Integrity



From humble beginnings, a university grew... A BRIEF HISTORY

THE PILLARS OF CAPSU

During his time as president, Dr. Botin worked hard to enhance and strengthen the faculty of the growing institution. Championing faculty development, he used to say that it is easier to build buildings than to build people. Perhaps this is due to the fact that he had to weather the odds for the sake of his colleagues. By and large, Botin's pursuit of enhancing the faculty despite the criticisms and difficulties merited him the eternal gratitude of those people whom he had helped.

It is under Dr. Rochellir D. Dadivas' leadership when Capiz State University achieved many citations and accolades especially in the research development and extension upon the integration of HEIs in the province. Continuing the legacy left by the previous administration, Dr. Dadivas pursued and enhanced existing programs established and gave way to further innovations in the institution.

When Dr. Editha Magallanes was reappointed as president of the Capiz State University in 2012, it only reaffirmed her exemplary leadership that has eventually brought this thriving institution to prominence both in the national and the international stage.

Envisioning CAPSU as the center of academic excellence that renders quality service to the province and its constituents, Magallanes embarked on transforming the institution by prioritizing instruction, research, extension, and production through effective and efficient administration.

 Excerpts from the article "FULFILLING THE PROMISE: Making the Mark as SUC President" by Johnny Dariagan, Mark Glenn Villamor and Niño Manaog, Nuggets, Vol. 3 No. 1, April 2014 he Capiz State University started with the merger of Mambusao Agricultural and Technical College (MATEC) in Burias, Mambusao and the Capiz Agricultural and Fishery School (CAFS) in Bailan, Pontevedra to become the Panay State Polytechnic College (PSPC) by virtue of Batas Pambansa Blg. 91 signed by President Ferdinand E. Marcos on December 24, 1980.

At the time of the merging of the two schools, MATEC (started June 22, 1958 by virtue of RA 2088, which has two existing satellite campuses located in Tapaz and Sapian) and CAFS (started June 21, 1957 by virtue of RA 1785 and 1786) were headed by Dr. Ernesto V. Botin and Dr. Wenceslao O. Sison Jr., as Superintendents, respectively. The seat of administration of PSPC was in Burias, Mambusao, Capiz.

On August 29, 1981, Dr. Ernesto V. Botin took his oath of office as the first PSPC President and Dr. Wenceslao O. Sison Jr. became his Vice President. With the appointment of Dr. Sison as College President of Northern Iloilo Polytechnic State College, Dr. Anthony N. Navarrosa was appointed to take over his place as Vice President which was later upgraded to the position of Executive Vice President. Then, the heads of the campuses were called deans.

In 1982, with the approval of the Board of Trustees, the Office of the College President added satellite campuses in the municipalities of Dumarao and Pilar. In 1986, President Corazon C. Aquino reappointed Dr. Botin as PSPC President. When his term ended on July 24, 1993, Dr. Navarrosa, the Executive Vice President, served as Officer-in-Charge of the College until the appointment of Dr. Rochellir D. Dadivas as the second PSPC President on October 12, 1994.

During the time of Dr. Dadivas, he was assisted by Dr. Anthony N. Navarrosa, Executive Vice President; Dr. Editha L. Magallanes, Vice President for Academic Affairs; and Dr. Nicolas A. Braña, Sr., Vice President for Research, Development and Extension.

In accordance with the pertinent provisions of Republic Act 7722 (otherwise known as the Higher Education Act of 1994) and Republic Act 8992, on November 4, 1998, the Capiz Institute of Technology (founded 1917) in Roxas City, including its Department of Fisheries in Dayao (formerly Capiz School of Fisheries founded 1961), became an integral part of the PSPC system. This was approved in the 54th Regular Board Meeting held at the CHED Conference Room, San Miguel Avenue, Ortigas Center, Pasig City. However, the official turnover was done on October 25, 1999 by CHED Region VI-Western Visayas Director Tomas P. Parreño to PSPC President Dadivas. Then, on December 19, 2000, Sigma College of Science and Technology (started January 1, 1996 by virtue of RA 7973) in Sigma, Capiz was integrated into PSPC.

A BRIEF HISTORY

In 1999, Cong. Manuel "Mar" A. Roxas of the 1st District of Capiz filed a bill seeking for the conversion of PSPC into a state university. Both the City Council of Roxas City and the Provincial Board of Capiz passed the resolution supporting the bill.

