director Tomas P. Parreño to PSPC President Dadivas. Then, on December 19, 2000, Sigma College of Science and Technology (started January 1, 1996 by virtue of RA 7973) in Sigma, Capiz was integrated into PSPC.

### A BRIEF HISTORY

In 1999, Cong. Manuel "Mar" A. Roxas of the 1st District of Capiz filed a bill seeking for the conversion of PSPC into a state university. Both the City Council of Roxas City and the Provincial Board of Capiz passed the resolution supporting the bill.

On September 15, 2000, the Board of Trustees approved the new organizational structure of the College with three (3) units, namely: the Roxas City Unit, the Mambusao Unit and the Pontevedra Unit. Each unit was headed by a Chancellor. The Mambusao Unit has six (6) satellite campuses: Burias Campus in Mambusao, Sapian Campus, Tapaz Campus, Sigma Campus, Mambusao Campus, and Dumarao Campus. The Pontevedra

In March 2002 the bill for the conversion of PSPC into a state university was approved in the House of Representatives and the Senate approved the same measure on February 6, 2004. Cong. Rodriguez D. Dadivas of the 1st Congressional District and Cong. Fredenil H. Castro of the 2nd Congressional District were responsible in lobbying for the passage of the conversion law.

Then, a milestone was reached on March 21, 2004, when President Gloria Macapagal-Arroyo signed into law Republic Act No. 9273 at Capiz Provincial Capitol, Roxas City converting PSPC into a state university, the Capiz State University. At the time of the conversion, the incumbent

At the time of the conversion, the incumbent Governor of Capiz was Hon. Vicente B. Bermejo with Hon. Victor A. Tanco as Vice Governor. Following the provision of the University Charter, the seat of administration was transferred to Roxas City.

Unit has Pontevedra Campus and Pilar Campus; while the Roxas City Unit has Roxas City Campus and Dayao Campus. The first Chancellors were Dr. Nenita A. Beluso for Pontevedra Unit, Supt. Primitivo V. Bangcoyo for Roxas City Unit and Dr. Geronimo L. Gregorio for Mambusao Unit. The campuses were headed by Campus Administrators who report directly to the Chancellors.

In 2001, the seat of administration was transferred to Mambusao Campus for accessibility and ease of communication. The second sets of Chancellors were Dr. Edgar M. Dilla for Pontevedra Unit, Dr. Genoveva N. Labaniego for Mambusao Unit and Dr. Evaristo M. Magoncia for Roxas City Unit. With the retirement of Dr. Navarrosa in 2003, the position of Executive Vice President, being co-terminus, ceased to exist.

Governor of Capiz was Hon. Vicente B. Bermejo with Hon. Victor A. Tanco as Vice Governor. Following the provision of the University Charter, the seat of administration was transferred to Roxas City.

Dr. Rochellir D. Dadivas, the incumbent PSPC President at the time of conversion became the first University President. The three Vice Presidents were Dr. Editha L. Magallanes, Vice President for Administration and Finance; Dr. Aladino L. Leccio, Vice President for Academic Affairs; and Dr. Geronimo L. Gregorio, Vice President for Research and Extension.

On July 7, 2008, after the retirement of Dr. Dadivas as University President, Dr. Editha L. Magallanes was appointed as the second University President of Capiz State University. During the term of Dr. Magallanes, her

Dr. Editha C. Alfon, who after having been installed into office as University President of Capiz State University on September 8, 2016, further exemplifies her true dedication to quality service to the university with integrity, transparency, and accountability.

Dr. Alfon who rose from being a faculty member, a Registrar, a Campus Administrator, a Vice President for Academic Affairs, and now a University President, truly and completely prepared her to be one- a true and experienced leader. A very simple lady who intentionally looks at the person's capacity to lead, and willingly trains anyone who desires to be one.

Her consistent exemplary performance and firm leadership style coupled with calm demeanor, catapulted her into a second term as University President of Capiz State University. She was re-appointed into office by the governing Board by virtue of Board Resolution No. 003, series of 2020 for a term of four (4) years commencing on September 8, 2020.

In Dr. Alfon's second term, the University is journeying ahead with courage and determination in achieving its vision of becoming "A highly globalized University towards a just and equitable society" by sustaining excellence in its various degree programs and improving the delivery of its services.

