Integrity



From humble beginnings, a university grew...

Since its inception in the early 1980s, the modest roots of the institution have become a formidable foundation strengthened through the adept and capable governance of its competent leaders creating positive impact on people. With a fierce commitment to provide quality service to all, Capiz State University, along with its strong and competent task force, maintains a vision with goals leading to a foreseeable future of producing globally-competitive graduates. Today, the university with its nine campuses and satellite colleges, is a landmark as much for its place in the community as its academic programs, research development and extension services, and production continue to grow.

A BRIEF HISTORY

THE PILLARS OF CAPSU

During his time as president, Dr. Botin worked hard to enhance and strengthen the faculty of the growing institution. Championing faculty development, he used to say that it is easier to build buildings than to build people. Perhaps this is due to the fact that he had to weather the odds for the sake of his colleagues. By and large, Botin's pursuit of enhancing the faculty despite the criticisms and difficulties merited him the eternal gratitude of those people whom he had helped.

It is under Dr. Rochellir D. Dadivas' leadership when Capiz State University achieved many citations and accolades especially in the research development and extension upon the integration of HEIs in the province. Continuing the legacy left by the previous administration, Dr. Dadivas pursued and enhanced existing programs established and gave way to further innovations in the institution.

When Dr. Editha Magallanes was reappointed as president of the Capiz State University in 2012, it only reaffirmed her exemplary leadership that has eventually brought this thriving institution to prominence both in the national and the international stage.

Envisioning CAPSU as the center of academic excellence that renders quality service to the province and its constituents, Magallanes embarked on transforming the institution by prioritizing instruction, research, extension, and production through effective and efficient administration.

 Excerpts from the article "FULFILLING THE PROMISE: Making the Mark as SUC President" by Johnny Dariagan, Mark Glenn Villamor and Niño Manaog, Nuggets, Vol. 3 No. 1, April 2014 he Capiz State University started with the merger of Mambusao Agricultural and Technical College (MATEC) in Burias, Mambusao and the Capiz Agricultural and Fishery School (CAFS) in Bailan, Pontevedra to become the Panay State Polytechnic College (PSPC) by virtue of Batas Pambansa Blg. 91 signed by President Ferdinand E. Marcos on December 24, 1980.

At the time of the merging of the two schools, MATEC (started June 22, 1958 by virtue of RA 2088, which has two existing satellite campuses located in Tapaz and Sapian) and CAFS (started June 21, 1957 by virtue of RA 1785 and 1786) were headed by Dr. Ernesto V. Botin and Dr. Wenceslao O. Sison Jr., as Superintendents, respectively. The seat of administration of PSPC was in Burias, Mambusao, Capiz.

On August 29, 1981, Dr. Ernesto V. Botin took his oath of office as the first PSPC President and Dr. Wenceslao O. Sison Jr. became his Vice President. With the appointment of Dr. Sison as College President of Northern Iloilo Polytechnic State College, Dr. Anthony N. Navarrosa was appointed to take over his place as Vice President which was later upgraded to the position of Executive Vice President. Then, the heads of the campuses were called deans.

In 1982, with the approval of the Board of Trustees, the Office of the College President added satellite campuses in the municipalities of Dumarao and Pilar. In 1986, President Corazon C. Aquino reappointed Dr. Botin as PSPC President. When his term ended on July 24, 1993, Dr. Navarrosa, the Executive Vice President, served as Officer-in-Charge of the College until the appointment of Dr. Rochellir D. Dadivas as the second PSPC President on October 12, 1994.

During the time of Dr. Dadivas, he was assisted by Dr. Anthony N. Navarrosa, Executive Vice President; Dr. Editha L. Magallanes, Vice President for Academic Affairs; and Dr. Nicolas A. Braña, Sr., Vice President for Research, Development and Extension.

In accordance with the pertinent provisions of Republic Act 7722 (otherwise known as the Higher Education Act of 1994) and Republic Act 8992, on November 4, 1998, the Capiz Institute of Technology (founded 1917) in Roxas City, including its Department of Fisheries in Dayao (formerly Capiz School of Fisheries founded 1961), became an integral part of the PSPC system. This was approved in the 54th Regular Board Meeting held at the CHED Conference Room, San Miguel Avenue, Ortigas Center, Pasig City. However, the official turnover was done on October 25, 1999 by CHED Region VI-Western Visayas Director Tomas P. Parreño to PSPC President Dadivas. Then, on December 19, 2000, Sigma College of Science and Technology (started January 1, 1996 by virtue of RA 7973) in Sigma, Capiz was integrated into PSPC.