On September 15, 2000, the Board of Trustees approved the new organizational structure of the College with three (3) units, namely: the Roxas City Unit, the Mambusao Unit and the Pontevedra Unit. Each unit was headed by a Chancellor. The Mambusao Unit has six (6) satellite campuses: Burias Campus in Mambusao, Sapian Campus, Tapaz Campus, Sigma Campus, Mambusao Campus, and Dumarao Campus. The Pontevedra

In March 2002 the bill for the conversion of PSPC into a state university was approved in the House of Representatives and the Senate approved the same measure on February 6, 2004. Cong. Rodriguez D. Dadivas of the 1st Congressional District and Cong. Fredenil H. Castro of the 2nd Congressional District were responsible in lobbying for the passage of the conversion law.

Then, a milestone was reached on March 21, 2004, when President Gloria Macapagal-Arroyo signed into law Republic Act No. 9273 at Capiz Provincial Capitol, Roxas City converting PSPC into a state university, the Capiz State University. At the time of the conversion, the incumbent

At the time of the conversion, the incumbent Governor of Capiz was Hon. Vicente B. Bermejo with Hon. Victor A. Tanco as Vice Governor. Following the provision of the University Charter, the seat of administration was transferred to Roxas City.

Unit has Pontevedra Campus and Pilar Campus; while the Roxas City Unit has Roxas City Campus and Dayao Campus. The first Chancellors were Dr. Nenita A. Beluso for Pontevedra Unit, Supt. Primitivo V. Bangcoyo for Roxas City Unit and Dr. Geronimo L. Gregorio for Mambusao Unit. The campuses were headed by Campus Administrators who report directly to the Chancellors.

In 2001, the seat of administration was transferred to Mambusao Campus for accessibility and ease of communication. The second sets of Chancellors were Dr. Edgar M. Dilla for Pontevedra Unit, Dr. Genoveva N. Labaniego for Mambusao Unit and Dr. Evaristo M. Magoncia for Roxas City Unit. With the retirement of Dr. Navarrosa in 2003, the position of Executive Vice President, being co-terminus, ceased to exist.

Governor of Capiz was Hon. Vicente B. Bermejo with Hon. Victor A. Tanco as Vice Governor. Following the provision of the University Charter, the seat of administration was transferred to Roxas City.

Dr. Rochellir D. Dadivas, the incumbent PSPC President at the time of conversion became the first University President. The three Vice Presidents were Dr. Editha L. Magallanes, Vice President for Administration and Finance; Dr. Aladino L. Leccio, Vice President for Academic Affairs; and Dr. Geronimo L. Gregorio, Vice President for Research and Extension.

On July 7, 2008, after the retirement of Dr. Dadivas as University President, Dr. Editha L. Magallanes was appointed as the second University President of Capiz State University. During the term of Dr. Magallanes, her

Dr. Editha C. Alfon, who after having been installed into office as University President of Capiz State University on September 8, 2016, further exemplifies her true dedication to quality service to the university with integrity, transparency, and accountability.

Dr. Alfon who rose from being a faculty member, a Registrar, a Campus Administrator, a Vice President for Academic Affairs, and now a University President, truly and completely prepared her to be one- a true and experienced leader. A very simple lady who intentionally looks at the person's capacity to lead, and willingly trains anyone who desires to be one.

Her consistent exemplary performance and firm leadership style coupled with calm demeanor, catapulted her into a second term as University President of Capiz State University. She was re-appointed into office by the governing Board by virtue of Board Resolution No. 003, series of 2020 for a term of four (4) years commencing on September 8, 2020.

In Dr. Alfon's second term, the University is journeying ahead with courage and determination in achieving its vision of becoming "A highly globalized University towards a just and equitable society" by sustaining excellence in its various degree programs and improving the delivery of its services.

Vice Presidents were Dr. Aladino L. Leccio for Administration and Finance, Dr. Herminia B. Gomez for Academic Affairs and Dr. Geronimo L. Gregorio for Research, Development and Extension (RDE). Per Board of Regents' Resolution No. 1112, series of 2009, the chancellor positions were abolished in view of overlapping functions with the campus administrators.

Having been rated Outstanding by the Evaluation and Search Committee towards the end of her first term as University President in June 2012, Dr. Editha L. Magallanes was re-appointed as President of Capiz State University on July 7, 2012.