Vice Presidents were Dr. Aladino L. Leccio for Administration and Finance, Dr. Herminia B. Gomez for Academic Affairs and Dr. Geronimo L. Gregorio for Research, Development and Extension (RDE). Per Board of Regents' Resolution No. 1112, series of 2009, the chancellor positions were abolished in view of overlapping functions with the campus administrators.

Having been rated Outstanding by the Evaluation and Search Committee towards the end of her first term as University President in June 2012, Dr. Editha L. Magallanes was re-appointed as President of Capiz State University on July 7, 2012.

With the retirement of Dr. Gregorio, Dr. Cora F. Navarra replaced him as Vice President for Research, Development and Extension effective November 7, 2012. The untimely death of Dr. Cora F. Navarra, left the VP RDE office vacant. Dr. Pedro G. Gavino was then designated as the Officerin-Charge on March 5, 2014 and assumed office on June 1 of the same year.

With the retirement of Dr. Herminia B. Gomez in September 17, 2014, Dr. Editha C. Alfon was designated as the Vice-President for Academic Affairs until September 7, 2016. And now, she serves as the University President after the retirement of Dr. Editha L. Magallanes.

Dr. Alfon holds the university presidency effective September 8, 2016 to date by virtue of Resolution No. 50, series of 2016. The three vice presidents of the new administration are Dr. Nilo D. Delfin as the VP for Administration and Finance, Dr. Susan O. Dangan as the VP for Academic Affairs, and Dr. Lucy A. Beluso as the VP for Research Development and Extension.

By virtue of BOR Resolution No 117, series of 2017, the post for Vice President for External Affairs and Linkages was created. Dr. Mary Ann B. Martelino was designated as the first Vice President for External Affairs and Linkages.

With Dr. Alfon's dedicated service, participative leadership style, and transparent governance, she was re-appointed by the Board for a term of four (4) years as University President on September 8, 2020 by virtue of Board Resolution No. 003, series of 2020. The four (4) designated Vice Presidents under her second term are Dr. Wennie F. Legario as Vice President for Administration and Finance, Dr. Susan O. Dangan as Vice President for Academic Affairs, Dr. Efren L. Linan as Vice President for Research Development and Extension, and Dr. Mary Ann B. Martelino as Vice President for External Affairs and Linkages.



# EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The year 2020 is remarkably one of the most successful years in the existence of Capiz State University as it unstoppably worked in addressing maximum clientele satisfaction in all its four-fold functions of instruction, research, extension, and production.

# **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

apiz State University successfully served the 14,529 students for the First Semester, and 13,432 for the Second Semester of S.Y. 2019-2020, and graduated 1,222 in its secondary, tertiary, and graduate degree programs.

Due to COVID-19 pandemic, the University held the 16th Commencement Exercises virtually at the Dadivas Gymnasium of the CapSU Roxas City Main Campus on July 29, 2020, producing 76 Senior High School who graduated with honors, and 39 with high honors. For the tertiary programs, three graduated as Magna Cum Laudes and 17 as Cum Laudes. The BS Architecture registered a 41.67% passing percentage in the January 2020.

Relative to COVID-19 crises, the University crafted the Learning Continuity Plan approved by the Board of Regents in October 5, 2020 where all the strategies on how the four-dimension functions of the University this New Normal setting are embodied. Specifically, it included systems and procedures for the transition to flexible learning, project implementation, curriculum modification, resource and support services for students and faculty, intellectual property right, LGU, IATF and safety guidelines and the mechanism for continuous quality improvement of all processes. Also highlighted in the accomplishment for 2020, was the submission of the project proposal of CapSU Main for the initial subscription of the Learning Management System (LMS) in November to December 2020 of the University in order to provide a wide range of new applications and open-source technologies to support students' success in adapting to remote. Relatively, learning trainings were simultaneous conducted in order to equip faculty members with the knowledge and expertise in the effective delivery of instruction.

The Second Surveillance Audit for ISO Certification was conducted in January 13-14, 2021 by SOCOTECH. The University never stops from growing through submission of curricular programs to higher accreditation. As of December 2020, of the 21 graduate degree programs, three were submitted for Level 3, eight level 2, and level 1, respectively, and one was submitted for the Preliminary Survey. Of the 58 tertiary programs, 11 were accredited level 3, 21 level 2, 10 level 1, two candidate status, and 15 were submitted for Preliminary Survey Visits.