A BRIEF HISTORY

In 1999, Cong. Manuel "Mar" A. Roxas of the 1st District of Capiz filed a bill seeking for the conversion of PSPC into a state university. Both the City Council of Roxas City and the Provincial Board of Capiz passed the resolution supporting the bill.

On September 15, 2000, the Board of Trustees approved the new organizational structure of the College with three (3) units, namely: the Roxas City Unit, the Mambusao Unit and the Pontevedra Unit. Each unit was headed by a Chancellor. The Mambusao Unit has six (6) satellite campuses: Burias Campus in Mambusao, Sapian Campus, Tapaz Campus, Sigma Campus, Mambusao Campus, and Dumarao Campus. The Pontevedra

In March 2002 the bill for the conversion of PSPC into a state university was approved in the House of Representatives and the Senate approved the same measure on February 6, 2004. Cong. Rodriguez D. Dadivas of the 1st Congressional District and Cong. Fredenil H. Castro of the 2nd Congressional District were responsible in lobbying for the passage of the conversion law.

Then, a milestone was reached on March 21, 2004, when President Gloria Macapagal-Arroyo signed into law Republic Act No. 9273 at Capiz Provincial Capitol, Roxas City converting PSPC into a state university, the Capiz State University. At the time of the conversion, the incumbent

At the time of the conversion, the incumbent Governor of Capiz was Hon. Vicente B. Bermejo with Hon. Victor A. Tanco as Vice Governor. Following the provision of the University Charter, the seat of administration was transferred to Roxas City.

Unit has Pontevedra Campus and Pilar Campus; while the Roxas City Unit has Roxas City Campus and Dayao Campus. The first Chancellors were Dr. Nenita A. Beluso for Pontevedra Unit, Supt. Primitivo V. Bangcoyo for Roxas City Unit and Dr. Geronimo L. Gregorio for Mambusao Unit. The campuses were headed by Campus Administrators who report directly to the Chancellors.

In 2001, the seat of administration was transferred to Mambusao Campus for accessibility and ease of communication. The second sets of Chancellors were Dr. Edgar M. Dilla for Pontevedra Unit, Dr. Genoveva N. Labaniego for Mambusao Unit and Dr. Evaristo M. Magoncia for Roxas City Unit. With the retirement of Dr. Navarrosa in 2003, the position of Executive Vice President, being co-terminus, ceased to exist.

Governor of Capiz was Hon. Vicente B. Bermejo with Hon. Victor A. Tanco as Vice Governor. Following the provision of the University Charter, the seat of administration was transferred to Roxas City.

Dr. Rochellir D. Dadivas, the incumbent PSPC President at the time of conversion became the first University President. The three Vice Presidents were Dr. Editha L. Magallanes, Vice President for Administration and Finance; Dr. Aladino L. Leccio, Vice President for Academic Affairs; and Dr. Geronimo L. Gregorio, Vice President for Research and Extension.

On July 7, 2008, after the retirement of Dr. Dadivas as University President, Dr. Editha L. Magallanes was appointed as the second University President of Capiz State University. During the term of Dr. Magallanes, her

Dr. Editha C. Alfon, who after having been installed into office as University President of Capiz State University on September 8, 2016, further exemplifies her true dedication to quality service to the university with integrity, transparency, and accountability.

Dr. Alfon who rose from being a faculty member, a Registrar, a Campus Administrator, a Vice President for Academic Affairs, and now a University President, truly and completely prepared her to be one- a true and experienced leader. A very simple lady who intentionally looks at the person's capacity to lead, and willingly trains anyone who desires to be one.

Her consistent exemplary performance and firm leadership style coupled with calm demeanor, catapulted her into a second term as University President of Capiz State University. She was re-appointed into office by the governing Board by virtue of Board Resolution No. 003, series of 2020 for a term of four (4) years commencing on September 8, 2020.

In Dr. Alfon's second term, the University is journeying ahead with courage and determination in achieving its vision of becoming "A highly globalized University towards a just and equitable society" by sustaining excellence in its various degree programs and improving the delivery of its services.