With the retirement of Dr. Gregorio, Dr. Cora F. Navarra replaced him as Vice President for Research, Development and Extension effective November 7, 2012. The untimely death of Dr. Cora F. Navarra, left the VP RDE office vacant. Dr. Pedro G. Gavino was then designated as the Officerin-Charge on March 5, 2014 and assumed office on June 1 of the same year.

With the retirement of Dr. Herminia B. Gomez in September 17, 2014, Dr. Editha C. Alfon was designated as the Vice-President for Academic Affairs until September 7, 2016. And now, she serves as the University President after the retirement of Dr. Editha L. Magallanes.

Dr. Alfon holds the university presidency effective September 8, 2016 to date by virtue of Resolution No. 50, series of 2016. The three vice presidents of the new administration are Dr. Nilo D. Delfin as the VP for Administration and Finance, Dr. Susan O. Dangan as the VP for Academic Affairs, and Dr. Lucy A. Beluso as the VP for Research Development and Extension.

By virtue of BOR Resolution No 117, series of 2017, the post for Vice President for External Affairs and Linkages was created. Dr. Mary Ann B. Martelino was designated as the first Vice President for External Affairs and Linkages.

With Dr. Alfon's dedicated service, participative leadership style, and transparent governance, she was re-appointed by the Board for a term of four (4) years as University President on September 8, 2020 by virtue of Board Resolution No. 003, series of 2020. The four (4) designated Vice Presidents under her second term are Dr. Wennie F. Legario as Vice President for Administration and Finance, Dr. Susan O. Dangan as Vice President for Academic Affairs, Dr. Efren L. Linan as Vice President for Research Development and Extension, and Dr. Mary Ann B. Martelino as Vice President for External Affairs and Linkages.





EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

hrough Resolution No. 36, S. 2021, the Board of Regents approved the Learning Continuity Plan for 2021-2022 in November 25, 2021 during the 68th Regular Board of Regents Meeting held via zoom. This also marked the beginning of its utilization in the delivery of four-fold functions of the university, giving way to some recommendations for its continuous quality improvement.

To continuously enhance the document, inclusion of some research results regarding the conduct of instruction utilizing different learning platforms was recommended. Besides, concerns on the development of facilities, infrastructure enhancement were also forwarded. Some provisions on the knowledge and skills faculty and students in the utilization of varied platforms for students' benefit were considered through constant participation to webinars relative to instruction and other functions. Optimizing leniency of faculty members in the learning disabilities of students and further considering the psychological underpinning attached to difficulties in accomplishing learning modules and other issues which are considered crucial to the accomplishment of learning outputs and achievement of learning outcomes per curricular program.

Furthermore, the Board of Regents would want to make sure problems encountered by both faculty and students are regularly monitored and provided workable solutions in order to lessen occurrence of similar problems in the future.

Despite the lingering fear on the rising COVID-19 cases, the university accommodated 17,652 students in the First Semester, and 17,285 in the Second Semester. The university produced 1,048 graduates with twelve [12] Latin awardees.

As of December 2021, 42.91% still occupy Instructor positions, 27.33% were Associate Professor, 22.47% Asst. Prof, only 7.29% hold Professorial positions. Twenty three (23) were promoted to higher ranks, 21 were newly hired as Instructor, 2 were transferees from DepEd, and the other one was laterally transferred from non-teaching to teaching.

Since the time when COVID-19 crises spread over the globe, OSA has continuously nurtured students' lives with so understanding and care Generally, the university continuously delivered quality services and has developed inclusive and proactive solutions to students' specific needs. The office institutionalized Padayon: The Continuity Plan that maximized all the resources and capabilities of every campus, exploring the internal and external utilization of environment needed to further provide students' assistance. New and transfer students reported the feeling of being connected to the university after the virtual orientation program. Parents and guardians were ensured of their students' fulfilling college experience. One hundred (100%) of the students joined 133 accredited organizations. Two thousand two hundred three (2,203) students availed

of TES amounting to PhP 88,120,000.00 from January to December 2021. Conduct of E-learning sessions, virtual spiritual and values formation activities provided 24/7 connections.

The nine campuses conducted online COVID-19 information campaign, cyber bullying campaign, sexual and reproductive health and rights activities, and other drugs campaign very necessary in their survival.