Considering human resource development, 14 non-academic personnel were hired, six were promoted, and one College Librarian was accommodated from DepEd. For academic personnel, 31 were hired Instructor 1, 28 were promoted to Assistant Professor and Associate Professor, and one non-academic personnel was absorbed as Instructor I. To further capacitate faculty members in coping with the dramatic changes brought about by COVID-19 pandemic in the performance of their respective functions and designation the University personnel had the chance to be part of the 566 national and international, 64 regional, and 39 local Webinars conducted by varied organizational and HEIs.

To constantly enhance curricular programs in compliance with some provisions in the Learning Continuity Plan, course outline modification was held considering significant concerns like essential competences, course requirements, and students' connectivity, among others.

To regularly trace the employability of graduates two years after graduation, the University had established in the 4th quarter (October-December) 53.53% employability rate two years after graduation.

The Office of Student Affairs desired and prepared its strategic capability to cope with the so called VUCA (Volatility, Uncertainly, Complexity and Ambiguity) of the situation in the academe. At a glance, 100% of the New and transfer students feeling connected to CapSU after the Virtual Orientation despite of the COVID-19 pandemic. The following activities were conducted in order to sustain connection to support student retention, and orient transfer student their parents and guardians and recruit students' involvement organizations.



To constantly enhance curricular programs in compliance with some provisions in the Learning Continuity Plan, course outline modification was held considering significant concerns like essential competences, course requirements, and

students' connectivity, among others.

5, 195 TES grantees received the financial assistance amounting to 142,710,000.00 from January to December 2020, 133 student organizations, were accredited, and students were given access to online trainings and seminars, 7 students excelled on various fields when they were awarded by different agencies. Student Affairs office also excelled in the provisions of health and wellness services like physical examinations, outpatient services, medicine dispensing, blood pressure monitoring, wound dressing and first aid, dental services, health education services. health and wellness development, and issuance of medical certificates.

To further prepare students in leading impactful lives through career placement and career readiness in the workplace, alumni engagement through networking, gaining experience through internship and research, and leadership development, 106 student leaders attended various international, national and local leadership trainings conducted by different organizations. Furthermore, Mr. Anthony Lopez and Jefferson Escalada participated the Ubunto Leadership Academy participated by young leaders of 50 countries with the aim of training young leaders potential in leading social, academic and government organizations.

The Office of External Affairs ang Linkages has implemented more flexible mobility formats for internalization, local and in campus programs and activities: For student internship Abroad Programs, six students were privileged to be part of the SIAP for Agro-Studies (September 22, 2019 -September 20, 2020). They were Josiah Ed Spencer J. Catubuan and Shyn B. Gallenero and for SIAP (July 25, 2019-April 15, 2020) lan Jony Arallando Castro, John Enoslay, Patrick Prad Vijar, and Ralph Dimacali Famillaran. For the faculty Exchange Program, the University was able to forge MOA with the University of Mercu Buana Yogyakarta on January 2020.

To further enhance learning across boarders series of video conferencing were successfully conducted with international guest speakers from international partner agencies through conduct of Webinars which started on December 2020 with the participation of topnotch faculty members of CapSU Dr. Louis Placido Lachica, Dr. Christine F. Quengca, Dr. Hazel Joaquin, Dr. Judel Protacio, and Prof. Mark Glenn Villamor, and the equally competent resource speakers from UMBY. Virtual Research Collaboration with CapSU Researchers' team and UMBY was likewise successfully established.

The faculty researchers of the Capiz State University (CAPSU) were able to present their findings to the two (2) symposia conducted by the Research, Development, and Extension (RDE) Office with a total of 89 research outputs for 2020. To continuously improve the research outputs of the University, the RDE conducted two (2) In-House Reviews. Through the said activities, the faculty researchers were able to present a total of 139 research proposals in different levels.

The university researchers won various awards during the Western Visayas Agriculture, Aquatic and Natural Resources Research and Development (WESVAARRDEC)'s 30th Regional Symposium on Research and Development Highlights held via Zoom on December 10-11, 2020. The RDE maintains four (4) externally funded projects, namely: 1) From Substrates to Utilization: Ensuring Vermicompost Quality and Safety; 2) Upgrading of Crop and Soil Science Laboratory of Capiz State University; 3) Intellectual Property and Technology Business Management (IP-TBM); and 4) Agri-Aqua Technology Business Incubator (ATBI).