Vice Presidents were Dr. Aladino L. Leccio for Administration and Finance, Dr. Herminia B. Gomez for Academic Affairs and Dr. Geronimo L. Gregorio for Research, Development and Extension (RDE). Per Board of Regents' Resolution No. 1112, series of 2009, the chancellor positions were abolished in view of overlapping functions with the campus administrators.

Having been rated Outstanding by the Evaluation and Search Committee towards the end of her first term as University President in June 2012, Dr. Editha L. Magallanes was re-appointed as President of Capiz State University on July 7, 2012.

With the retirement of Dr. Gregorio, Dr. Cora F. Navarra replaced him as Vice President for Research, Development and Extension effective November 7, 2012. The untimely death of Dr. Cora F. Navarra, left the VP RDE office vacant. Dr. Pedro G. Gavino was then designated as the Officerin-Charge on March 5, 2014 and assumed office on June 1 of the same year.

With the retirement of Dr. Herminia B. Gomez in September 17, 2014, Dr. Editha C. Alfon was designated as the Vice-President for Academic Affairs until September 7, 2016. And now, she serves as the University President after the retirement of Dr. Editha L. Magallanes.

Dr. Alfon holds the university presidency effective September 8, 2016 to date by virtue of Resolution No. 50, series of 2016. The three vice presidents of the new administration are Dr. Nilo D. Delfin as the VP for Administration and Finance, Dr. Susan O. Dangan as the VP for Academic Affairs, and Dr. Lucy A. Beluso as the VP for Research Development and Extension.

By virtue of BOR Resolution No 117, series of 2017, the post for Vice President for External Affairs and Linkages was created. Dr. Mary Ann B. Martelino was designated as the first Vice President for External Affairs and Linkages.

With Dr. Alfon's dedicated service, participative leadership style, and transparent governance, she was re-appointed by the Board for a term of four (4) years as University President on September 8, 2020 by virtue of Board Resolution No. 003, series of 2020. The four (4) designated Vice Presidents under her second term are Dr. Wennie F. Legario as Vice President for Administration and Finance, Dr. Susan O. Dangan as Vice President for Academic Affairs, Dr. Efren L. Linan as Vice President for Research Development and Extension, and Dr. Mary Ann B. Martelino as Vice President for External Affairs and Linkages.





EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

For AY 2021-22, the University was able to produce 3,866 graduates. Of these graduates, 476 were cum laude, 44 were magna cum laude, and 1 was cum laude.

Looking into the University's performance in the different professional licensure examinations administered by the Professional Regulation Commission, 43 % or 437 out of 1,005 takers passed in 2022. The University was able to produce 4 topnotchers, 1 for the Social Worker Licensure Examination, and 3 for the Registered Master Electrician Licensure Examination.

The University has a 65 percent employability of its graduates based on the results of the employability tracer study conducted by the different campuses and satellite colleges.

As a sign of the University's quest in the delivery of quality service, various graduate and undergraduate programs were submitted for accreditation. For the year 2022, 56 undergraduate and 23 graduate programs have passed the different levels of accreditation conducted by the Accrediting Agencies for Chartered Colleges and University of the Philippines (AACCUP).

Likewise, the Commission on Higher Education has issued the certificate of program compliance to 43 undergraduate and 6 graduate programs of the University. Six programs in the undergraduate level have thus renewed their COPC.

The Office of the Student Affairs and Services continued to deliver effective support in ensuring academic and holistic success of our learners. With this, 100% of the students availed free higher education. Furthermore, 1,991 students availed the Tertiary Education Subsidy (TES),

while 642 of students availed the Tulong Dunong Grants. Also, 493 of students availed private and other government scholarships and grants. The office also saw 95% increase in student access on Student Welfare and Development Activities, such as psychosocial support, medical and dental services, participation to local, national, and international conferences, among others.

Recognizing the significance of linkages and partnerships locally and internationally, the office has never ceased to create partnerships towards potential partners. The Office of the Vice President for External Affairs and Linkages has sealed partnerships in different local and international agencies in 2022. To wit, they are as follows:

Capiz State University also joined the University Consortium of the Southeast Asian Regional Center for Graduate Study and Research in Agriculture (SEARCA) funded by the Commission on Higher Education (CHED) project Leveling Up Philippine Higher Education Institutions in Agriculture, Fisheries, and Natural Resources (LevelUPHEI AFAR). With this, 5 faculty members from the College of Agriculture qualified for the program and they were hosted by Institut Pertanian Bogor (IPB) in Bogor, Indonesia.