The medical/dental service office conducted 990 physical examinations, 550 out-patient services, 1,680 medicine dispensing, 1,690 blood pressure monitoring, 170 wound dressing and first aid, 1,100 dental services, 12,780 health education services, 15,890 health and wellness development, and 9,172 issuance of medical certificates. Generally, 44,022 total clients were afforded medical/dental services.

The socio-cultural services office participated in the National Arts Month Celebration in 2021, through the Provincial Tourism and Cultural Affairs Office.



Faculty and students' knowledge and skills in the utilization of varied platforms were enhanced and considered through constant participation to webinars relative to instruction.

All campus/satellite libraries catered a total of 4,567 clients where the faculty and staff group comprised the biggest percentage (52%). There were 1,791 printed library resources utilized while a total of 418,745 searches were made using the online database. A total amount of Php4,550,435.81 was spent for the procurement of books, Php552,289.93 for the subscription of printed periodicals, while the Php1.3 million for the subscription of online database.

Existing library buildings were repaired, maintained and upgraded and furniture and fixtures such as sofa, bookshelves, tables, among others. Varied library activities were likewise conducted such as conduct of webinars, national book week, and outreach activities.

The University has successfully and continuously endeavored to build, grow, and sustain the four functions through strengthening of academic alliances and collaborations despite the ravaging effects of COVID - 19 crises.

All the enhanced tertiary programs which are compliant with CMO 20, s.2013, PSGs/program, and supreme court final ruling (October 2018). the changes in the nomenclatures of graduate programs, the approval of the 7 programs without BOR approved, and all graduate programs which are compliant with PSGs for Graduate Education were approved on November 25, 2021 during the 68th Regular Board of Regents' Meetings. The following significant documents of Capiz State University were also approved: The University Code, the Student and Graduate School Handbooks, and the Thesis and Dissertation Manual.

The external affairs and linkages office: strengthened international collaboration through academic and research exchange mobility through digital platforms, participated in webinar series between Universitas Mercu Buana Yogyakart a. This Webinar Series consisted of 5 week- sessions that commenced in December 2020 and ended in February 2021 with the participation and experts from UMBY .They were paired by the equally knowledgeable and skilled CapSU faculty: Dr. Christine Quenga, Dr. Hazel D. Joaquin, Dr. Judel Protacio, and Prof. Mark Glenn F. Villamor. Another collaborative activity was realized between UMBY involving research studies in Social Science, Crop Science, Food Technology, and Animal Science which started November 2020 and ended in August 2021. Furthermore, the university likewise forged international partnerships with National Kaoshiung Science and Technology University of Taiwan, INTI International Universitas and Colleges- Malaysia and Universitas Pendidikan Sultan Igris- Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia.

Finally, the university participated in the Student Exchange Programs with UAD from October 2021 - Dec 23, 2021. This activity was also made possible through the diligence and active participation of Dr. Louis Placido Lachica, Dr. Christine Quenga, Dr. Hazel Joaquin, Dr. Joey Balatayo, Dr. Rossandrew Villaruel, Dr. Christy Agnas, Dr. Leo Andrew Biclar, and Dr. Nedy Coldovero more signifantly, CapSU was awardee of the 1st Philippine HE Internationalization Award, and CHEDRO 6 recognized Best Practices.

Php 75,249,087 was spent for the construction, repair and renovation of buildings and facilities. Webinars relative to administration and finance were also attended by personnel in-charge in the Office of Administration and Finance to equip them with coping strategies and performance in finance administration.

The Philippine Regulatory Commission released licensure examinations results in engineering, education, agriculture, social work, veterinary medicine, and criminology with registering the average passing rate of 41%.

CHED approved the utilization of funds on December 2021 for the SMART CAMPUS a CHED funded project based on CMO No.9, S.2020 happened on the last guarter of 2020 but CHED's approval for its utilization of funds on December 2021 amounting to 24.999.960.00.

SOCOTEC officially issued the ISO Recertification on December 29, 2021 after the series of activities such as: ISO 2nd Surveillance Audit, Audit Evaluation Post Conference, Virtual Meeting, 3-day ISO Virtual Refresher Training, 4-day Virtual Training-Workshop, Virtual Post Audit Evaluation, and Virtual Management Review before the actual QMS Audit on January 2021 to November 4, 2021 and finally the actual Quality Management System Recertification Audit on December 15, 27 and 28, 2021.

Through higher accreditation, all curricular programs are quality assured. In 2021, 15 graduate programs were already accredited Level 2, and level 3. For the undergraduate, 18 were accredited level III, twenty seven (27) were level 2 and one each for level 1 and 2, while 7 were already preliminary surveyed.