In response to the COVID 19, the CAPSU RDE through the project Agri-agua Technology Business Incubator Project, conducted an activity entitled "COVID-R:" A CAPSULE-ATBI Initiative to extend support to the incubatees business ventures and sustenance to the needs of the frontliners in the midst of fighting the COVID-19 pandemic.

The University through the SUSTAIN IP-TBM Phase 2 project and DOST-TAPI has filed 3 technologies for patents, 15 technologies for utility models, and 5 for copyright applications. A total of 23 applications filed for the Year 2020.

On November 23-27, 2020, the Capiz State University - Research, Development and Extension (CAPSU-RDE) Office conducted the PAGTUKIB 2020, a yearly activity to showcase the research endeavors and innovation as well as technology transfer through extension and commercialization activities of the University. The PAGTUKIB activity also enables the University to reach our industry partners through the conduct of press conference and the commercialization of our developed technologies and industry-academe-government collaboration.



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The COVID-19 pandemic has changed the world. Due to the nature of the virus, particularly how it is transmitted, it has altered human behaviors, relations and lifestyles, and had profound impacts on the economic, political and cultural landscapes of societies across the world. It has likewise exacerbated poverty, discrimination and inequalities in many

parts of the world, not only through how COVID-19 appears to be affecting poorer communities more than the rich, but also as a consequence of the measures taken by states to control the spread of the virus, primarily by curtailing freedom of movement through the imposition of community quarantine, lockdowns and curfews in many parts of the world.

On infrastructures, a total of P33,589,324.52 million for the new construction of buildings in Pontevedra, Tapaz, Central, Dumarao, and Roxas City campuses.

The Office of the VP for Admin. and Finance conducted meetings on BAC members to enhance efficiency on procurement procedures.

The director on landholdings has secured the titling of land areas totaling 411.5383 hectares in 122 numbers of lots distributed among campuses. Lots without Certificate of titles are on processed. Out of 112 lots, 37 were already under the name of CAPSU, 16 members name of donors, and 59 are still untitled.




As reflected, generally, the mode preferred by most students is modular since most of them had poor connectivity due to their geographical locations, their economic statuses and availability of information technology.






The COVID-19 pandemic is prompting academic institutions to abruptly and comprehensively adopt online learning, remote work, and other activities to help contain the spread of the virus.








Although there were no face-to-face classes during the First Semester of Academic Year 2020-2021 due to COVID-19 pandemic, the total number of library clients catered in all campuses during CY 2020 was 32,494. Almost 90% of this number was catered from January 2020 to second week of March 2020 before the lockdown. The top three courses with the largest percentage of library clients were Education students (34%), followed by Business and Management students (25%), Agriculture & Fishery students (10%), and Criminology students (10%). Seven percent (7%) of the library clients were faculty and staff.



For CY 2020, the three campuses with the most number of clients served were Pontevedra (10,383), Roxas City (8,594) and Dayao (5,043).

# PURCHASED BOOKS BY CAMPUS ACCORDING TO NUMBER OF TITLES AND COPIES | CY 2020




For CY 2020, the total number of books purchased by all campuses according to number of titles and number of copies was 1,102 and 1,464, respectively.


#### **DUNGOG 2020**

The technologies/machineries were turned over to the Local Government Unit of Pres. Roxas representative Engr. Arnel Dislag at the ATBI office.



The ATBI team had applied and secured a Fairness Opinion Report (FOR) through the Department of Science and Technology VI for the commercialization of the Botanical Dewormer Technology through Spin-Off by Dr. Bede Ozaraga. The FOR was issued on April 3, 2020 and was approved and endorsed to proceed for Licensing the by the Hon. DOST Secretary Fortunato T. Dela Peña on April 7, 2020.

The recent unprecedented and extraordinary public health emergency brought about by the COVID-19 pandemic is noticeably slowing down the economy of the whole country. This also affects the incubatees capacity to produce and sell their products.

The webinar was hosted by CAPSU while two (2) participants from University of Antique (UA), Aklan State University (ASU), Northern Iloilo Polytechnic State College (NIPSC), Central Philippine State University CPSU, Guimaras State College and one from each campus/satellite college of Capiz State University.