As a research university, CAPSU strives to nurture a culture of innovation among its faculty members and staff. In line with this, the Research, Development, and Extension Office had crafted its three-year agenda and five-year roadmap last April 20, 2022, which aimed to boost the internationalization of research engagements, and commercialization of the outputs of the faculty researchers. With the implementation of the researches, a ceremonial signing of the research agreement among the

faculty was conducted. The RDE office had also conducted its first quarter meeting held at the various campuses to assess the accomplishments of the campus/college accomplishments in terms of research and extension.

Through partner agencies, the Research Office continuously monitors and supervises the 12 externally funded research programs and projects funded by DA-BAR, DA-RO6, DOST-PCAARRD, CHED-IAS, USDA, and other partner agencies.

In terms of patent filing three technologies were filed as patent, two for Utility Model, and among the 45 technologies applied for copyright, 35 were registered while 10 were still in the process of an application.

The Intellectual Property Management Office, through its DOST-PCAARRD-CAPSU ATBI Project, had catered to the learning visits and benchmarking activities of some SUCs in the region to look into the best practices, policies, and strategies. Among the SUCs visited the project are the TUPV, CPSU, ASU, UPV, and Hublag Foundation. Moreover, CAPSU, through the RDE IPMO had been recognized by the IPOPHIL as the Top Utility Registrant from 2017 to 2021 and Second Place - Top ITSO Filer from 2016 to 2021 on June 6, 2022, as part of its 25th Anniversary Celebration.

The Research Development and Extension Office also conducted its annual PAGTUKIB expo which focuses on the various food and beverages products from the different campuses, satellite colleges, and incubatees from the Agri-Aqua Technology Business Incubator (ATBI) and Agribusiness Incubator (ABI) of Capiz State University. Trade shows, cooking competitions, and technology pitching were the highlights of the event.

A Utilization forum was done for the Riverine Improvement towards a Sustainable Ecotourism in Roxas City, Capiz, Philippines (RISE Capiz) Project. The forum was attended by the beneficiaries of the project, namely: the palina and Cadimahan River Tour Operators.

All in all, the University faculty-researchers have produced a total of 75 researches for the year 2022, a significant spike from the slump brought about by the pandemic. This only indicates that the University is once again on track to its commitment of producing quality research and nurturing an environment that breeds inquisitive minds and developmentoriented learners.

Since the onset of the community quarantine, the University's Community Extension Services Office (CESO) a total of 355 Projects, Programs, and Activities (PPAs) were conducted and initiated by different campuses and satellite colleges, benefitting a total of 15, 491 individuals comprised of recipients from the university, community, and other partner

agencies as well, across the region. The participants and beneficiaries were given technical information and tangible assistance, which helped them reconsider opportunities and recover from the pandemic's current situation. Nevertheless, CAPSU faculty extension implementers have paved the way in continuously helping uplift the life of the community members.

The year 2022 has been a busy year for the Office of the Vice President for Administration and Finance. A number of infrastructure projects have been implemented, all intended to modernize Capiz State University and ensure that the campuses and satellite colleges become pandemic-resilient and future-proof learning hubs. So far, the University has 18 completed projects, including the expansion of the Central Administration building.

The faculty members and staff continued their pursuit towards professional growth and development. Faculty members participated in a total of 1,589 local, regional, national, and international seminars, trainings, conferences, and other forms of professional development programs, benefitting a total of 1,391 attendees across the nine campuses and satellite colleges of the University.

The Administration, likewise, continues to advocate for a gender sensitive and responsive University where diversity is celebrated and taken as an asset. Hence, the Office of Gender and Development has laid a robust program of activities throughout 2022 aimed at empowering every CAPSUnian regardless of gender, race, religion or any affiliation.


The University's income generation projects have seen a stark increase in Fiscal Year 2022 compared to Fiscal Year 2021. In particular, net income rose 98%, a sign that the University's IGP initiatives have recovered amidst losses sustained during the pandemic.

The biggest gainer among the IGP commodities was the Fish Pond, which saw net income rise to 286% from P306,360.05 in 2021 to P1,182,170.64 in 2022, followed by coconut production, with net income iumping from P49.744.82 in 2021 to P83.425.00 in 2022. Travel and Tours. with zero income in 2021 has earned 155,303.62 in 2022.

The year 2022 is a recovery year for CAPSU. The University is looking forward to resume its full swing in maximizing its potentials in delivering quality education through instruction, research, extension, production, and governance.