Of the 55 undergraduate programs, 42 were already issued COPCs in 2021, while graduate programs were already visited by NQAT.

The faculty researchers presented their research outputs during the two (2) Research, Development and Extension (RDE) symposia conducted by the RDE Office with a total of 54 research outputs for 2021. The RDE office also conducted the in-house review to cater Research and Development proposals for the succeeding years. The in-house review was able to accumulate a total of 56 R&D proposals.

The researchers won various awards during the Western Visayas Agriculture, Aquatic and Natural Resources Research and Development Consortium (WESVAARRDEC)'s 2021 Regional Symposium on Research and Development Highlights held via Zoom on December 9-10, 2021. The winning research articles and their corresponding researchers were the following:

The participants and beneficiaries were given technical information and tangible assistance, which helped reconsider opportunities and recovered from the pandemic's current situation.

The RDE maintains 11 externally funded projects. The three (3) newly external funded projects are as follows: 1) R.I.S.E Capiz (Riverine Improvement for Sustainable Ecotourism in Roxas City, Capiz) funded by CHED; 2) FishRight Project funded by USAID, and 3) Establishment of DA-BAR CAPSU Agribusiness Incubator funded by DA-BAR.

On December 9-10, 2021 (the Capiz State University – Research, Development and Extension) (CAPSU-RDE) Office conducted the PAGTUKIB 2021, a yearly activity to showcase the research endeavors and innovation as well as technology transfer through extension and commercialization activities of the University. This year's PAGTUKIB becomes extra special since the CHED Chairman Dr. J. Prospero "Popoy" De Vera III himself, launched the event alongside the Deputy Executive Director III Atty. Lily Freida M. Milla and International Affairs Staff (IAS) Team. At the same time, Chairman Popoy De Vera conducted "PADYAK" in Capiz (PADYAK) an activity visiting and assessing the living conditions of the grantees of the Unified Student Financial Assistance System for Tertiary Education's (UniFAST)'s Tertiary Education Subsidy (TES) program.

The Community Extension Services under the Research Development and Extension Office take the lead in implementing research-based community extension programs of the University. It also coordinates, monitors, and evaluates the extension services rendered by the various institutes/programs in the partner communities of the University.

Since the onset of the community quarantine period, a total of four hundred eighty (480) Projects, Programs and Activities (PPAs) were conducted and initiated by different campuses and satellite colleges, benefitting a total of 17,176 individuals comprised of recipients from the university, community, and other partner agencies as well, across the region. The participants and beneficiaries were given technical information and tangible assistance, which helped reconsider opportunities and recover from the pandemic's current situation.

Moreover, fifteen (15) extension projects were presented during the 34th Annual University Faculty RDE In-house Review last November 26, 2021, respectively. External evaluators justifiably commented on them: Dr. Vilma Patindol, former Region 8 ATI Director; Dr. Corazon Corbal, VP Academic Affairs of ISAT University (Iloilo City); and Prof. Juniel Lucidos, Director of Planning and Development of Romblon State University. Winners of the said activity are as follows: 1. Improving Animal Nutrition: Community-Based Corn Silage Production to Increase Milk Yield in Capiz - PROPONENT: EMELY J. ESCALA; Co-Author: Darel Dapulaza, Junarey B. Doletin (PONTEVEDRA); 2. PROJECT KBP: Kapon, Bakuna kag Purga sa Ido kag Kuring - Proponent: Maryneth B. Barrios, Leah Ingalla, Liezel Monido, Aveguin Miguello, Ezrah Makilan, Nelinda Duero (DUMARAO); 3. "SALBAR SUBA" A Panay River Restoration Project - PROPONENT: Mark L. Sibug; Co-Author: Rosine O. Labado (BURIAS)

For the year 2021, the University has 50% increase on collected total revenue of P 270.896M from service and business income. Aside from the total subsidy received from the national government amounting to P 659.486M.

Furthermore, the University has the total assets of 1.048B with liabilities amounting to P 277.845M. A 10% increase on the Total Net Assets /Equity from 2020 (P 684.196M) to P 754.578M in 2021.

Believing that human resources are the best assets of the academe that necessitates constant enhancement, as of December 2021, 46 non-teaching positions were filled up.