#### CAPSU conducted IP-TBM Masterclass Virtual Training (Module 1 and 2)

To mentor and capacitate the technology transfer officers of the participating mentee-agencies, Capiz State University conducted the Intellectual Property (IP) Masterclass from July 27-19 and August 3-4, 2020. Capiz State University leads the DOST-PCAARRD funded project titled "Sustaining Capiz State University's IP-TBM Office and Enhancing IP-TBM Offices among Member Agencies of the Western Visayas Agriculture, Aquatic and Natural Resources Research and Development Consortium (WESVAARRDEC)." The five-day IP Masterclass aimed to enhance and operationalize the IP-TBMs in Western Visayas. These IP-TBM Offices include the following SUCs in Western Visayas: Aklan State University (ASU), Northern Iloilo Polytechnic State College (NIPSC), Central Philippine State University (CPSU), Guimaras State University (GSU), and University of Antique (UA).

Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, presentations, assessments, and workshops were made possible through a video conferencing app. Among the topics discussed were on Intellectual Property Management which focused on the Overview of the IP System, Relevance of IP to the academe, the Innovator Mindset, Patents, Copyright, Trademark and Essential Elements of IP Policy and Technology Transfer Protocol. Moreover, the masterclass included discussions on how to prepare technology disclosure for both chemical and mechanical categories. Meanwhile, an overview of the prior art search which includes invention spotting, classification of patent documents, types of patent search, patent search tools and strategies was introduced. On the last day of the IP Masterclass, the participants were asked to revise their technology disclosures based on the new insights which they learned from the IP Masterclass.

The regional mentors were composed of IP Experts of Capiz State University, they were Engr. Efren L. Linan, Engr. Julito A. Albaladejo, Engr. Marilyn L. Bernabe, Engr. Monalyn L. Oloroso, Prof. Mark Glenn F. Villamor and Prof. Princess Lydia S. Fuentes. A total of 17 mentees participated in the IP Masterclass.

#### Technology Presentation of Calamansi Juice Extractor

The Department of Agri-Biosystems Engineering (DABE) of CAPSU Burias Campus conducted a hands-on technology presentation of the Calamansi Juice Extractor with the St. Joseph Tech-Voc Center, a probable technology adopter in Lawaan, Roxas City on August 9 of 2020. The client was moved by the presentation but still the client wants to have it modified according to their needs specifically to the quality of juice extracted from Calamansi.

#### CAPSU accomplishes IP Masterclass Virtual Training (Module 3)

With the success of the recently concluded IP-TBM Masterclass conducted by Capiz State University (CAPSU) along with the participating mentee-agencies across Western Visayas, CAPSU along with participating mentee-agencies completed the IP Masterclass Virtual Training Module 3 organized by the Philippine Council for Agriculture, Aquatic and Natural Resources Research and Development of the Department of Science and Technology (DOST-PCAARRD) in collaboration with APP (Association of PAQE Professionals, Inc.) mentors held via Zoom on August 10-14, 2020 for the Mechanical Category and August 17-21, 2020 for the Chemical Category The IP Masterclass Virtual Training Module 3 tapped selected patent agents to mentor the participants. These selected patent agents will guide the regional team in the breakout sessions. The IP Masterclass Module 3 was joined by five (5) regions, namely: 1) Bicol region; 2) Ilocos region; 3) South Luzon regions; 4) Southern Mindanao; and 5) Western Visayas.

In the IP Masterclass Virtual Training Module 3, the participants presented a group output in breakout sessions and draft an application with specification and claims. It also focused on specific skills such as analysis of invention disclosure, spotting the invention, analysis of prior art, analysis of invention with respect to prior art and constructing independent and dependent.

On November 23-27, 2020, the Capiz State University - Research, Development and Extension (CAPSU-RDE) Office conducted the PAGTUKIB 2020, a yearly activity to uncover the research endeavors and innovation as well as technology transfer through extension and commercialization activities of the University. The PAGTUKIB activity also enables the University to reach our industry partners for commercialization of our developed technologies and industry-academe-government collaboration.