TITLE OF THE CHART






LIBRARY MATERIALS UTILIZATION STATISTICS






FACULTY MOBILITY AND ACTIVITIES



RESEARCH OFFICE

The Research Office had crafted its three-year agenda and five-year roadmap last April 20, 2022, which aimed to boost the internationalization of research engagements, and commercialization of the outputs of the faculty researchers. With the implementation of the researches, a ceremonial signing of the research agreement among the faculty was conducted. The RDE office had also conducted its first quarter meeting held at the various campuses to assess the accomplishments of the campus/college accomplishments in terms of research and extension.

- Externally Funded Programs and Projects. The Research Office continuously monitors and supervises the 12 externally funded research programs and projects funded by DA-BAR, DA-RO6, DOST-PCAARRD, CHED-IAS, USDA, and other partner agencies.
- Data on Patent Filing. A total of three (3) technologies were filed as patent, two (2) for Utility Model, and among the 45 technologies applied for copyright, 35 were registered while 10 were still in the process of an application.

TRAINING OFFICE

The RDE Training Office facilitated the journal writing and preparation for publication workshop. The workshop aimed to capacitate the faculty researchers in submitting their research articles for publication in Scopus/ISI refereed journals.

INTELLECTUAL PROPERTY MANAGEMENT OFFICE (IPMO)

The IPMO, through its DOST-PCAARRD-CAPSU ATBI Project, had catered to the learning visits and benchmarking activities of some SUCs in the region to look into the best practices, policies, and strategies. Among the SUCs visited the project are the TUPV, CPSU, ASU, UPV, and Hublag Foundation. Moreover, CAPSU, through the RDE IPMO had been recognized by the IPOPHIL as the Top Utility Registrant from 2017 to 2021 and Second Place - Top ITSO Filer from 2016 to 2021 on June 6, 2022, as part of its 25th Anniversary Celebration.

The RDE conducted its annual PAGTUKIB expo which focuses on the various food and beverages products from the different campuses, satellite colleges, and incubatees from the Agri-Aqua Technology Business Incubator (ATBI) and Agribusiness Incubator (ABI) of Capiz State University. 


CAPSU to implement Rapid Appraisal of PAFES

CAPSU faculty researchers conducted the pre-assessment activity for some coffee growers/farmers on February 18, 2022, at Dumarao, Capiz.

The key informants during the assessment were Salvador Escona, Ati Community Chieftain in Sitio Tag-aw, Tamulalod, Susan Hidama, Tamulalod Progressive Farmers and Producers Association President, and Larry Saldivia Coffee Farmers President in Brgy. Taslan.

Rejuvenation of the coffee plantations, the presence of the middlemen, and low-costings of coffee production were among the significant challenges encountered by the associations. Although Mrs. Hidama had acquired some post-harvest equipment from several NGOs, she finds it more challenging to supply the high demands of the consumers who come to their association in Tamulalod and buy their processed coffee.

With the pressing situations of the coffee farmers in Dumarao, Capiz, the CAPSU Team will soon conduct some interventions in these communities through Philcafè Project implementation.

Dr. Aljen P. Vasquez, Science Research Specialist II of the Department of Agriculture-Western Visayas stationed in Capiz Research Outreach at Dumarao, assisted the CAPSU researchers.

The CAPSU Team, on the other hand, was represented by Ramonita Verano, Extension Chair (Burias Campus); Engr. Monalyn Oloroso, Research Chair (Burias Campus); and Dr. Leo Andrew Biclar, Research Director.


In a ceremonial signing of the Memorandum of Agreement (MOA) between the Capiz State University (CAPSU) and the Department of Science and Technology- Philippine Council for Industry, Energy and Emerging Technology Research and Development (DOST-PCIEERD), two (2) new projects were approved for CAPSU for funding on October 4, 2022, at the Venice Grand Mall, Taguig City.

The two (2) projects were the Innovations Laboratory for Process Machine and Related Technology Development (i-Lab ProMaTech) led by Engr. Monalyn L. Oloroso and the Quali-Safe Lab: Food Quality and Safety Laboratory for Seafoods and other Innovative Food Products led by Dr. Marife R. Hilapad.

The projects were approved under the Infrastructure Development Program (IDP) of DOST-PCIEERD which will be implemented for two years

The resource persons introduced the disciplines of nanotechnology that are connected with many branches of natural and biological sciences.