The net income of Php 720,837.32 was derived from the fishponds, coconuts, rice, rental services, canteen, review center, bakery, ID printing, and printing press. The University has likewise continued its regular monitoring and planning for possible new business ventures, in order to improve the existing IGPs and consequently enhance income to subsidize other projects.

elatively, the Learning Continuity Plan for SY 2021-2022 was still adopted with more revisions to comply with the recommendations of the Board of Regents before it was approved on August 2021; such as continuous quality improvement of the processes in the instruction, and other functions.






ACADEMIC HIGHLIGHTS







DISTRIBUTION OF LIBRARY CLIENTS BY CAMPUS




For CY 2021, the three campuses with the most number of clients served were Pontevedra (950), Roxas City (792) and Pilar (366).

DISTRIBUTION OF LIBRARY CLIENTS BY TIME



LIBRARY MATERIALS UTILIZATION STATISTICS




The top-three most borrowed books were from the Social Sciences classification (523), followed by those from the Applied Sciences (467), and from the Pure Sciences (266).


PROQUEST CENTRAL ONLINE DATABASE UTILIZATION STATISTICS





PURCHASED AND DONATED BOOKS BY CAMPUS ACCORDING TO NUMBER OF TITLES AND COPIES




BOOK PURCHASE AND SUBSCRIPTION EXPENSES
















CELEBRATING SUCCESSES AND CARRYING LEARNING FORWARD


Tertiary Education Subsidy (TES) grantees received their financial assistance amounting to P 88,120,000.00 from January to December 2021.






PROVIDING EXCELLENCE IN HEALTH AND WELLNESS

Since there is a pandemic, the University continuously supports students by providing access in a different venue in local, national, and international leadership development.

One thousand six hundred eighty student leaders attended various leadership training from international, national, and local organizations. The training is a non-formal education project aimed at young people with high leadership potential from social organizations, academic institutions, and government agencies promoting youth leadership.





Evaluation and Monitoring

The Office of the Student Affairs and Services evaluates and monitors every activity conducted. A series of feedbacking activities were done, survey instruments were provided to the participants and other stakeholders to regularly assess all activities conducted.

Overall, for 2021, the Office of the Student Affairs of the University's stakeholders were "very satisfied" with the services provided. However, there were some challenges encountered, but these were given immediate action through the new normal approaches being implemented by the office to cope and meet the needs of the stakeholders.


Out of 55 undergraduate degree programs, 42 were already granted COPCs as of 2021.



Relentlessly, the university personnel coped with new normal way of performing their respective functions by indulging in a more significant strategies in the enhancement of their knowledge and skills through attendance to webinars conducted by varied agencies and organizations. Hence in 2021, a total of 1,048 trainings were attended by faculty members through zoom, google and other platform in all levels.

When further classified according to clusters, the College of Education attended 397 webinars with 795 attendees; followed by the College of Business Management with 261 webinars with 644 participants followed by the College of Agriculture & Fisheries with 220 webinars which were attended by 240 faculty members.

The data further reveal that webinars attended were mostly in the national and international levels with 442 and 289, respectively.

EMPLOYABILITY

One of the performance indicators of SUCs is employability of its graduates. This determines as to whether the university is offering programs that are industry needed. Despite the factors affecting their employment like the rising trend of COVID-19 cases, the emotional and the lingering psychological stress and retrenchment from their employment immediately after graduation, the university was able to trace 62% of its graduates two years after graduation




2021 COMPLETED RESEARCH DATA


2021 RESEARCH PROPOSALS DATA



on June 22-23 with the theme "Breaking Barriers: Research Development, and Innovations Amidst the New Normal."


The faculty researchers and extensionists from all of CAPSU's campuses and satellite colleges gathered and presented their proposals and completed researches.

The RDE Office headed by its Vice President, Dr. Efren L. Linan organized the event and all its staff with the support of the University President, Dr. Editha C. Alfon, the campus administrators and satellite college directors.

Dr. Linan, gave a cordial greeting, followed by words from PCIEERD's Division Chief Human Resource and Institution Development, Dr. Ruby Ratera, and the overall PCIEERD Regional Consortia Coordinator, Mr. Ruel A. Pili.

Dr. Ratera and Mr. Ruel, the guest speakers, introduced the PCIEERD's roadmap, recommendations, programs, grants, call for papers, scholarships, and other opportunities to the CAPSU faculty and staff.