# SOCIALLY RESPONSIVE

Undertake relevant research, development, and extension services

Hinged on the ideals of social responsibility, the Capiz State University (CapSU), through its Research, Development and Extension (RDE) Office, seeks to serve communities in partnership with other extension providers through educative programs and processes in order to improve the quality of life of its target beneficiaries and other stakeholders. Moreover, it undertakes such and other activities to help eliminate poverty and environmental degradation, among others.



s an advocate of social transformation, Capiz State University (CapSU) extends programs and activities which are "socially responsive to the needs of society and its people," in efforts to save the constituency from the pains of economic degradation, ecological imbalance, and social ills."

Community Extension Services Office (CESO), which is under the Research Development and Extension Office, takes the lead in implementing research-based community extension programs of the University. It also serves to coordinate, monitor, and evaluate the extension services rendered by the various institutes/programs in the partner communities of the University.

CAPSU focuses on biodiversity and sustainability, people empowerment and technology facilities diffusion among LGUs, recipient barangays and individuals by means of programs that can be considered people-oriented; relevant and sustainable; characterized by livelihood training; agro-industrial development solutions; technical assistance; and advocacy and consultancy, urban renewal, and cultural preservation and dissemination, socio-economic upliftment, environmental education, and cultural heritage conservation. People empowerment covers the health-related services, as well as the psycho-educational, media, and literacy programs. Socio-economic upliftment can be achieved through small scale business seminars, entrepreneurship trainings, and livelihood programs. Environmental concern includes programs on urban renewal, food hygiene, and sanitation trainings. And cultural heritage conservation


consists of activities on preservation of cultural heritage sites and promotion of Filipino customs.


In the days after COVID-19 was declared a pandemic, CAPSU responded quickly to provide COVID-19 information to rural communities and to adapt their regular outreach to the "new normal" of social distancing and noncontact communication. The Covid-19 pandemic constrained the mobility of experts assisting in the implementation of the project in the pilot provinces. There is also the prohibition of assembling a large body of people, which is necessary in conducting training programs in areas where digital technology is relatively undeveloped.

During the continued battle against COVID-19 from January to December 2020, few trainings were conducted/facilitated with more or less 7312 weighted number of participants only. The University staff acted either as facilitators, resource speakers, or evaluators in the conduct of the training. Seventy [70] recognized and community programs (with minimum of 8 contact hours) with BOR approval, MOA and approved budget were implemented on 2020. These programs were rated 100 percent by beneficiaries in terms of timeliness of the program delivered as best.

CAPSU also established 132 active linkages and/or partnership with other NGAs and different public/private organizations covered by MOA, MOU and BOR approved budget.



## COMMUNITY EXTENSION PROGRAMS | CY 2020



CAPSU Pontevedra on the new leadership of Extension Chair Prof. Jonan Burgos, conducted livelihood training. In order to augment the livelihood activities of the community, the College of Management developed an umbrella program aligned in the KaLaPIT (Kabuy-anan, Ikaayong Lawas, Panguma, Ihibalo kag Teknolohiya) Program. Under Community Development Project Tingob there were series of seminars and trainings conducted in parallel sessions to include Mental Health Awareness program, Food Hygiene Safety and Sanitation, Meat Processing and Baking. The trainings and seminars were participated by the different sectors/organizations in the community. Health and Safety Protocols were being imposed in reference to the IATF Guidelines. The Agricultural & Biosystems Engineering Department spearheaded the conduct of Technology Demonstration and Seminar on Smokehouse Stove, a machine used to preserve or process fish through smoking. This technology was developed by the BSABE Department which was a product of research and was being introduced to Fisher folks for possible adoption/utilization. A project 1 of ABE's Technology from Research for Extension, Adoption, Transfer and Utilization (TREAT-U) Program under the umbrella of KALAPIT. The Persons with Disability Office (PDAO)-Pontevedra invited CapSU Pontevedra Extension Office through College of Agriculture and Fisheries in order to avail the Training on Urban Gardening. It was participated by the Physically Challenged individuals who were eager to have their communal garden to be located in Brgy. Binuntucan, Pontevedra, Capiz. The training activity was held at Pontevedra Civic Center with actual demonstrations on dish gardening and concoctions making in the form of organic fertilizer. On the other hand, CapSU-Pontevedra Extension Services were tapped to provide Skills Training on Meat Processing to Locally Stranded Individuals. This training was funded locally by the LGU-MSWDO to augment livelihood income to selected LSIs. The said training provided an opportunity to participants to earn income during this pandemic. At the end of the training, there were provision of starter kits (cooking utensils and tools) to initially start their own business. The College of Agriculture and Fisheries were invited by the Office of the Municipal Agriculturist in Pilar Capiz to conduct training on Coastal Resource Management Plan (CRM). With the help of the COAF Experts, CapSU Extension Services sent different Trainers to present and discuss topics like Coastal Zonation, Mangrove Biology, Ecology and Taxonomy and Mangroves Conservation.