They also taught how to write capsule proposals, how to search for possible research opportunities through patent and utility model searching, how to prepare the work and financial plan, and how to package the proposals accordingly for submission to the partner agencies of CAPSU.

The resource persons introduced a variety of tools and equipment used in nanotechnologies during the site visit at the UPV Nanotechnology Facility. The participants gain a hands-on experience using the varios tools and equipment for nanotechnology and the results of the tests will be integrated in their ongoing researches.

The hybrid face-to-face and virtual training-workshop aims to answer issues and problems that the different SUCs in the region encounter in the commercialization of SUC-developed technologies through the creation of spin-off companies.

In the region, there were already four (4) spin-off companies, including Algacon Feeds Manufacturing and Roselient Processed Food Manufacturing from UP Visayas, BDOZ Veterinary Products Trading, and D' Alfincoles Food and Beverage Trading from CAPSU.

DOST VI and collaborating technology transfer teams from ISAT U, CAPSU, and WVSU hope to encourage the researchers and other SUCs to commercialize the technologies to enable the mechanism for the STI community to keep up with the rest of the world in terms of innovation and economic progress.






he Community Extension Services Office (CESO) of Capiz State University are implemented through agreements and partnerships with government agencies, non-governmental groups, nonprofits, and private enterprises to help localities become financially sustainable and self-sufficient, thereby addressinh various communal needs and challenges. CESO ideates to deliver a full and pertinent pool of information and activities that will motivate the community toward sustainable development. Partner agencies and stakeholders have significantly changed and affected the Extension dynamics needed during the COVID-19 pandemic. The new normal means embracing the reality of the digital world, being innovative, and exploring the use of digital platforms in the delivery of extensions around Capiz.

Since the onset of the community quarantine period, a total of three hundred fifty-five (355) Projects, Programs, and Activities (PPAs) were conducted and initiated by different campuses and satellite colleges, benefitting a total of 15, 491 individuals comprised of recipients from the university, community, and other partner agencies as well, across the region. The participants and beneficiaries were given technical information and tangible assistance, which helped them reconsider opportunities and recover from the pandemic's current situation. Nevertheless, CAPSU faculty extension implementers have paved the way in continuously helping uplift the life of the community members.

Moreover, ten extension programs/projects were presented during the 38th CAPSU RDE Midyear Hybrid Conference last August 22 – 23, 2022. It was critiqued by external evaluators like Dr. Corazon C. Corbal, Vice












QUALITY MANAGEMENT SYSTEM

The mandate which is concerned with the identification, establishment, and business-like operation of income-generating projects (IGPs) is production. The concept of entrepreneurship dwells within the University operation of viable agrofishery-industrial projects. These have even been widened and strengthened in light of the increasing financial problems being faced by SUCs. Income derived from these projects has dramatically augmented the financial capability of the University in carrying out its major institutional programs and activities. IGPs then must find a place in the entirety of the plans and programs of the University.



IGP REPORT 2022

Capiz State University (CAPSU) is not only concerned with academics but also with other priorities which are believed complementary to the academic mandate of the institution. It has also diversified its mandate in response to the need for time. The University now focuses on a Quadro-dimensional mandate: instruction, research, extension, and production.



In Fiscal Year 2022, the income-generating projects earned PHP 1,474,931.53 on the nine campuses, including the central office's printing press. Pontevedra campus got the highest income, followed by Sigma satellite college, Roxas City main campus, and the printing press of Central Administration. Dumarao, Pilar, and Tapaz satellite college got an income of below a hundred thousand. In contrast, Burias Dayao satellite College Campus and Tapaz satellite college got below the positive income. These three campuses suffer from low income due to uncontrolled environmental phenomena and the renovation of facilities such as fishpond dikes, construction and renovation of stalls, and repair and maintenance of equipment and facilities.

NET INCOME BY COMMODITIES




The increase of PHP 1,474,931.53 in commodities was generated from various IGPs such as Fishponds, Printing Press, Canteen Travel& Tour, Bakery Rentals, Animal Production, and Review center. The realization of the targets shall spin-off from agro-industrial and aquaculture to include rental services and other business ventures towards a sustainable income-generating project.

The University Business Affairs Office will continue to strategize to improve the existing IGPs of the University, like the preparation of an Economic Development Plan that shall serve as the overarching plan towards the development of sustainable and multi-product projects that will significantly contribute to the SUCs' revenue streams.