Furthermore, the RDE office has conducted its 37th Annual Symposium during the celebration of the PAGTUKIB 2021 to add up the faculty researchers' accomplishments to the growing number of research outputs of the University.



FACULTY RESEARCHERS LEARN SIMULATION-DRIVEN MACHINE DESIGN

Faculty researchers and inventors from the various member institutions of the Western Visayas Consortium for Industry and Energy Research and Development (WVCIEERD) gathered in a virtual conference to try R&D Innovations through Simulation-Driven Machine Design on December 27-30 and in the 2nd week of the year 2022.

The activity was funded by the Department of Science and Technology -Philippine Council of Industry, Energy and Emerging Technology Research and Development (DOST-PCIEERD).

During the opening program, Dr. Efren L. Linan, Vice President of RDE, pointed the importance of transitioning to a simulation-driven machine design process. According to him, it allows inventors to evaluate which design will meet performance requirements while controlling cost. He added that simulation-driven design can drive innovation.

Dr. Carmelo V. Ambut, Executive Director of WVCIEERD, in his message encourages the participants to make the most of the training and to think of ways on how to use the newly acquired knowledge in research and development in order to come up with something new while addressing the needs of the industry.

The resource speaker of the training was Dr. Christian N. Della, an Assistant Professor at James Watt School of Engineering, University of Glasgow, UK. During the 8-day training, lectures on Computer-Aided Drawing, Finite Element Analysis, Structural Analysis, Computational Fluid Dynamics (CFD), Turbulence Analysis, Transient Analysis, and Meshing were discussed to the participants.

A hands-on simulation workshop using the software was also conducted by the participants through the guidance of Dr. Della.

A small part of her money was being saved for her future academic needs and emergencies, while some were being used to buy construction materials for their new home that is currently being built.

Along with the conversation, Chair de Vera realized that the students prefer face-to-face rather than online classes.

Upon the realization, he proposed to the CAPSU President Dr. Editha C. Alfon that she should implement a blended learning approach in order to cater to a large number of enrollees within the institution.

After the short interview, the participants proceeded to travel to the second TES grantee

from Brgy. Atiplo, Mambuso, Capiz which was at least 18km away.

The interview with the second TES grantee was very emotional. The HRM student of CAPSU Burias was moved to tears as she showed her appreciation to Chair de Vera.

Because of the financial aid that CHED gave them, they were able to use the money to invest in gadgets that she used for the online class.

Moreover, the Chairman was surprised when he knew that most of the money was invested to construct her Karinderia which is ideal for her course as an HRM student.

Finally, the Padyak participants departed and traveled another 7km to CAPSU Burias. There, Chair de Vera, CHED-IAS, and the bikers were able to enjoy the native dishes of Capiz while appreciating the view from a small hill that is surrounded by research-based infrastructures.



EXIT Undertake relevant research, development and extension services.



he Community Extension Services under the Research Development and Extension Office take the lead in implementing research-based community extension programs of the University. It also coordinates, monitors, and evaluates the extension services rendered by the various institutes/programs in the partner communities of the University.

CAPSU focuses on sustainability, urban renewal, and cultural preservation and dissemination. From CAPSU's Extension Agenda: Kabataan, Kababaihan, Kalikasan at Kabuhayan – a partnership with Youth, Women, and the People toward Nation-building that spells the initiatives and efforts of the University to help alleviate the conditions of its constituents by way of training the beneficiaries from varied sectors of the Province of Capiz who will be the recipient of pieces of training, Information Education and Communication (IEC) materials, community outreach, technical assistance, and consultancy services.

The year 2021 has been full of challenges primarily due to the CoVid 19 pandemic. Nevertheless, the University Extension Unit with the committed and responsible faculty extension project implementers has paved the way in continuously helping uplift the life of the community members.

Researchers and Extensionists went beyond their call of duty to formulate innovative and meaningful research as well as large-scale extension programs that were proposed to the government agencies; enabling the faculty and staff to be able to help the community further through funded projects such as the ABI, ATBI, Food Value Chain Development, and RISE Capiz. These projects are but a few of the many-other innovations and aid that the faculty has to offer.

Since the onset of the community quarantine period, a total of four hundred eighty (480) Projects, Programs and Activities (PPAs) were conducted and initiated by different campuses and satellite colleges, benefitting a total of 17,176 individuals comprised of recipients from the university, community, and other partner agencies as well, across the region. The participants and beneficiaries were given technical information

and tangible assistance, which helped reconsider opportunities and recover from the pandemic's current situation.