Hence, it continues to reach out and serve its various clienteles especially the community to the best of its abilities by empowering and providing them with increased opportunity to access technologies needed for educational and socio-economic development. In order to realize such goals, several extension programs of the department were established to satisfy the needs of the community and contribute to nation building. In various capacities and instances, the CAPSU Extension personnel likewise were given opportunities to take part in training, consultation, workshops and conferences and webinars of different agencies in the region and the country. Being true to its commitment - to serve, CapSU Burias Campus with its faculty and staff joined hands to step up against the invisible enemy, COVID19. They launched the following initiatives to support the country's effort against this public health emergency: Launching a campaign on COVID19 pandemic; Implementation of Memorandum Order and Presidential Proclamation 929; Distribution of food packs to the Frontliners; Giving out of grocery packs/cash assistance to CapSU Burias Job Order Personnel, Students and poor Families; Distribution of relief goods to the Construction Workers of the Panay River Control Project; and Distribution of assorted vegetable seeds to farmers and fresh vegetables to MDRRMO COVID19 Taskforce. #### **PROMOTION**

he administration is really trying its best so that everyone finds his/her way through promotion considering the points gained by academic personnel based on NBC 461. However for non academic personnel, for as long as there are vacant position, everyone is given the chance to apply and pass the screening conducted by the Promotion and Selection Board (PSB) based on the Merit System of the University.

As of 2020, 56 teaching positions were filled up considering vertical articulation.

Twenty-five (25) academic personnel were promoted to higher positions as Assistant Professors and Associate Professors. Twenty-one (21) nonteaching positions were filled-up and six (6) non-academic personnel were promoted to the higher level.

#### **OUALITY MANAGEMENT SYSTEM**

#### **CAPSU** maintains ISO Certification

The ISO 9001:2015 is the international standard specifying what a quality management system (QMS) is. The standard is used by CAPSU to show consistency in providing products and services that meet clientele and regulatory/statutory requirements. It is the most popular standard in the ISO 9000 series and the only standard in the series to which organizations can be certified. ISO 9001 was first published in 1987 by the International Organization for Standardization (ISO), an agency of more than 160 countries.

CAPSU is continuously committed to improve its Quality Management System, satisfy requirements of relevant interested parties and provide excellent service for quality education and innovative research aligned with sustainable development and client satisfaction.

To continuously conform to the prescribed standards, the University conducted various activities in preparation for the second surveillance visit on January 2021 by the SOCOTEC. A 2-Day ISO Refresher Training was held virtually last October 20-21, 2020 with Mr. Baltazar Lachica, as the resource speaker. It was participated by pool of Internal Auditors of the university. Moreover, a 2-Day Virtual Internal Audit was also conducted last November 5-6, 2020 among the nine campuses and central administration. The internal audit aimed to verify implementation of the established quality management system in conformance with the requirements of the standard, to identify opportunities for improvement to effectively implement the management system and to give recommendations for the maintenance of certificate. After that, a Post Meeting and Feedbacking of the Recent Internal Quality Audit (IQA) on November 26, 2020 was done to give feedbacks on the significant findings of the internal auditors. The Management Review was then pushed through on December 9, 2020 at the Central Office Board Room at CAPSU Dayao, Roxas City.


#### Promote entrepreneurship and environmental consciousness

But despite of the uncertainties, the efficient management of the income generating projects remain stable.

#### **IGP REPORT 2020**

The net income of IGPs of the nine (9) campuses including the printing press reached Php 1, 652, 460.89. The IGPs earned included income from fishponds, coconuts, rice, crops, animals, rentals, canteen, review center, travel 6 tour, and printing press. It can be noted that the income of some projects declined significantly due to pandemic.

#### CONSOLIDATED CASH FLOW | CY 2020




Gross Income