Moreover, fifteen (15) extension projects were presented during the 34th Annual University Faculty RDE In-house Review last November 26, 2021, respectively. External evaluators justifiably commented on them: Dr. Vilma Patindol, former Region 8 ATI Director; Dr. Corazon Corbal, VP Academic Affairs of ISAT University (Iloilo City); and Prof. Juniel Lucidos, Director of Planning and Development of Romblon State University. 
Throughout the years, it has been part and parcel of the institution to aid the community even through great and dangerous odds.





As of December 2021, the University reflected the personnel and students' vaccination rate showing higher percentage for personnel compared to students. Notably Pilar and the Roxas City Main Campus showed higher vaccination rates for students.

SOCOTEC conducts Recertification Audit for CAPSU OMS

Capiz State University was recommended for ISO 9001:2015 Certification for another three (3) years after the remote recertification process conducted by SOCOTEC Certification International Philippines on December 15, 27 & 28, 2021. This confirmed the continuous effectiveness of the University's Quality Management System in providing services to its clientele.

The 3-day audit aimed to verify the continued conformity and effectiveness of the management system as a whole, and its relevance and applicability for the scope of certification. Moreover, it identified opportunities or rooms for improvement to effectively implement the management system, and gave recommendations for the maintenance of certificate.

SOCOTEC Lead Auditor Ms. Anna Manlangit appreciated the university system for its continued commitment to continual improvement and in pursuing its ISO recertification amid the challenges brought about by the pandemic.

A 4-Day Virtual Training Workshop in preparation for the QMS Recertification Audit was conducted last August 3, 4, 5 & 6, 2021 with Dr. Ingrid C. Manglapus as the invited speaker. Aside from that, a 3-Day Virtual IOA Refresher Training (Re-Audit) last May 26, 27 & 28, 2021 with Mr. Erwin Quinto, Auditor from SOCOTEC was also facilitated to further capacitate the internal auditors of the university to conduct internal remote audit. The Virtual Internal Quality Audit was done last September 8-17. 2021 among the nine (9) campuses and the Central Office. After the internal audit, a Virtual Post Internal Quality Audit Evaluation Conference was held last October 12, 2021 with Dr. Ingrid C. Manglapus again as the resource speaker.

The Annual Management Review involving the University President, Heads of Offices, Campus Administrators, Satellite Directors, QMS Director, University Lead Auditor, and Deputy Lead Auditor was pursued on November 4, 2021. This was done to communicate the internal findings to the top level management for continuous improvement.

Prior to the recertification audit, the university subjected for a 2nd Virtual Surveillance Audit last January 13-14, 2021 before a recertification audit was conducted.

The university's journey in embracing an international quality standard under the International Organization for Standardization (ISO) Quality Management System (QMS) began in 2018 when it was first ISO certified under the ISO 9001:2015.

STATEMENT OF FINANCIAL POSITION AS OF DECEMBER 31, 2021

For the year 2021, the University collected a total revenue of P 270.896M from service and business income. It reflected an increase of 50% from 2020. Moreover, a total of P 659.486M was received as Subsidy from National Government.

For the financial condition, the university has a total asset of 1.048B in 2021 representing an increase of 21% compared to year 2020. The liabilities is P 293.6M, an increase of 61% which can be attributed to the increase in inter-agency payables mainly representing Projects from National Government Agency.

The Total Net Assets/Equity has also increased at 10% from P 684.196M in 2020 to P 754.578M in 2021.


IGP REPORT 2021

The net income of IGPs of the nine [9] campuses, including the printing press was Php 720,837.32. These included fishponds, coconuts, rice, rental services, canteen, review center, bakery, ID printing, and printing press. As indicated in the table, the revenue of some campuses has a negative net loss. It is due to the closure of the majority of the businesses inside the premises. Tenants were highly reliant on students as their primary market, which was abolished by suspending face-to-face classes. However, IGP of fishpond and rice production is viable and continuous to have a positive income.

Albeit this health emergency crisis, University Business Affairs Office conducted a webinar on crafting business plans for new business ventures during a pandemic to capacitate the IGP personnel of the [9] nine campuses in developing their innovative marketing strategy of products and services in their own respective IGP.

The University has likewise continuously monitored, planned for possible new business ventures to improve the existing IGPs of the University.


SUMMARY OF BOARD RESOLUTIONS
